# Another Death-Row Victory for Wolfe

## Federal judge vacates murder and drug convictions.

**M**essage from the court system to Prince William Commonwealth's Attorney Paul Ebert: Be fair and play by the rules, or convictions you've obtained by skirting the boundaries of what's right may eventually be overturned.

And in the case of Chantilly High grad Justin Wolfe — convicted of a murder-for-hire scheme in 2002 and sentenced to death — that's just what's happened.

In July 2011, a federal court in Norfolk ruled that Wolfe's due-process rights had been violated before and during his capital-murder trial in Prince William County; so he overturned Wolfe's convictions and sentences. Then last Thursday, Aug. 16, because of "prosecutorial misconduct," the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit upheld that ruling.

It's now up to the state Attorney General's Office to either retry Wolfe or set him free. It may also appeal the ruling to the U.S. Supreme Court. But as far as Wolfe's mother, Terri Steinberg, is concerned, enough is enough.

"The commonwealth should not appeal the court's ruling," she said. "This case has already gone on too long, wasted too much taxpayer money and destroyed too many lives. Justin is innocent. He has spent 11 years in prison for a crime he did not commit. It is time for the commonwealth to stop pursuing this wrongful conviction and for Justin to come home to his family."

Now 31, Wolfe has spent more than a decade on death row in Sussex No. 1 State Prison in Waverly, Va. But when 21-year-old, Centreville High grad Danny Petrole was murdered in his car in front of his Bristow townhouse — on March 15, 2001 — it was the night before Wolfe's 20th birthday.

The shooter was Centreville's Owen Barber IV, then 21. When Petrole arrived home, Barber fired 10 shots from a 9 mm Smith & Wesson, through Petrole's passenger-side window, with all but one bullet striking him. Driving away, Barber flung the gun in a nearby intersection. Both he and Wolfe then fled the state, but were arrested that April.

Petrole was the son of a former Secret Service agent. But when police searched Petrole's belongings, they discovered nearly \$1,000 in his wallet and \$17,460 in the trunk of his car. In his townhouse were guns, \$120,366 and nearly \$500,000 worth of ecstasy and marijuana. It was later revealed that Petrole spent \$360,000/month buying marijuana from Seattle, pocketing \$100,000 to \$140,000/month from selling it.

Barber and Wolfe were 1998 Chantilly High grads; Petrole graduated in '98 from Centreville. During Barber's and Wolfe's trials in Prince William County Circuit Court, much of the testimony came from young, self-admitted drug dealers and users in the local area.

Both Barber and Petrole sold marijuana. According to court testimony, Wolfe, too, had a high-level operation, buying marijuana from both of them and dealing it to others. Initially facing the death penalty for killing Petrole, Barber agreed to testify against

Wolfe. He said he hadn't known Petrole, but killed him because Wolfe had hired him to do so; in return for his testimony, Barber's charge was reduced from capital to first-degree murder.

In January 2002, Wolfe was convicted of capital murder, since murder-for-hire is a capital offense. Five months later, Wolfe was sentenced to death, as his jury had recommended, plus 30 years in prison for drug distribution and three years for use of a firearm in the commission of a felony. On Aug. 6, 2002, Barber was given 38 years in prison.

Wolfe has always maintained his innocence, and Barber provided the only evidence directly linking Wolfe to the murder. But during a November 2010 evidentiary hearing in Federal Court in Norfolk, U.S. District Court Judge Raymond Jackson heard evidence not presented in 2002.

In his July 2011 decision to overturn Wolfe's convictions and sentences, Jackson wrote that the commonwealth "failed to disclose evidence indicating Barber had a relationship with Petrole" prior to his death. This disclosure, he wrote — plus statements from a confidential informant that "Barber owed Petrole money [and] Petrole had a hit out on Barber" — could have impeached Barber's testimony.

Furthermore, prosecutors failed to disclose a report from Det. Samson Newsome explaining that, during his first interview with Barber, he told Barber that implicating Wolfe "could mean the difference between execution or life in prison."

The prosecution also withheld evidence indicating that Barber told his roommate, Jason Coleman, that he acted alone on the night of Petrole's murder. But at the evidentiary hearing, Coleman testified to that effect.

Jackson also agreed with defense attorneys' claims that the prosecution withheld evidence of and never pursued alternate theories of the crime, including a Washington State drug dealer with a possible motive to kill Petrole.

In the Aug. 16 opinion of the U.S. Court of Appeals, Fourth Circuit, Judge Robert B. King, wrote, "The single, momentous item of suppressed Barber-impeachment evidence on which we rest today's decision is a written police report reflecting that — before Barber ever asserted that Wolfe hired him to murder Petrole — Prince William County Det. [Samson] Newsome advised Barber that he could avoid the death penalty by implicating Wolfe."

The Newsome report documents the detective's April 14, 2001 conversations with Barber following his arrest. Newsome told Barber the police knew he'd killed Petrole, but believed he'd done it at Wolfe's behest.

"I told him he was potentially facing a capital murder charge and he needed to help himself," said Newsome. "[Barber] then said, 'What do I get if I name the higher up?' I told him it could be the difference between capital murder or first degree, execution or life in prison, or that the commonwealth may be willing to make a recommendation in sentencing."

"The Commonwealth inexplicably withheld the Newsome report from Wolfe until these proceedings

## Looking Ahead: Many Projects Are on the Horizon

**N**ew and exciting projects are on the horizon in the Sully District. Below are some of them:

### COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT

#### ❖ Inova Fair Oaks Hospital

Currently, many local residents needing radiation or other oncology treatments go to Inova Fairfax Hospital to receive them. But a new, fourth, medical office building on the Inova Fair Oaks Hospital campus would bring these services closer to home. Inova Fair Oaks plans to construct that building, plus more parking and a new entrance from Rugby Road. Hospital representatives hope to have the medical office building completed and occupied by the end of 2013. The office building would be four floors and 90,000 square feet, with a 25,000-square-foot cellar. It would house a new oncology center made possible by the relocation of a portion of the radiation/oncology services from Inova Fairfax to Inova Fair Oaks. The plan also entails some 450 new parking spaces — 150 in a new, surface-parking area on the northwestern part of the campus, plus about 300 in an existing garage with extra space. A new, five-level parking garage is slated for construction in a future phase.

Also on the horizon is an addition to house more patients, Inova Fair Oaks already has approval for a 160,000-square-foot, hospital-bed tower expansion north of the existing hospital. But it wants to increase it by 39,175 square feet for a total of 199,175 square feet within the same footprint of what's already approved.

#### ❖ Fairfax County Public Safety

Further North, the bridge that crosses Route 50 is being widened to add an additional north and southbound lane.**

**Complex:** Projects still to be completed at the campus along West Ox Road, near Route 29 in Fairfax, include:

❖ A 20,000-square-foot expansion of the existing Fire and Rescue Academy facility. On the bottom floor, men's and women's locker rooms will be enlarged and improved and more lockers will be added. More classrooms will be built on the top floor. Construction should start this fall.

❖ A full renovation of the existing, 15,600-square-foot Animal Shelter and a 13,400-square-foot expansion to increase its total size to 29,000 square feet.

❖ **Office building:** The Aerospace Corporation (TAC) is constructing a seven-story office building with a garage at 14725 Lee

Road in Chantilly.

❖ **Bank:** BB&T plans to build a 3,221-square-foot bank, with two drive-through windows and a drive-up ATM, at one end of the Sully Station Shopping Center on Stone Road in Centreville. The layout will be similar to the existing BB&T Bank in the Franklin Farm Shopping Center.

❖ **Restaurant:** Coyote Grille is slated to open a new location in Centreville in September. It will be in Centrewood Plaza, where the Shade Tree Restaurant used to be. Billing itself as "a culinary adventure of southwest cuisine," its menu will include items such as fajitas, enchiladas, burritos and chimichangas, along with a wide variety of soups, salads, beverages and desserts.

### RESIDENTIAL/OFFICE PROJECT

❖ **Ridgewood:** Developer Kettler has plans for two parcels of land between Ridge Top and Waples Mill roads, along the northern and southern sides of Government Center Parkway in Fairfax Center. Some 39 townhouses will be built on the southern parcel, and 30,000-35,000 square feet of community-oriented offices will go on the northern parcel. The rear of the office site will include a community park at the intersection of Ridge Top Road and Government Center Parkway.

The townhouses will each have two-car garages, plus parking on their driveways. They'll be three, finished levels with either three or four bedrooms. The office building will contain about 20,000 square feet of community-serving retail as amenities for nearby residents. The offices will be for doctors, dentists and other professionals.

### TRANSPORTATION

❖ **Stringfellow Road:** The part of Stringfellow between I-66 and Route 29 was four-laned in the 1990s by Fairfax County's Department of Transportation. But the section from I-66 to Route 50 will also go from two to four lanes, providing a quicker, wider conduit between Route 50 in Chantilly and Route 29 in Clifton/Centreville.

Stringfellow Road currently carries some 23,000 vehicles a day, and that figure is only expected to increase. So the goal is to reduce traffic congestion there, especially during evening and morning peaks.

Planned are four travel lanes — two, 12 feet wide, and two, 14 feet wide; a 10-foot multipurpose trail, a 6-foot sidewalk and a raised, 16-foot, grass median. And bicyclists will not only share the trail with pedestrians, but also pedal side-by-side with cars,

## Supervisor Michael Frey's View of Centreville

**M**ichael Frey has lived in Centreville's London Commons community for more than 20 years and has been the Sully District supervisor since the district was created in 1992. So Centre View asked him to explain what he believes makes Centreville so special.

"An awful lot of community life is built around the schools," he said. "People love them and the PTAs have tremendous support." He also praised the volunteers who put on Centreville Day and other community events at E.C. Lawrence Park and its mill and visitors center.

But what especially left an indelible mark on him, said Frey, was "the way people came together after the May 8, 2006 shooting at the Sully District Police Station. That, to me, says as much about the character of the community as anything."

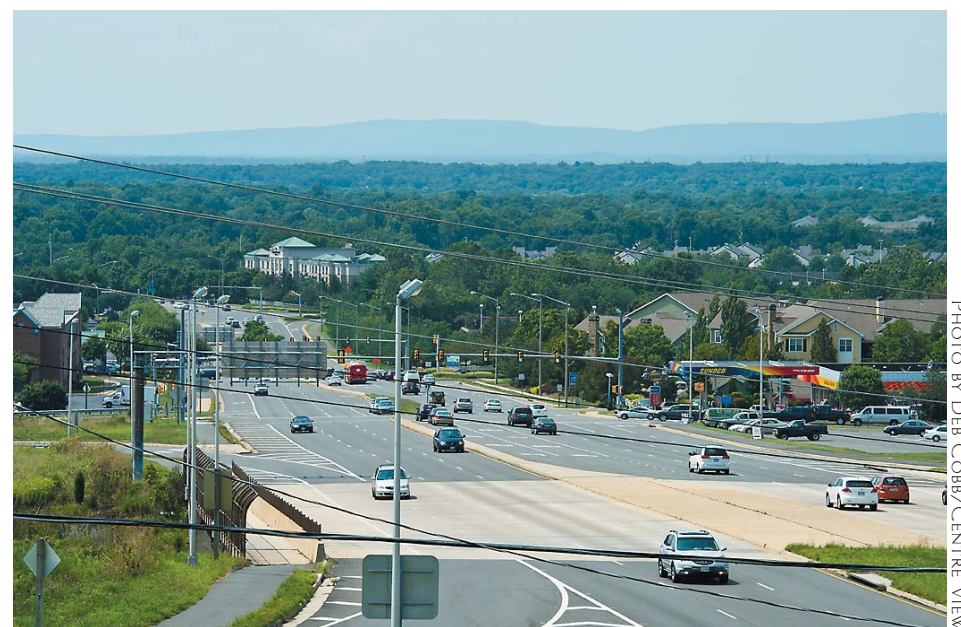
53, died nine days later; both left spouses and children.

"The day after the shooting, Westfield High students took a huge roll of butcher-block paper and strung it on the fence outside the station," said Frey. "It was signed by hundreds of students saying, 'We love you.'"

Then came the April 16, 2007 tragedy at

That day, a heavily armed and mentally deranged teenager opened fire in the station's parking lot, killing two police officers, Det. Vicky Armel and MPO Michael Garbarino. Armel, 40, died that day, and Garbarino,

trucks and buses on each outer, 14-foot lane.

Utility relocation has already been done; construction is scheduled to begin this fall.

❖ **Fair Lakes Interchange Project:** The Fairfax County Parkway will be widened within the existing median to six lanes — three in each direction — between I-66 and Route 50. But an interchange is also needed to handle the congestion and rush-hour backups. And now, the funding has finally come through to build this project that's been on the county's to-do list for years. Construction is anticipated to take about 2 1/2 years.

The signalized intersections at Fair Lakes Parkway and Monument Drive will be eliminated. And the additional lanes on the Fairfax County Parkway will improve traffic flow from south of I-66 to north of Rugby Road. A split-diamond, grade-separated interchange will have a free-flowing Fairfax County Parkway bridging over Fair Lakes Parkway and Monument Drive.

Fair Lakes Parkway will be widened to accommodate the necessary left-turn lanes for the interchange. Beginning at Fair Lakes Parkway, a multi-purpose trail is anticipated along the east side of Fairfax County Parkway with a connection to the existing trail at Rocky Run Stream Valley Park.

Project completion is slated for 2013.

❖ **Route 50 Widening West of Chantilly:** Construction began last fall to widen Route 50 from four to six lanes between Poland Road in Loudoun County and Route 28 in Chantilly. The 3.7-mile design-build project will take three years to complete.

There will be no lane closures on holidays or during rush hours, but drivers can expect lane closures overnight and mid-day. During all other times, all lanes and turn lanes will remain open.

Currently, Route 50 narrows from six lanes to four just west of Route 28 in Chantilly. But increased development and congestion in Loudoun County creates backups during much of the day on the existing four-lane segment, especially during morning and evening rush hours.

When completed, traffic-clogged Route 50 will have three lanes in each direction, improved turn lanes and traffic signals, curb and gutter on the outside lanes, crosswalks and pedestrian signals, widened and upgraded bridges, and pathways on both sides of the road. The road will also be more level and provide wider buffers between travel lanes and roadside hazards.

The \$100 million improvement project includes

\$8.3 million for preliminary engineering; \$24.5 million, right-of-way acquisition; \$9.9 million, utility relocation; and \$57.2 million, construction. Shirley Contracting is the contractor for this project. It should be done in early 2014 and should then be able to handle increased traffic demands for many years to come.

❖ **Route 29 Bridge Replacement:** VDOT plans to replace the Route 29 bridge over the Little Rocky Run stream in Centreville. Besides improving the bridge, itself, the project will also result in a new sidewalk and shared-use path. The new bridge will go from .2 miles east of Pickwick Road to Union Mill Road and will be just under a half-mile long.

The existing bridge is 22 feet long, was built in 1932 and is structurally deficient. It's not unsafe, but requires an increasing amount of monitoring and maintenance. It'll be brought up to state standards by lengthening it to 150 feet and elevating it some 3

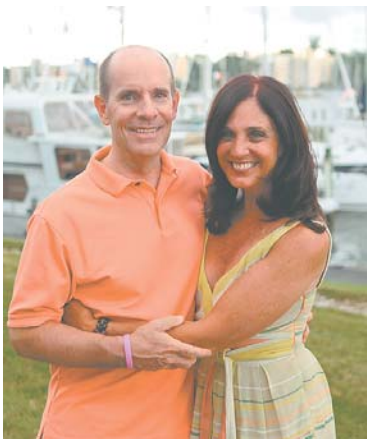

**W**elcome to Fairfax County! One of the primary reasons you chose to live here may be the excellent reputation of Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS). As chairman of the Fairfax County School Board, I am pleased to inform you that our reputation as one of the best public school systems in the country is well deserved.

FCPS is the largest school division in Virginia and the 11th largest in the United States out of more than 15,000 school divisions. The organizational structure of FCPS is focused on meeting the needs of more than 180,000 students while managing 196 schools and centers.

The Fairfax County School Board sets general school policy and, within the framework of state regulations, establishes guidelines and rules that will ensure the proper administration of the county school program. The Division Superintendent works closely with the deputy superintendent and the assistant superintendents who oversee the day-to-day operations of the schools. As a world-class school system, FCPS inspires, enables, and empowers students to meet high academic standards, lead ethical lives, and demonstrate responsible citizenship.

Despite the economic challenges our school system has faced over the past four years, our students have continued to succeed at the highest levels. Our commitment to the achievement of all students is reflected in our students' SAT scores; FCPS' SAT average of 1654 exceeds both the state average of 1516 and the national average of 1500. For the 2010-11 school year, FCPS' pass rates for the Virginia Standards of Learning assessments were 93 percent in English and 92 percent in mathematics, and the achievement gap continued to narrow in reading for Black students and in mathematics for Hispanic students. About 92 percent of FCPS graduates plan to continue on to postsecondary education. In the

# Federal Judge Vacates Murder and Drug Convictions

in 2010, after Wolfe's first appeal and during contentious discovery proceedings," wrote King. "During the Nov. 12, 2010 evidentiary hearing, Barber recanted his trial testimony while under oath."

At that time, Barber said the police, prosecutors and even his own attorney had influenced what he said to implicate Wolfe in a murder-for-hire scheme. King noted that Barber also had the following exchange with the commonwealth's lawyer during cross-examination:

Lawyer: "Wasn't their statement to you that they wanted the truth?"

Barber: "They said they wanted the truth. But at the same time, they said this is what you have got to say or you are getting the chair."

Explaining his actions, Ebert told the court that his office doesn't have an "open-file policy," providing criminal defense attorneys access to entire case files against their clients. But, wrote King, "The Newsome report is material because it reflects that Barber had a motive to misrep-

resent the facts regarding Petrole's death."

Furthermore, he wrote, "Wolfe had to labor for years from death row to obtain evidence that had been tenaciously concealed by the commonwealth and that the prosecution should have disclosed prior to Wolfe's capital murder trial."

King also stated that, whatever evidence exists of Wolfe's alleged drug-dealing is "inevitably tainted by the prosecutorial misconduct in this case. The conduct of the prosecution in concealing the Newsome report undermines confidence in the fair-


ness and propriety of the entire trial, including the drug-conspiracy conviction, rendering that misconduct a sufficient independent basis for vacating each of Wolfe's convictions and ordering his unconditional release or retrial."

Afterward, Wolfe's attorney, Ashley Parrish, said he's hopeful that Virginia will "stop pursuing this wrongful conviction and allow Justin to return home to his family." Wolfe's mother said her heart goes out to Petrole's family and she's "grateful to the courts for doing justice in Justin's case."

# How To Register, Vote and Vote Early

Election Day is Nov. 6, but you can vote as early as Sept. 21.

**W**hy does it matter? How important is it for Virginia voters to turn out on or before Nov. 6? As a critical “battleground” state, Virginia will be key in determining who will be the next President of the United States. Who will represent Virginia in the U.S. Senate is also too close to call. Since polling shows that there are very few undecided voters in the Commonwealth, every eligible voter will want to be sure to cast a ballot.

This area has very high rates of voter registration. Consider that Fairfax County, with a population of just more than 1.1 million people, has 711,817 registered voters. And 24 percent of Fairfax County’s population is under 18, so not eligible to vote.

Arlington has a population of about 216,000 and 157,236 registered voters. Sixteen percent are under 18.

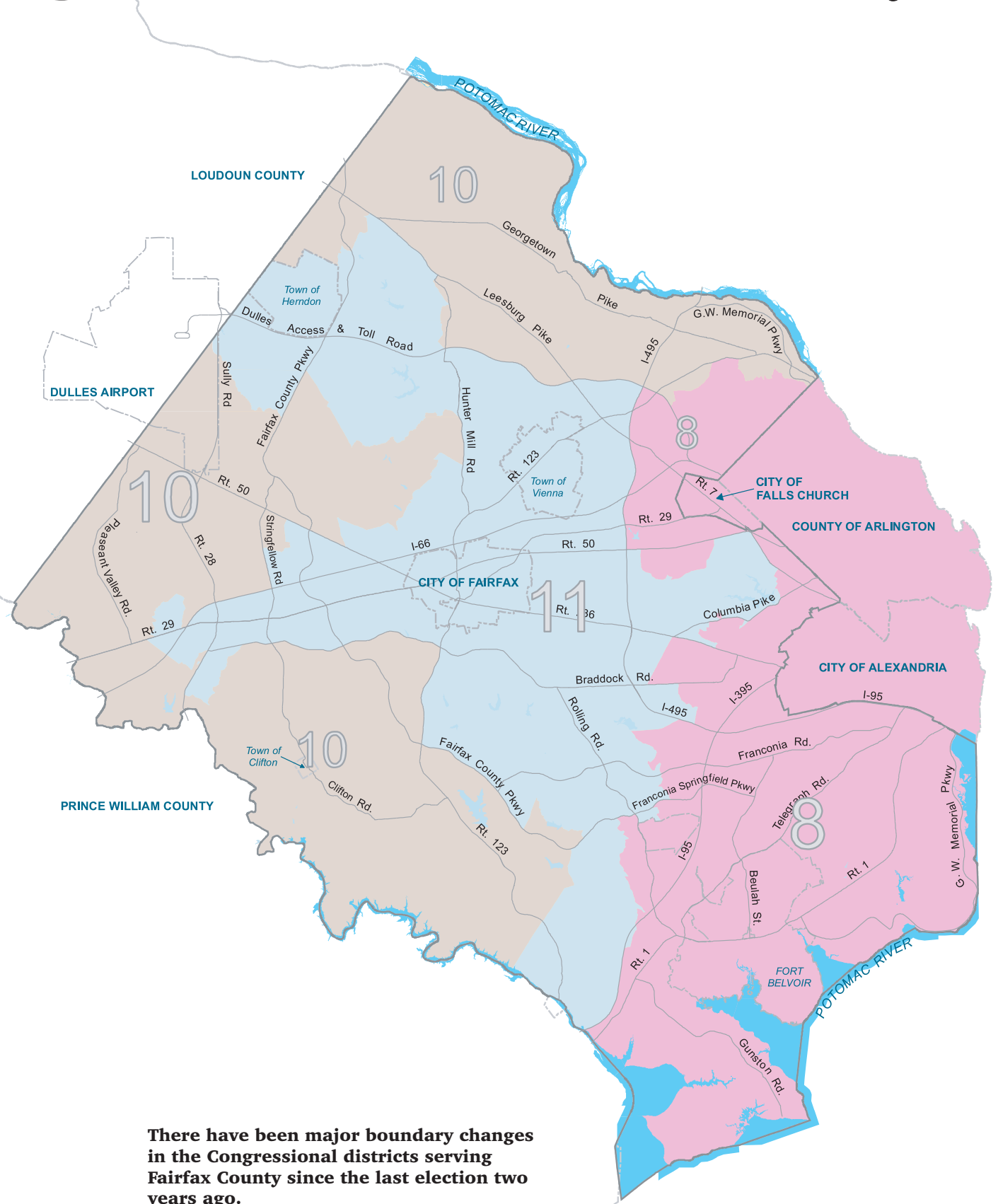
The City of Alexandria has a population of about 144,000 with 101,887 registered voters; 17 percent are under 18.

**REGISTER, CHANGE OF ADDRESS:** In order to vote on Election Day, you must be registered at your current address no later than Oct. 15, 2012. You can check your registration status online by going to [www.sbe.virginia.gov](http://www.sbe.virginia.gov). There you can also download a voter registration form and mail it to the elections office address, listed above.

**Voter ID:** New laws also affect what identification voters must bring with them to the polling place. Acceptable forms of identification include: Virginia voter identification card; valid Virginia driver’s license; military ID; any Federal, Virginia state or local government-issued ID; employer issued photo ID card; concealed handgun permit; valid student ID issued by any institution of higher education located in the Commonwealth of Virginia; current utility bill, bank statement, government check or paycheck indicating the name and address of the voter.

Voters arriving to the polls without ID will be required to vote a provisional ballot and will have until noon on the Friday after the election to deliver a copy of identification to their locality’s electoral board in order for their provisional ballot to be counted.

All Virginia active registered voters will be mailed a new Virginia voter identification card prior to the November 2012 General Election. Call 804-864-8901 or toll free 800-552-9745, TTY toll free: 800-260-3466. According to the State Board of Elections at presstime, some of the voter identification requirements listed are pending

preclearance from the Department of Justice.

## VOTING EARLY, ABSENTEE

Virtually every voter in Virginia is eligible to vote absentee, which includes voting in-person absentee at a variety of locations between Sept. 21 and Nov. 2.

There are many reasons that voters are allowed to vote absentee, but the most

broad of these applies to almost anyone with a job: “Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 11 or more hours of the 13 that the polls are open (6 a.m. to 7 p.m.).”

Virginia Tech in which Westfield graduates Reema Samaha and Erin Peterson lost their lives. "We were all torn up by losing them," said Frey. "I went to the first prayer vigil for them at Centreville Presbyterian Church, and dozens of police officers were there because of the support the Westfield students had given them."

On a lighter note, when asked which view of Centreville he likes best, he said his favorite spot is coming south on Route 29 by the CVS store at Pickwick Road. "On a clear day, you can see the Shenandoah foothills — that's the vista I always love," said Frey. "And that's why there was a fort

there during the Civil War, because it was the highest point."

Although Centreville doesn't actually have a town center or main gathering place, he has hopes that the Trinity Centre might someday fill the bill. "More office buildings will eventually come to Trinity Centre to completely ring the lake," he said. "That will open up more public spaces there once the walkway around the lake is completed."

Then, said Frey, that area can serve as much more of a public center and focal point than it is now. "It currently has Movies under the Stars in August," he said. "But one day, it could be a draw for community events such as picnics, fund-raisers and concerts."

feet higher than it is now.

The bridge will be built six lanes wide to accommodate future traffic, but will initially be striped for four lanes. A 16-foot-wide, raised, grass, median strip will separate north- and southbound lanes. Each outer lane will be 15-feet wide, with the outermost three feet earmarked for bicycle riders.

On the bridge's south side, a path will connect to existing trails. The north side will have a 5-foot-wide sidewalk connecting to the Faircrest community and existing sidewalks. Estimated cost is \$14.5 million and the project is fully funded. Anticipated completion is fall 2015.

❖ **Walney Road Bridge:** Built in 1980, the

Walney Road Bridge over Flatlick Branch in Chantilly carries more than 21,000 vehicles a day. Trouble is, it often floods, is disintegrating structurally and surpassed its life expectancy 15 years ago. So VDOT plans to replace it with a wider, sturdier and safer bridge.

It's about 500 feet from the Walney Road/Westfields Boulevard intersection. Walney will be four-laned to Willard Road. And the downhill curve on north-south Walney will be smoothed out significantly to make it descend gradually.

The road will also be raised 10 feet higher in the area where it currently dips down as drivers leave the bridge, for better sight distance. Anticipated cost is approximately \$7 million. Construction is expected to begin in summer 2014 and end in summer 2015.

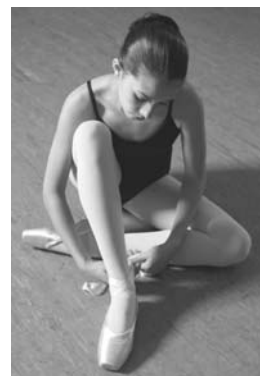

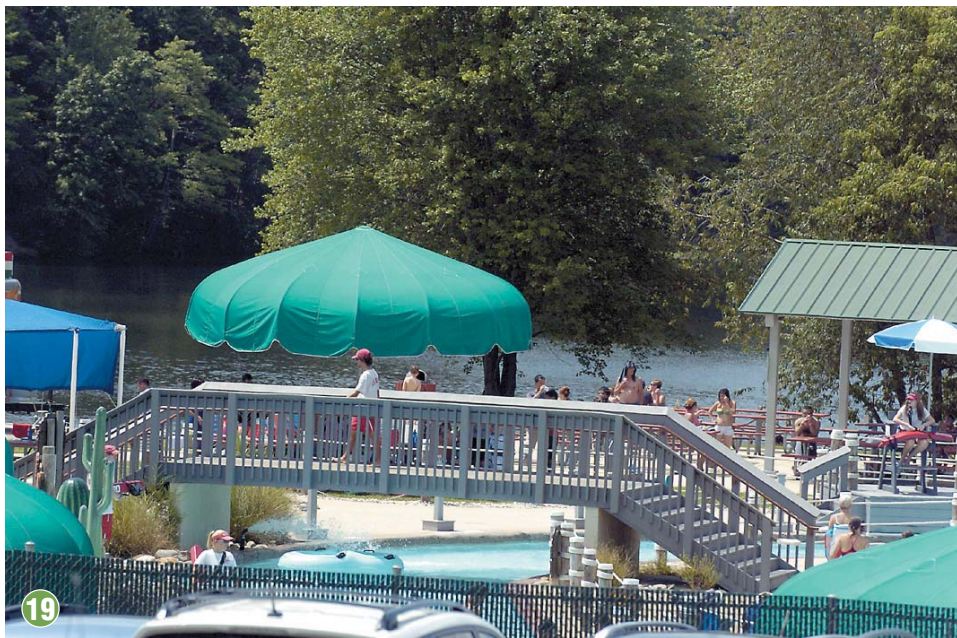

## ‘My Favorite Parks’

The tree I am standing next to in this photo is one of a number of large American Beech trees that populate the forests in Villa Park where I like to hike and jog. Villa Park is located in the central Fairfax area, with an entrance into the park off of Park Drive near Shirley Gate Road.

This park is unique. It has been left in its natural wooded condition and designated a Heritage Resource park to preserve features such as Native American quarries and work/chipping areas. It also contains remnants of the never-completed Independent line of the Manassas Gap Railroad. While no track was ever laid along this rail line, it played a significant role in the Civil War, serving as a little-known transportation route for both Confederate and Union soldiers. The earthworks served as protection during skirmishes.

A number of years ago a Civil War historian told me that he believed soldiers had carved their initials into trees located in Villa Park. The trees near my running path are covered with initials and symbols carved into the smooth grey bark. On the larger trees, the markings have become pretty much unreadable. I don't know if it's true or not, but I like to think these may be the trees my history buff friend was referring to.

When running along this trail, I imagine passing Native American Indians chipping arrow heads out of hunks of quartz and Civil War camp sites with soldiers drawing water from the Popes Head Creek and passing time by carving their initials or troop insignia in the smooth-barked Beech trees growing nearby. The experience is a perfect marriage of my love for history and nature.

Some other favorite Fairfax parks that

interpret our county's fascinating history and showcase its environmental beauty:

❖ Riverbend Park in Great Falls, includes more than 400 acres of forest, meadow and ponds. Trails include a 2.5-mile portion of the Potomac Heritage Trail linking national and regional parkland. Kayakers and canoeists can enjoy exploring many islands in the Potomac River.

Riverbend's visitor center overlooks the Potomac River and has an outdoor deck that is an ideal place to relax or have a snack after a hike. It has a wonderful interpretative display about the historic Native American presence in the area.

❖ In the South County Hybla Valley area, Huntley Meadows Park contains 1,425 acres of majestic forests, wildflower-speckled meadows and vast wetlands bursting with life. Some of the best wildlife watching in the Washington metropolitan area is enjoyed here. From the wetland boardwalk trail and observation tower, people have excellent views of beavers, frogs, dragonflies and herons. Huntley Meadows is well known as a prime birding spot, with more than 200 species identified in the park.

❖ Lake Accotink Park, located on 7500 Accotink Park Road in Springfield, is one of my favorite parks. Not only is this 493-acre park one of the most scenic in the county, it is also one of the most fun. In addition to boating, hiking, canoeing, and mini-golfing, you can always find a nice quiet spot to enjoy a picnic on the lake. Children love the beautiful antique carousel.

Lake Accotink was originally created to provide drinking water for troops stationed at Camp Humphries (which is now Fort Belvoir) during the early 1900s. The Norfolk Southern Railroad tracks carry D.C.-bound VRE commuter rail passengers over the Lake Accotink Dam. Remains of an older former railroad trestle make up part of the four-mile trail that winds around the lake and park.

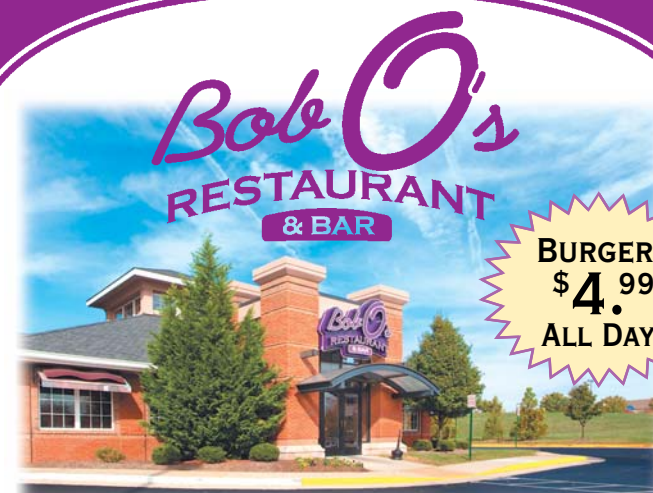

### WHAT'S ON THE BALLOT?

Every voter in Virginia will vote for U.S. senator and their member in the U.S. House of Representatives, in addition to President of the United States and two constitutional questions.

For Senate, Tim Kaine (D), former governor will face George Allen (R), also former governor and former U.S. senator, to replace U.S. Sen. Jim Webb (D) who is retiring from the Senate after a single term. Webb defeated George Allen six years ago. Connection coverage of the U.S. Senate race is available at <http://www.connectionnewspapers.com/news/Election/National/Senate/>

Two constitutional questions will appear

on all Virginia ballots, one about the use of eminent domain and one about the timing of a particular session of the General Assembly to consider overriding vetoes by the governor of legislation that was passed by the assembly. See <http://www.sbe.virginia.gov/webdocs/201211ConstitutionalAmendmentsPoster.pdf>.

In the races for U.S. House of Representatives, it's worth noting that redistricting resulted in significant changes in Northern Virginia in terms of who your U.S. representative will be. If you live in Reston, for example, while last election you were represented by Jim Moran and the 8th district, now you are in the 11th district where the incumbent is Gerry Connolly. See the map for details. Fairfax County is represented by three Congressional Districts, 8, 10 and 11. Connection coverage of congressional races is available at <http://www.connectionnewspapers.com/news/Election/National/Representatives>.

In the 8th District, incumbent Rep. Jim Moran (D), seeking his 12th term since being elected in 1990, will face Patrick Murray (R), and two independent candidates, Janet Murphy and Jason Howell. The 8th district includes all of Alexandria and Arlington, plus parts of Fairfax County including Mount Vernon, Lorton and parts of McLean, Tysons and Falls Church.

In the 10th District, Frank Wolf (R), elected to office in 1982, will face Democrat Kristin A. Cabral and independent J. Kevin Chisholm. The 10th district sprawls from McLean to Winchester, and includes Great Falls, Chantilly, parts of Fairfax Station, the Town of Clifton, part of Burke and Springfield.

In the 11th District, Gerry Connolly (D), former chairman of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, elected to Congress in 2008, will face Republican Chris Perkins and Independents Joe Galdo and Peter M. Marchetti. The 10th district now includes the City of Fairfax, the Town of Herndon, Reston, central Fairfax County including parts of Burke, Springfield and Lorton.

**IN FAIRFAX COUNTY**, voters will also decide whether to invest in infrastructure based on four bond questions, answering yes or no to supporting \$75 million for parks, \$55 million for public safety facilities, \$25 million for library facilities and \$30 million for stormwater and sewer improvements. **IN THE CITY OF ALEXANDRIA**, voters will also choose a mayor, members of the city council and school board.

The Alexandria City Council is composed of a Mayor and six Council members who are elected at-large for three-year terms. Incumbent mayor Bill Euille (D) will face Andrew H. Macdonald (I) in the race for mayor.

Voters will choose six City Council members from the list of 12: Frank H. Fannon IV (R)\*, Alicia R. Hughes (R)\*, John R. "Bob" Wood (R), John Taylor Chapman (D), Timothy Lovain (D), Del Pepper \*(D), Allison Silberberg (D), Paul C. Smedberg❖ (D), Justin M. Wilson (D), Glenda B. Davis (I), Robert Krause (L), Jermaine A. Mincey (I). ❖ means incumbent.

The Alexandria City School Board is a nine-member elected body that adopts policy for the daily operation of schools and sees that school laws are properly explained, enforced, and observed. The city is divided into three voting districts, and three Board members are elected from each district. Each member serves a three-year term. Incumbents marked \*.

School Board District A: Stephanie Amann Kapsis, William E. "Bill" Campbell\*, Karen A. Graf, Helen F. Morris\*, Joyce D. Rawlings, Heath E. Wells

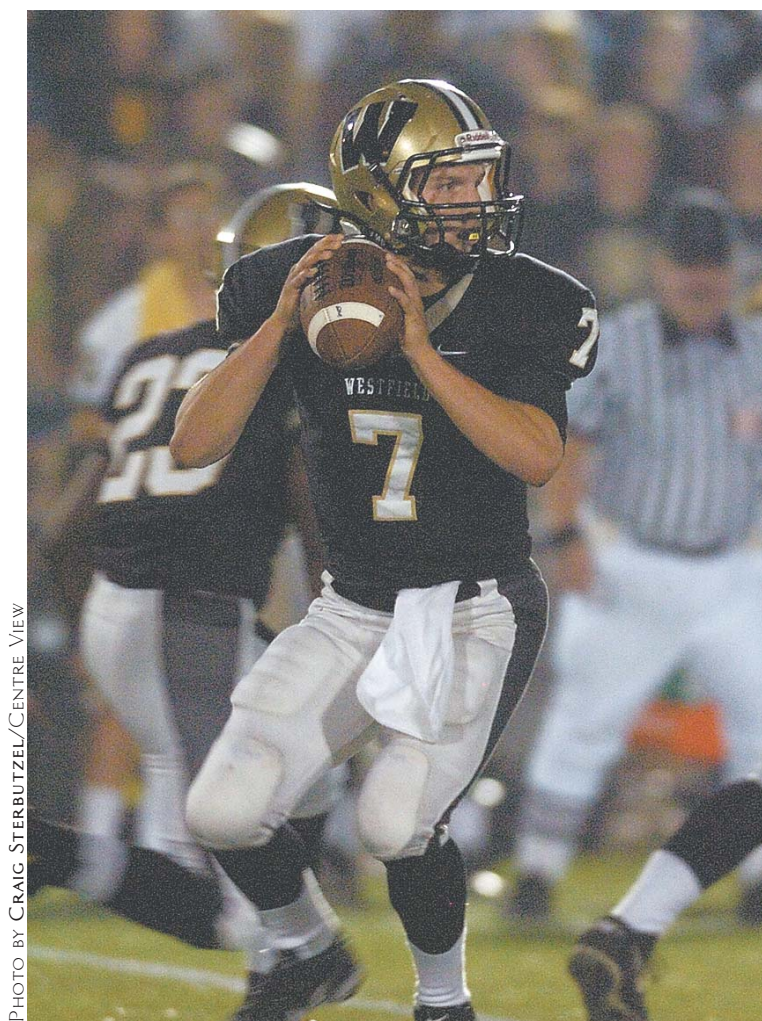

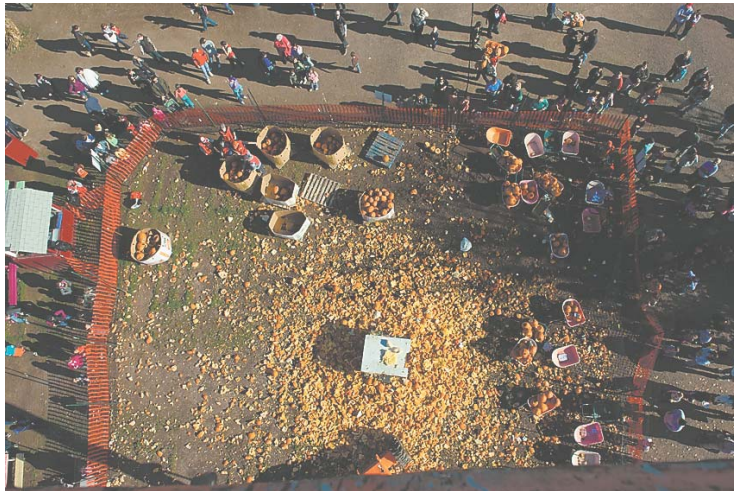

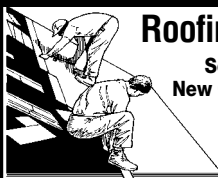
