

Budgeting in Twilight Zone

Local governments propose tax hikes in advance of looming sequester.

ocal governments across
Northern Virginia are considering tax increases as
leaders face budget shortfalls and
an uncertain future in the face of
national financial gridlock in
Washington, D.C. Arlington
County homeowners are facing the
largest possible tax bill, although
Fairfax County residents may see
the largest increase compared to
last year.

"Local governments are in the Twilight Zone with Rod Serling," said Frank Shafroth, director of the Center for State and Local Government Leadership at George Mason University. "Nobody knows exactly what the impact of the sequester will be, so all the local governments have to assume a worst-case scenario."

Looming over the budget deliberations this year is the threat of the sequester, a set of automatic spending cuts created by the Budget Control Act of 2011. The cuts were designed to be so unpalatable that Democrats and Republicans would find a compromise, but that agreement failed to materialize in time. That leaves state and local governments scrambling to balance their budgets in uncharted waters. Some have even predicted the cuts might cast Virginia into a recession because of the prominent role defense spending and federal workers play in the economy of Northern Virginia.

"Virginia will be particularly hard hit because of our proximity to Washington, D.C., and our status as home to more military installations and private-sector military partners than almost any other state," said Virginia Gov. Bob McDonnell in a written statement. "Multiple studies show that approximately 130,000 to over 200,000 Virginia jobs could be lost because of these arbitrary cuts."

ACROSS NORTHERN VIR-GINIA, local governments are facing more of a burden than state leaders. According to a George Mason University study, 82 percent of funding provided to state governments is exempt from the



State Budget Advances on Medicaid

ast week, I wrote about the transportation legislation that passed the General Assembly. The other major policy change this session was the expansion of Medicaid. This was especially critical for the 44th District.

Medicaid is a federal-state health

insurance program for low-income and disabled people. It is also the only provider of long-term nursing care for many Americans, since Medicare coverage and coverage by most private insurance policies is quite limited. Virginia has one of the most restrictive Medicaid programs in the United States — you have to be very poor to be eligible. Most rankings put Virginia at 48th in Medicaid expenditures and 7th in per capita income. In other words, we are a relatively wealthy state and we do not help the poor much.

The 44th District has the largest uninsured population and the largest Medicaid population in Fairfax County. Over 9,000 children in our community receive their healthcare from Medicaid. That is equal to one in three children in the 44th District and 15 percent of all residents of the 44th District. Approximately 70 percent of uninsured Virginians are employed and only 37 percent of small businesses (less than 50 employees) provide employee health insurance benefits. Approximately, 5.6

percent of the uninsured or 56,000 people are Virginia veterans and their family members.

Virginia already spends millions indirectly on uninsured care including about \$100 million per year subsidizing uninsured care at state hospitals, \$515 million per year in char-

ity care at hospitals, and about \$300 million per year is provided at free clinics and through charities. Most analyses conclude that about 10 percent of private health insurance cost is for uninsured individuals.

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (aka Obamacare) allowed each state to expand Medicaid with the federal government picking up between 90-100 percent of the cost over an eight-year period. The actual cost to Virginia taxpayers is largely neutral due to the elimination of uninsured care, charity care, reduced demand for free clinics, and uninsured care paid by private insurance.

The analyses prepared by Senate Finance staff also found that the Virginia Medicaid expansion would create 33,000 Virginia jobs. Coverage for preventative care would also reduce overall system expenditures as people will get help before they become too sick.

Most states have agreed to expand Medicaid after analyzing the consequences and rather than seeing their federal tax dollars go

to other states. Recently, even Republican Governors Christie (N.J.), Kasich (Ohio), and Rick Scott (Fla.) have moved forward. At the beginning of the session, Governor McDonnell opposed expansion. In the last few days of session, he moderated his position, but a large contingent of downstate legislators continued to oppose the expansion.

The compromise struck on the last day created a panel of 10 Virginia legislators who are tasked with certifying that the federal government has agreed to certain reforms — mainly the implementation of managed care in the provision of services compensated by Medicaid. Upon the panel's certification, the Governor would be required to proceed with expansion.

Attorney General Cuccinelli issued an opinion that this system is unconstitutional, but he issued the opinion without reading the actual bill. This issue will be litigated.

I voted for the final state budget largely due to the inclusion of this language in the final amendments. I am hopeful that it will be sustained because it is absolutely critical to getting our health insurance costs under control and providing economic security to the working poor and other families in the 44th District

Next week, I will provide a third update on other measures in the state budget and other legislation that passed this session.

It is an honor to serve as your state delegate.







sequester while 73 percent of federal funds that go to local governments are subject to the sequester. That means that everything from education programs to highway funds are now in the crosshairs of the political fight across Potomac River. Local leaders will have to perform a delicate balancing act over the next few weeks.

"We have heard from residents that we should continue with current service levels and program delivery, which we maintained through the last few years of the recession by downsizing effectively and responsibly," said Fairfax County Executive Ed Long when he presented his proposed budget last week. "We are also forced to recognize the significant yet unknown impact that is expected from federal sequestration and the continuing challenges of a slowly recovering economy."

For state leaders in Richmond and local leaders in Northern Virginia, the timing and implementation of sequestration comes at a perilous time. Elected officials are now trying to figure what changes they want to make headed into the spring, when they must vote in advance of the new fiscal year opening this summer. Federal agencies are still trying to figure out how they will implement the sequester, and government employees are facing furloughs that could

strangle sales tax revenues and business profits across the region.

"We got through the recession," said Susan Scheffler, owner of Nickell's and Scheffler Fine Food in Alexandria. "But we

are already seeing sales drop because of financial crises in Washington and it's hurting our business."

FAIRFAX COUNTY

leaders are considering \$20.5 million of budget reductions, including 91 jobs. Arlington officials have singled out \$9.3 million worth of cuts, a list that includes everything from reducing services for the mentally ill to eliminating local child-care

regulation. In Alexandria, City Council members are considering a budget proposal that would cut reduce expenditures by \$13.8 million while increasing the personal property tax on motor vehicles.

"What we are hearing is that people want

to maintain the quality of life and that police officers and teachers need raises," said Alexandria Mayor Bill Euille. "I can empathize with citizens who are concerned about their taxes going up, but we have a fidu-

> ciary responsibility to considering everything and adopt a budget."

In the last decade, spending levels rose dramatically along with the real-estate market. Local governments responded by adding jobs and expanding programs. While local governments elsewhere were laying firefighters and teachers, gov-

ernments in Northern Virginia experienced record levels of spending and an all-timehigh number of employees. In the last four years, Fairfax County has added about 1,400 jobs. Arlington and Alexandria have added more than 200 jobs.

"In the last decade, they've doubled our real-estate taxes so county employees could retire at 55," said Arthur Purves, president of the Fairfax County Taxpayers Alliance. "It's unfair that our taxes should be doubled so that county employees can have better benefits than taxpayers themselves have."

IN ADDITION to the direct effects of sequestration, state and local leaders will also have to budget for the indirect influence that the cuts will have on the region. More than one million federal workers could be caught in the crunch, including food inspectors and Transportation Security Administration security personnel. In some cases, workers could be forced to take one unpaid day off each week or every two weeks through September — a 20 percent pay cut. The combined influence of all that uncertainty means 46 staff positions eliminated in Arlington. "The county has experienced significant state budget cuts since fiscal year 2009 that for the most part have not been restored," said Arlington County Manager Barbara Donnellan when she presented her proposal to the County Board last week. "Additionally, near and longer-term effects of the federal budget crisis and possible sequestration will impact direct aid to the county and will indirectly impact non-real estate tax revenue sources."



Mental Health Counseling Professors Honored

Cultural sensitivity at the heart of their work.

red Bemak and his wife Rita Chi-Ying Chung, who are both professors at George Mason University in Fairfax, recall being in Haiti shortly after the catastrophic earthquake of 2010. They were there to provide mental health counseling to those traumatized by the natural disaster.

"We were working in one of the tent camps," said Bemak who, with Chung, has been a professor of counseling and development in George Mason's College of Education and Human Development since 2000. "There were tents and each contained about 30 cots. People lived side-by-side with no privacy. There was little food and little water."

They worked with a woman who was so traumatized that she had been unable to get out of bed for three months. "The traditional response is 'let's get her off to the side and speak to her alone," said Bemak. "But that is the Western model of therapy. When you're looking at family-oriented communities, there is a tremendous need to connect with others."

As Bemak spoke with his bed-ridden patient, others began to join the session. "We started to talk to her and crowds started to gather

around her cot," he said. "It became a huge healing intervention where for the first time in three months, she got out of her cot. We had a [session] that was conducive to the community in Haiti."

Bemak and Chung's peers will salute their dedication to human rights, social justice and culturally sensitive mental health treatment later this month when they receive two of the SEE MASON PROFESSORS. PAGE 20



American Counseling Association's highest honors.

Chung will receive the Gilbert and Kathleen Wrenn Humanitarian and Caring Person Award, which Bemak was awarded in 2011, and Bemak will receive the Kitty Cole Human Rights Award, which Chung garnered last year. Additionally, Chung will receive the 2013 Outstanding Faculty Award from the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia and Dominion Resources.

"I am deeply honored that I was even considered for these awards. It is a true honor. I feel so privileged to be in this field," said Chung, who noted that her background fuels her passion for her work.

"I am a person of color and I grew up in another country," said Chung, whose parents moved from China to New Zealand after the World War II. "Being an immigrant to the United States myself, I understood the struggles and challenges of immigrants and refugees. A lot of counseling theories are based on western beliefs. Coming from an eastern background, I know that culture plays a major part in the way we react and respond to major life experiences."

Bemak worked as a counselor and also served as director of the Upward Bound Program at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, "I worked with white, African American and Latino students who were struggling academically," he said. "When they came together, for many it was the first time that they'd been around people of other races."

Bemak and Chung say cultural sensitivity and insights are often lacking in mental health care. This underscores the importance of their work with Counselors Without Borders, which Bemak founded. It provides culturally responsive humanitarian counseling after disasters. Together, they've led teams of therapists and students in providing mental health therapy along the Mississippi Gulf Coast after Hurricane Katrina, and on American Indian reservations and in Latino migrant communities after the San Diego wildfires.

"The two of them have traveled to more than 55 countries, together and individually, where they have worked with at-risk youth, immigrants and refugees; counseled child-trafficking and post-disaster victims; and guided students of color and former child soldiers," said Catherine Probst, a spokeswoman for George Mason University.

The couple also co-authored "Social Justice Counseling: The Next Steps Beyond Multiculturalism" last year.

"We both do the work because we want to give back," said Chung. "We're trying to instill in the next generation of counselors to give back. I am not working to be recognized, but I hope this will inspire people to do the work because there is so much need out there."






