ven as federal regulators look into a civil-rights complaint about the lack of diversity at Thomas Jefferson School for Science and Technology, recently released demographics show that the number of black and Latino students is dropping. According to a report released last week by Fairfax

County Public Schools, 8 percent of students who apply are Hispanic while only 3 percent of those who are accepted are Hispanic. And even though 6 percent of students who apply are black, only 1 percent of the class of 2017 is black.

"It's almost an act of arrogant defiance in the face of the complaint," said Tina Hone, former Fairfax County School Board member who helped file the complaint with the U.S.

Department of Education. "They haven't done anything meaningful to address any of the concerns in the complaint."

Last summer, Hone worked with a group known as Coalition of The

Silence to file a formal complaint with federal authorities. In September, officials with the Department of Education announced they would be launching a formal investigation into allegations that "In essence, Fairfax County operates a separate and unequal subschool system within its overarching taxpayer-funded public school system," the complaint charges. "The enormous racial and ethnic disparities evident in TJ

a d m i s s i o n s numbers and in eligibility decisions for Level 4 Advanced Academic Programs reflect clear violations of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and must not be allowed to stand."

IN A WRIT-TEN response to questions, Fairfax County Public Schools s p o k e s m a n John Torre said he could not comment on the specifics of the complaint. But he said the Fairfax County School Board

takes the issue "very seriously," and that school officials are looking for ways to address the "persistent gap in admission rates."

fiancée Elizabeth (Nikki Amico), his experiment yields success and unexpected consequences.



Picking Up 474 Bags of Trash

Friends of Little Hunting Creek help clean up local waterway.

or the 11th year, Friends of Little Hunting Creek, led by its president Betsy Martin, and a group of 191 volunteers, picked up 474 bags of trash and recyclables, 43 tires, 19 shopping carts and other items such as sofas, traffic cones, air conditioner, bed springs, bike, kitchen sink, and more.

The Friends were part of the annual Potomac Watershed Cleanup on April 6 sponsored by the Alice Ferguson Foundation. Cleanup site activities took place at 14 local sites, including three managed by Del. Scott Surovell.

Some volunteers worked from boats, others on the shore, and still others worked in the marshes where large amounts of trash get trapped.

"In the tidal downstream portion of the creek you can really see the difference," said Martin. "Right now the creek is really looking beautiful. Unfortunately, it won't stay that way. The litter and trash just keep coming because people continue keep littering and dumping. It is truly a shame that people feel they can trash their community and their environment — and they expect that volunteers will just keep picking up after them. A better solution would be to educate people, enforce the litter laws, and create incentives to change behavior and prevent littering in the first place."

What incentives would help prevent the littering? Martin responded: "I personally believe that a beverage container deposit law would be very helpful. People would be less likely to toss a can if they could instead get cash for it. And if they did toss it there would be an incentive for someone else to retrieve it and turn it in for a cash deposit. Studies show that beverage container deposit laws reduce the amount of bottle and can litter. A plastic bag fee would also be very helpful. We pick up hundreds and thousands of plastic bags." Volunteers who participated in the cleanup effort included: Girl Scout Brownie Troop 922; Brownie Troop 3551; Cadette Girl Scout Troop 1813; Cub Scout Den 888; Junior Girl Scout Troop

Value-added Evaluation?

TJ admissions illustrate growing gap between "haves" and "have-nots."

ore than 181,000 students attend Fairfax County Public Schools. So why do the 480 students who were accepted for next year's freshman class at Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology seem so important?

Fairfax County Public Schools have a single elite magnet school, Thomas Jefferson, and TJ is frequently referred to as the top high school in the country. Dramatic disparity in the makeup of admissions at TJ is an indicator of disparity in early identi-

fication of students as gifted and talented, of access to advanced classes and enrichment, and in the basic education that the Fairfax County Public school system offers to all of its students.

- ❖ Fully 25 percent of students in Fairfax County Public Schools are poor enough to qualify for subsidized meals. Less than one percent of the incoming class at TJ is similarly economically disadvantaged.
- ❖ White students will make up just 25 percent of the incoming freshman class at Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology; 43 percent of FCPS students overall are white.

❖ Asian students will make up 66 percent of the incoming freshman class at TJ; 19 percent of FCPS students overall are Asian.

❖ Hispanic students will make up just 3.1 percent of the incoming freshman class at TJ; 22 percent of FCPS students overall are Hispanic.

❖ Black students will make up just one percent of the incoming freshman class at TJ; 10 percent of FCPS students overall are African American.

The local chapter of the NAACP and a group called Coalition of the Silence, led by former school board member Tina Hone, last year filed a civil rights complaint with the Justice Department alleging that FCPS is essentially running "separate-but-unequal" schools systems.

> In a statement this month, Hone recently said there is "stark underrepresentation of Black and Latino students at the elementary and

gible to receive instruction at a Gifted and Talented and/or Advanced Academic Program center. ... Because so few Black or Latino students (or poor students) receive instruction through these centers and because the instruction in these centers is so robust, the pipeline of talented Black, Latino and poor students who are able to compete successfully for admission to TJ is choked."

(the sample size is too small for that) FCPS could rightly be evaluated on the value added.

Are its top performing schools really based on the value that relatively wealthy families are able to devote to their children's education? Books, computers, tablets and more at home, enrichment programs and camps, tutors, and attention from well educated parents are the main ingredients to FCPS success.

Perhaps it is best to measure the value added by FCPS based on the performance of its poorest students, the 25 percent who qualify for subsidized meals, and who bring the smallest resources from home to the table.

The School Board has named a new superintendent, pending some final details. She is Dr. Karen Garza, currently superintendent of the Lubbock Independent School District, which serves approximately 30,000 students in Lubbock, Texas.

Before that she served as the chief academic officer of the Houston Independent School District, the seventh largest school district in the country with more than 200,000 students. She faces tremendous opportunity here in Northern Virginia.

supports those responsibilities in an effective and personal way. MVTP volunteers assist in medical and mechanical emergencies, educate trail users of proper trail safety rules and etiquette, and inform park rangers of trail conditions and incidents, provide services at outdoor races and events. I have greatly enjoyed my time with the volunteers and never cease to be amazed how dedicated and diligent this diverse group of Trail Patrollers are."

Describing the Mount Vernon Trail Patrol's geographic area, Gamble said, "The MVTP trail runs 18.5 miles beginning at the Mount Vernon parking lot adjacent to the George Washington estate circle drive in the southern end of the Mount Vernon parkway, extends north along the Potomac river, includes a 1.5 mile loop at Fort Hunt Park, and continues north to Theodore Roosevelt Island on the Potomac river across from the District of Columbia. This multi use trail is visited by over 1 million users annually, and is one of the most used trails in the U.S. It was originally built in 1973 and paved in 1975."

There are currently 20 volunteers in the program.

"We provide training on the job through a mentoring program," Gamble said. "Trail volunteers must take a walk or bike ride with the Ranger Trail Patrol Coordinator two times before they are authorized to serve. Guidelines in a handbook and training manual are also issued. Vests or jackets and first aid kits are provided by the NPS and paid for through our volunteer account. Individual volunteers use their own bikes. We have supplied bike repair kits and other items on request."

Trail Patrol Volunteer Reports

Trail Patrol volunteers are required to call Ranger's or Park Police when they encounter incidents that need immediate attention. They are also required to send two written reports a month on their observations and concerns to the Park Ranger Coordinator. Excerpts of past patroller reports in-

- ❖ "One of the runners I just spoke with had just tripped and fallen on bridge #23" ... "she was not seriously hurt" "she said she tripped on a loose rotten board or one of the nails protruding" ... "getting bridge #23 repaired needs to become a priority before someone gets seriously hurt."
- * "Lots of bikers with no helmet" "one lady suffering mild heat exhaustion and looking for a store" ... "I gave her a bottle of water."
- * "I came across an unsavory character who kept shouting obscenities at me and everyone else" "I called Park police" ... "obviously mentally ill" ... "police warned him that he was being watched."
- * "Rider voiced concern that more bikers on the trail were going dangerously fast and endanger other riders when speeding around tight corners' ... "told him trail patrollers aware of this and encouraging bikers to obey rules of the trail."
- * "I came across a 49-year-old male laying on the side of the trail just north of Morningside drive exhausted and sweating profusely" "applied ice pack to his neck" "when he did not improve I called NPS police to dispatch emergency service.'
- * "Reminded kids/parents about wearing helmets" "helped with one flat."
- * "One pet off leash; 2 requests for directions; 4 cyclists speeding; 1 cyclist stopped from preparing to run a red light with vehicle approaching" ... "trail very crowded" "great day out."

untruthfully - that their hands are tied because of the complaint," said Hone. "Their hands are not tied by the complaint. If they make a bona fide effort to fix this problem, no one is going to excoriate them for this."

Torre responded that the admissions policy at the school, known as simply as T.J., has been debated and modified several times to address the diversity issue. And yet even though the division wants to promote diversity, Torre said, the district also wants to maintain the rigor and standards that foster a challenging learning environment focused on math, science and technology.

"This is not a problem that is confined to Fairfax County," said Torre in an email response to Hone's comments. "The underrepresentation of students from culturally and ethnically diverse socioeconomic status backgrounds in gifted and talented programs across the United States is one of the most critical problems facing public and other kids not to have access."

THE DEMOGRAPHICS show that 10 percent of the students who apply to the governor's school live in poverty. And yet only 1 percent of the those accepted qualify for free or reduced lunch.

Asians and whites are more likely to be accepted than blacks or Hispanics. Chantilly, Yorktown, Langley, Westfield, Washington-Lee and Herndon each received votes.


West Potomac Boys' Soccer Falls to TC

Countdown to College Decision Day

Local college counselors offer advice on making the right choice.

arta Daniels recalls the day when her son Will received his first college acceptance letter.

"He was thrilled," she said. "It was a huge relief to know that he had been accepted somewhere."

But elation soon turned to stress when Will learned that he'd been accepted into all five schools to which he'd applied. "We went from being relieved that he would be going off to college next fall to panicking over whether or not we would choose the best school for Will," said Daniels.

As the May 1 national college decision day looms, the day students must shell out hefty deposits to secure their spots at colleges and universities, students like Daniels are feeling pressure. Most college counselors agree that it's important to make sure the school is a good fit for the student academically, financially and socially, and local counselors share ideas for making the decision less daunting.

They urge students to do a thoughtful assessment of who they are and what they need to thrive in an academic environment. "From community college to the ivy leagues, every school has success stories," said Mike Canfield, director for undergraduate admissions at Marymount University in Arlington. "You can be successful at any school if it is the right one."

Brie Jeweler-Bentz, Psy.D., a psychologist at The School Counseling Group encourages students to ask, "Where to I want to be geographically? Do I need a large campus or a school with an urban campus? Will I go crazy in a small town? Do I want to paint my face and cheer on my Division I sports team?" The school's political and religious climates matter, she said, as does the local weather.

She also stressed that a school must be a

good fit both socially academically. "A big rah-rah school is great, but academically will the student get lost in a big lecture hall with 400 other students?"

Michael Carter, Ph.D., director of college counseling at St. Stephen's & St. Agnes School in Alexandria, said that fit and balance also matter. "Does the student mesh with the school's programs academically and extracurricularly? Is there a good blend academically, socially and extracurricularly so that the student can have balance?"

One way to answer these questions is to spend time on campus. "Sit in the cafeteria, have lunch and look around at the students," said Jeweler-Bentz. "How do the students dress and talk? Do they have piercings, tattoos and nose rings? Does the school click for you? Does it feel like home?"

Randy Tajan, director of college counseling at St. Andrew's Episcopal School in Potomac, Md., said students should look at colleges through a new lens, that of admitted student. "What is student life like? What about access to professors? Can you be a student and an active citizen? They should think about again why they applied to those schools originally."

A school's atmosphere should not be underestimated, said some counselors.

"Given that our environment often affects us, for better or worse, is this school a good fit for my goals and values?" asked Michael Hude, college counselor at The Heights School in Potomac, Md. He said that students should also ask, "Does it foster an environment that will facilitate the type of growth I'd like both to experience [in college] and take with me for the rest of my life?"

Hude said that the cost of the school is an important consideration: "Will I be going into debt? Does the quality of the education and the school's reputation justify the expense and debt?"

Meg Mayo, director of college counseling at Connelly School of the Holy Child in Potomac, Md., agrees. "I think any type of scholarship money if awarded should play into a decision," she said. "I really worry about kids coming out of college loaded down with debt and not finding work right away."

Jeweler-Bentz adds the prospective students should take a look at those who have graduated from the institution. "Some schools have amazing [alumni] networks that can hook graduates up

with job opportunities," she said. "It's also important to look at statistics on job and graduate school placement to see how good of a job particular colleges do with their students post-graduation."

Canfield said that once a student has selected a school, the next step is to connect. "Plan for orientation," he said. "Learn the process for registration. Check out the school's fan page on Facebook. Some schools host invitation-only closed social media sites."

Students should also start planning for life on campus. "What [activities are] they going to join when they get to campus? Students who are involved in campus activities or have a job on campus that is limited to 10 hours a week are significantly happier and do better in their classes than their counterparts who have neither," said Canfield.




