Foundation Honors Ned Stone

ount Vernon-area environmental steward Ned Stone, along with six others, was presented with the 8th Annual Alice Ferguson Foundation Award at the "Trash Summit." The summit is a forum where elected officials, government agencies and non-governmental organizations and others gather to discuss efforts to reduce litter and waste in the Potomac Watershed.

Stone, vice president of the Friends of Dyke Marsh, has for several years led cleanups, conducted educational workshops, and carried out cleanups of trash on land and on the water.

Glenda Booth, president of the Friends of Dyke Marsh, said, "Ned Stone is a tireless, devoted stew-



Restoring 'Hellhole Swamp'

Dyke Marsh to be part of \$25 million wetlands restoration.

hen George Washington lived at Mount Vernon, the area we now know as Dvke Marsh was known as Hellhole Swamp, a dismal spot of sunken land that was inhospitable to humans and impassable to sailing ships. These days, people think about wetlands differently, appre-

ciating the ecological role it plays by hosting 6,500 species of plants and animals as well as providing a natural barrier to flooding. That's why longtime advocates of restoring Dyke Marsh are celebrating a new \$25 million appropriation to restore the wetlands to 1937 boundaries, reestablishing 150 acres of marsh wetlands.

"Today's event and the restoration of Dyke Marsh represent a real turnaround in American thinking about wetlands and how important they are," said Glenda Booth, president of Friends of Dyke Marsh. "I know a lot of national parks as the big ones out west, Yellowstone and

Yosemite, well this is our Yellowstone right here in metropolitan Washington."

The appropriation, announced last week as part of a \$113 million package assisting vulnerable coastal marshes harmed by Hurricane Sandy, was the realization of years of work for advocates of Dyke Marsh. During a press conference announcing the appropriation this week, Interior Secretary Sally Jewell described a new \$100

> million program to restore key habitats and bolster natural systems.

> "Places like this don't create themselves," said Jewell. "They are created by the wisdom and foresight of elected officials that set them aside."

> THE STORY of Dyke Marsh restoration begins in 1959, when the land was acquired as part of a congressional

land-trade agreement. By the time commercial dredging ended in the early 1970s, the marsh had been transformed from an 184-acre tidal wetland into a geologically unstable 83-acre remnant. Congress mandated restoration in 1974, but nobody knew at the time how difficult and complicated that would be. Over the years, efforts to restore the wetland have been unable to reverse the trend.

"When we had earmarks, we used to put earmarks in," said U.S. Rep. Jim Moran (D-8). "We did everything we could, but for all our



noble efforts the ground was still eroding."

A 2010 survey by the U.S. Geological Survey concluded that Dyke Marsh had become destabilized and that it was eroding at an accelerated rate during storm events. The shoreline was eroding at six to eight feet every year, authors of the report concluded, and unless some kind of intervention book place, the wetlands would not be around in a generation. That survey laid the groundwork for securing the \$25 million appropriation as part of relief from Hurricane Sandy.

"Sometimes now, you'll find people fighting against environmental stewardship regulations and arguing that it's bad for the economy. No it isn't," said U.S. Sen. Tim Kaine. "In a state like Virginia, which is in the top 10 in the country in terms of tourism, a strong economy and a strong environment go hand in hand."

PLANS WON'T be finalized for another year, but the broad outlines for what to do with the money have already been

ard of our natural resources and especially the local jewel called the Dyke Marsh Wildlife Preserve. Ned is regularly out numerous times per week and in his kayak collecting endless trash and working to improve the health of this valuable resource."



laid out as part of an environmental impact statement released last year. That document presented a series of options ranging from taking no action to restoring the marsh to 1937 borders. The most expensive option, known as "Alternative Concept D" includes a breakwater at the southern edge of the promontory as well as placement of fill in the channels that are part of the National Park Service boundary. It also includes construction of tidal guts similar to historic flow paths, including a new tidal gut that discharges upstream.

"This marsh is essential for wildlife, and there are a number of species that make this marsh their home. Without this marsh they wouldn't have a place to live in this area," said Del. Rob Krupicka (D-45). "And it's just a really nice place to have in a big urban area to have some natural setting that you can go and enjoy with your family and get away from it all for a little while."

During Hurricane in 2003, the Belleview neighborhood was significantly flooded. Then when Hurricane Sandy hit last year, the shoreline of Dyke Marsh took a major hit. That's why the area was on the list of funding priorities for Hurricane Sandy relief, a list that also includes the Great Dismal swamp and oyster restoration projects on Chincoteague Island. Here in Fairfax County, the project will triple the size of the existing wetland at Dyke Marsh, expanding the 60 acres to 200 acres.

"This used to be a common type of ecology up and down the Potomac River, but most of it's gone now," said Del. Scott Surovell (D-44). "Basically where the Jefferson Memorial and the Lincoln Memorial are now used to be just like this, but it was all drained and dredged in the 1800s and early 20th century to create all that space for the National Mall."

Vote Nov. 5 or Before

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 5

or voters in Virginia, it is hard to overstate how important it is to go out and vote next week. All Virginia voters will see statewide races for governor, lieutenant governor and attorney general, plus one delegate race. In addition, there are a few local races in Alexandria and Arlington, a bond question in Fairfax County and a referendum question about the housing authority in Arling-

In 2008, 74.5 percent of Virginia's registered voters

turned out to vote in the presidential election. In 2009, the last time Virginians elected a governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general and members of the House of Delegates, just 40.4 percent of registered voters came out to vote.

That is to say that 1.7 million voters went missing in the Commonwealth.

Last November, more than 70 percent of Virginia's registered voters turned out. Will this November see 40 percent or less? Choices at the statewide level could hardly be more stark, and low turnout will make the outcome unpredictable.

This week's Connection includes what you need to know about the mechanics of voting and what is on the ballot.

Don't be among the missing.

Voter Identification Rules Same as Last Year

Virginia's existing voter ID requirements will change in July 2014. A law requiring photo identification at the polls was signed into law in May 2013, but this new photo identification requirement will not take effect until July 1, 2014.

When you arrive at your polling place, a voting official will verify that your name is on the registration list. Voters will be asked to present one valid form of identification this year when voting, any of the following: Virginia voter registration card; Virginia driver's license; military ID; any Federal, Virginia state or local government-issued ID; employer issued photo ID card; concealed handgun permit; valid Virginia student ID; current utility bill, bank statement, government check or paycheck indicating the name and address of the voter; Social Security card.

Vote Now

From now until Saturday, Nov. 2, you can vote absentee in person for a variety of reasons, but you must sign a form affirming that you do qualify. Almost everyone with a job in Northern Virginia qualifies for one particular reason, however: your work plus commute time would be 11 hours or more between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Election Day. Other reasons include planned travel, pregnancy, illness or disability, being a student out of area and more. Voters can also vote absentee by mail.

Pedestrian Disconnection

To the Editor:

A search for "complete streets" on the Fairfax County website brings up five or six pages of citations and links to documents. A quick once-over reveals none that mention anywhere but Tysons Corners or Reston. The accompanying photograph of the northeast corner of Fordson Road at Richmond Highway would appear to confirm that the county doesn't consider complete streets important for the rest of us. "Complete Streets" is a marketing term of the National Complete Streets Coalition, and refers to the idea that we ought to build our streets so that they are safe, efficient, and pleasant for all of the people who use them motorists, pedestrians, transit riders. bicyclists — everyone.

What's the photo got to do with this? It's the Fairfax Connector bus stop on that corner, and just to the left you can see the wide asphalt side path and connecting concrete sidewalk that the developer of the new strip mall just installed. The old concrete slab is for the pulloff bus stop. (Paving and pull-offs are rarities for bus stops along Richmond Highway, suggesting that someone at some time thought this an important stop.) But the picture shows at least three violations of the Complete Streets concept for pedestrians, and especially people with disabilities. The



developer carefully avoided connecting the side path to the bus stop, even though the path comes within 18 inches of it at one point. The developer did not run the sidewalk and path to the corner, even though there's demand. The "goat ers — you and me — haven't made path" visible at both ends of the it clear that we want those conslab was made by walkers taking that route. And if your eyes are good enough, you can see an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-compliant ramp on the opposite corner — which does not go all the way to the button on the

post which activates the walk signal to cross what St. Louis Catholic Church pastor Fr. Matthew Zuberbueler termed "... the great rushing river ..." of Richmond Highway.

Connecting the path and sidewalk could not have cost very much, and connecting the path to the bus stop would almost certainly have used less asphalt than the crew threw away as waste at the end of the job.

So why didn't it happen?

Almost certainly because the county's political leaders haven't made it clear that the people who supervise zoning compliance, public transit, and planning talk to each other for a few minutes about each project.

And the political leaders haven't made this clear because the votversations to happen. We especially want them to happen when a trivial investment of time, effort, and money can result in a material benefit to us all, especially the most vulnerable.





Taste of Hollywood comes to Alexandria

Bringing a hint of Hollywood to Old Town, the seventh annual Alexandria Film Festival kicks off Nov. 7.

t might be Patti North's favorite time of year, but it's certainly one of the most stressful.

As chair of the Alexandria Film Festival, North has spent moths preparing for this year's event, pulling together movies ranging from a few minutes to an hour or more in length from around the world and helping to line up Q&A sessions with as many filmmakers as possible during the festivals' four-day run.

This year, she's particularly excited to host a discussion with Benh Zeitlin, director of the film "Beasts of the Southern Wild," which was nominated for Best Picture in last year's Academy Awards.

"He comes from completely outside the whole Hollywood fishbowl," she said of the director, who has two short films included in this year's list of more than 60 offerings at four venues across Alexandria. "Now Hollywood is on bended knee for him," but Zeitlin seems determined to keep his "street cred" as an independent filmmaker.

Zeitlin is currently filming a movie and

will be appearing via Skype, and North said he hasn't been sure where he'll be calling from on Nov. 9, following a screening of two of his short films, "Glory at Sea" and "I Get Wet." These films were made prior to Beasts, but "you can really see the development of Beasts" in these works, North said.

North has been involved with the festival since its creation seven years ago, first as a member of the city's arts council and now as the festival's chair. A "huge movie buff" for many years, North said she's glad to have the backing of the city council for the largely volunteer event that she sees as a celebration of digital art.

Her long-term goal is to help Alexandria's reputation as a hub for traditional art forms, like the painting and sculpture that take place within the Torpedo Factory, expand and evolve to become a breeding ground for filmmakers, composers and directors.

"Without art, Alexandria would be like Williamsburg inside the Beltway," she said. "More than anything, I'd like to see the city embrace the notion of digital art."

There are several local filmmakers involved in the event as well, including the world premiere of a new movie, "Ass Backwards," from T.C. Williams alum and former "Saturday Night Live" comedienne Casey Wilson. The movie, which stars Wilson and Alicia Silverstone, will premiere in Alexan-

dria before its national release, North said.

THIS YEAR'S FESTIVAL will kick off with a redcarpet event on Nov. 7 and feature series of six food-

themed films, ranging from the near mythic respect for red and green chilies in New Mexico to the struggle for safe sources of drinking water in developing countries.

Another film to be featured opening night is "Capital Food Fight," a 26-minute film from Springfield resident Robert Paschen that takes a look at the dispute over the increasingly popular food truck phenomenon in Washington, D.C., and the challenges posed by and to established brick-and-mortar restaurants, which contributed more than \$250 million in taxes to Washington to help keep the city safe and clean.

The film started out as a student film at American University, studying the explosion in popularity in food trucks, which made their first appearance during President Obama's first inauguration in January 2009. Seizing upon an opportunity during that "super cold, super crowded" day along the National Mall, one proprietor, whom Paschen nicknamed the "godfather of the

local food truck scene" rolled out his cart and kicked off a firestorm.

Since then, Washington has become the fourth largest market for food trucks in the country, Paschen said. But "it happened so fast the law couldn't keep up."

"The argument, in general, or my sense of it, from the food truck organization is that if you live in a free market society, let the market decide, don't over-regulate it," because that could squash the entrepreneurial spirit of the endeavor, Paschen said. Traditionally, that's been the rallying cry of more established, longstanding industries, but food truck operators have embraced it as their motto.

There's also the fascinating timing of the food truck phenomenon, taking off at the same time that social media became a major communication tool. Food trucks could not operate without social media, as they



have no other way to tell their potential patrons where they are located on any given day, he said. "Social media is the lifeblood of the food truck industry," he added.

Paschen is excited for his first film to be shown during the Alexandria Film Festival this year. "I'm really glad to be a part of it," and though he admits he's a little nervous for the Q&A session following the film, he's looking forward to seeing the other films showing on opening night.

THE SEVEN-MINUTE FILM "Pedestrian," by Claire Ensslin, an Alexandria native who now lives and works in New York City, tells its story with no dialogue at all. The short film shows a man struggling with his urges to attack a young girl.

Ensslin, who received her first video camera at the age of 12 but always though of herself as an artist, filmed the movie in Alexandria and Falls Church, using locations she frequented when she lived here and attended T.C. Williams High School.

This film is based on a short story from the 1930s which was set in New York City and "really haunted" Ensslin when she read it. She kept the storyline the same and changed the era and the location, but stayed true to the subject over the course of the

"This guy is obsessed with the idea of this small girl, but he always gets scared" when he sees her, she explained.

Ensslin said she submitted her script early last year to Panavision in order to be able to use their revered camera equipment, a request that was granted for three days worth of shooting, despite her wishes for six. Without dialogue, however, the mood of the film comes through lighting and "tons of music," made by two instruments she won't name.

"No one's ever guessed them correctly," she laughed. "It's very creepy music.'

Excessive Regulation?

To the Editor:

In the letter to the editor (Mt. Vernon Gazette Oct. 24) "Liberal ID Requirements," H. Jay Spiegel expresses his support for the relatively new voter ID requirements and criticizes Del. Scott Surovell's opposition to them. But perhaps Mr. Spiegel would express a different opinion about the law if he looked at it from a different perspective, i.e., as an example of "unnecessary and excessive government regulation."

According to the experts who keep track of these things, for example the Republican National Lawyers Association, cases of voter ID fraud are practically non-existent in Virginia, and the rest of the United States as well. Why then the perceived need for new laws and new requirements? As many Republican Party operatives and officials around the country have admitted, these laws are being passed in an attempt to suppress the Democratic Party turnout and vote plain and simple. Thankfully, they have had the opposite effect on Democratic Party supporters resulting in apparently larger and record turnouts in the last Presidential election, for example.

We should not forget that the original law passed by the Republican-led Virginia Legislature was much more onerous than the law that is currently in effect because, to his credit, Republican Gov. McDonnell amended it to include the wider variety of proof of ID Mr. Spiegel cited in his letter.

Gov. McDonnell also had new paper voter ID cards mailed out to all registered voters in Virginia. It must have cost the State of Virginia a significant amount of taxpayer money to print and mail out all those new ID cards. Has Mr. Spiegel considered how much these new requirements cost the taxpayers of Virginia, now and in the future, and for such little benefit?

Mr. Spiegel asserts that there is no excuse for anyone not being able to comply with Virginia's Voter Identification law. Perhaps. However, as I recall, I had to show proof of identity, residency in Virginia, as well as age, only when I first registered to vote. I was then issued a paper voter ID card which I dutifully carried with me and used for decades. I see no reason why I, nor any other already registered voter in the United States, should have to go to the time and expense of getting a new ID to prove that I am who I am every time I vote. These voter identification laws are like something one would expect in a country living behind the iron curtain or under a dictatorship.

As for the purging of the voter list, the supposedly duplicate registrations from other states on the list may be errors. The old expression, "to err is human to really screw up you need a computer" comes to mind. Many people have the same or confusingly similar names though they live in different states.

For example, a quick Internet search I did found many people in other states with the same or a very similar name as Mr. Spiegel's. Besides our own "H J Spiegel, Alexandria, Virginia," there was "H J Spiegel, Buffalo Grove, IL" and "H J. Spiegel, Miami, FL" and "H J Spiegel, Staten Island, NY" and so on.

Assuming those people are registered to vote in those respective states, perhaps it will turn out that Mr. H. Jay Spiegel of Alexandria has been purged from the voter list in error? If so, I imagine that we will be subjected to yet another rant to the editor from Mr. Spiegel in the Mt. Vernon Gazette after the election.

Finally, the positions taken by Del. Surovell and his party apparently have the support of myself and most of the rest of the Mt. Vernon District, despite what Mr. Spiegel's favorite pollster Rassmusen might mislead him into believing.





Mount Vernon Field Hockey Faces Win-or-Go-Home

fter conference tournament games on back-to-back nights, the Mount Vernon field hockey game had a day to regroup before taking on Marshall in a win-or-go-home contest on Thursday, Oct. 31.

No. 5 Mount Vernon defeated No. 4 Lee in strokes, 0-0 (3-2), in the opening round of the Conference 13 tournament on Oct. 28. The following night, the Majors lost to top-seed Thomas Jefferson 2-0. Mount Vernon will now travel to face No. 2 Marshall on Thursday in the consolation game to see which team earns the conference's third and final berth in the 5A North region tournament.

"There are a lot of things that we could have improved upon tonight, so I'm glad that we have practice tomorrow," Mount Vernon head coach Jessica Edwards said after Tuesday's loss to TJ. "Playing back-to-back from last night to tonight with no discussion [was tough]. I get off work and we're on the bus coming here, so there's not really an opportunity to talk to the girls

about tonight's game."

After winning three National District titles in four years, Mount Vernon has struggled with inexperience this season. The Majors' season opener against Lee during the Under the Lights Tournament on Aug. 26 ended in a scoreless tie. Mount Vernon followed with a 10-game losing streak, before earning its first win against Hayfield on Sept. 30. The Majors closed the regular season by winning four of their final five games.

"We definitely got better," Edwards said. "Before we played Lee [Monday] night, I watched the game that we played Lee in the tournament, and I was like, 'Oh my goodness, we were both terrible at that time.' ... Last night when we played, we [showed we] all knew how to play hockey."

Junior Amber Sable, a first-team all-conference selection, is one of two returning starters on this year's team.

"I think we lacked in varsity experience," she said. "We lost nine of our starters, we only had two left over, [but] I think we've

grown as a team. They've all had so much more experience and we're starting to play like a varsity team should. I think by next year, we'll definitely be good competitors in the conference."

Kelly Quigley, Maggie Heltzel and Shenice Brunson converted their strokes during Monday's first-round game against Lee.

Marshall defeated Mount Vernon 1-0 during the teams' regular-season meeting on Sept. 6.

Hill being the sum of those elected by their states to serve in the Senate and House of Representatives.)

In the article Rep. Connolly goes on to list some examples he selected that showcased the result of the "Shameful and Dangerous" results of Capitol Hill. His examples included: 1) the shutdown of the government (Note: The government did not shut down. It did operate at a reduced level.), 2) a worried 12-year-old boy, 3) federal contractors that were either laid off or caused to use vacation time (Note: I had to use my vacation time.), 4) a stressed home owner, 5) an "inference" that chambers of commerce and other business leaders experienced negative business effects, 6) an "estimated" cost to Virginia of \$200 million a day (Note: Next time Rep. Connolly, please cite your source of such data.), and, 7) the very real threat of default jeopardizing the world standing of the U.S.

Weaved throughout these examples, Rep Connolly offered that the "Shameful and Dangerous" result of Capitol Hill was caused by — ready for this? — the Republicans. Who would've guessed?

How about this: The "Shameful and Dangerous" scene on Capitol

Hill is the result of the laziness that party politics creates. I say laziness because it takes work to get things done. As it is with any institution that consists of more than one person — disagreements will come. It is when disagreements come that work begins and must be done to advance the cause of the institution. The work that must be done is "compromise." Collaboration is a win-win situation, which one can conclude doesn't take much work. Much of the time collaboration — where those in disagreement get all that they want cannot be attain. Compromise is a lose-lose endeavor where those in disagreements lose some of what they want. Compromise takes work.

A question — not 'the' question — but 'a' question to consider is this: Had Capitol Hill compromised (worked) to give the nation, over the last few years, budgets as the law requires, would examples one-through-seven (see above) have evolved?

Rep. Connolly does offer a fix and an observation in his closing paragraph. He writes, "we must stop playing politics" — "America deserves better."

I couldn't agree more.




