## Investing in Youth

### Leaders in Mount Vernon to consider budget effort to help at-risk schoolchildren

hat kind of investment should Fairfax County make in at-risk youth? That's a question now under consideration by the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens Associations, which is considering a resolution that would urge county leaders to make strategic investments during the upcoming budget cycle. Advocates say this part of Fairfax County is facing a crisis of at-risk youth, and unless critical investments are made now, a generation of children will be lost to poverty, crime and disease.

"It's important in the sense that it's dealing with not so much today's youth but the youth down the road," said Christopher Low, co-chairman of the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens Associations. "If we deal with it today it kind of feeds into that."

At issue is a range of budget issues that will soon be before members of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors and School Board, everything from prevention services and intervention programs offered by the county to diversion programs designed to keep children out of the court system. One of the chief recommendations is a



## Firefighters distribute 2,200 coats to children in need.

uture First Lady of Virginia Dorothy McAuliffe joined Fairfax County Fire Chief Richard Bowers Oct. 30 at Penn Daw Station 11 as the Firefighters Coats for Kids Foundation and Operation Warm distributed more than 2,200 new coats to children in need.

"The big difference this year is that most of our coats were made in America," said Capt. Willie Bailey, founder of the Firefighters Coats for Kids program. "We started this in Northern Virginia and now it has spread to over 50 other fire departments and unions throughout the country."

Spearheaded for several years by Bailey and members of the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department, this year's coat drive is the third since joining forces with the Pennsylvania-based nonprofit Operation Warm and focused on distributing coats that were made in the U.S.A.

"By collecting and purchasing coats that were made in America, we helped save over 200 jobs in the U.S.A.," Bailey said.

Primo's Restaurant provided food for the dozens of retired firefighters and volunteers who gathered before dawn to sort through the coats and prepare them for distribution to representatives of 60 area schools and nonprofit organizations.







## Opinion Proof Every Vote Matters

Elections have consequences, including close races.

uesday morning, a full week after an Election Day that included races that were more suspenseful than anticipated (and also many races that were foregone conclusions), we are probably more than a month away from certifying the winner of the Virginia Attorney General race.

At press time, the State Board of Elections reported, unofficially, that Mark Herring (D) had 1,103,610 votes with 49.89 percent of the vote; Mark Obenshain (R) had 1,103,493 votes with 49.88 percent of the vote. The 5,152

write-in votes are huge in a race that at one point had Obenshain ahead by 15 votes.

The process of canvassing or verifying the vote has been revealing, including a malfunctioning voting machine that had more than 2,000 votes uncounted in Fairfax County, a voting machine in Richmond that hadn't been counted at all and many smaller errors. Human error and computer error are to be expected

It will make a difference which man is elected as Attorney General. The current Attorney

General, Ken Cuccinelli, demonstrated the influence that office can exert on many fronts, from academic freedom and scrutiny to the challenge of health

care reform to implementation of environmental regulations to investigations of the household staff of the Governor's mansion.

Del. Tom Rust (R) won reelection by just 57

votes, with 50.1 percent of the vote over Jennifer Boysko with 49.74 percent. Del. Barbara Comstock (R) won reelection with 50.64 percent of the vote over Kathleen Murphy (D) who received 49.19 percent, a margin of less than 500 votes. All results are still unofficial.

Consider another close race, in November 2007: then state Sen. Ken Cuccinelli (R-37) won re-election by less than one-half of a percentage point, with an edge of just 92 votes out of 37,185 ballots cast, beating Democrat Janet Oleszek. Approximately 32 percent of registered voters in the 37th District cast ballots at the polls in that election.

Retiring Del. Jim Scott was elected in 1991 with a margin of a single vote.

Just a few of many examples that prove that every vote really does matter.

## Library Reorganization Deserves More Work

n September, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors called for the suspension of a major reorganization proposed to our Fairfax County Public Library system. The suspension was requested in order to provide more opportunity for outreach to concerned library employees and patrons so that proposed changes could be explained, evaluated and vetted among stakeholders. The Connection Newspaper has covered this issue.

As our nation and Fairfax County have struggled with the effects of the Great Recession and its lengthy aftermath, we have needed to make reductions to the many services and programs the county provides. Throughout this time, our Board has sought to maintain taxes at a level that is affordable for our community. I applaud our County staff for proposing efficiencies and reorganizations during this time that have helped us maintain high quality services that also save taxpayers money.

Over the past few months, I have received a



number of letters, emails and phone calls regarding the proposed library reorganization as well as the "floating collection" and issues around the discarding of books. I believe, based on the feedback I have received, that the reorganization as proposed

was too much for the organization to absorb. Many of the ideas contained within the plan, however, have value and should continue to be explored. Our shared goal is to make sure our libraries continue to be the vital and vibrant places that our community can enjoy and rely upon well into the future. The quality of our collection and the services we offer should reflect the standards Fairfax County residents expect.

I would like to thank members of the Library Board of Trustees and library staff for their efforts during the past few months as they have conducted a series of discussion forums on the proposed changes. I understand the meetings have been constructive and have included

some spirited debate. I especially want to thank Deputy County Executive Dave Molchany for his personal investment of time and energy to assist library staff with ensuring a thoughtful and insightful process. Our Board has asked for a progress report from the Library Board of Trustees to be presented at our Board meeting on Nov. 19 and I am looking forward to hearing directly from them.

During these recession years, library systems around the country have had to reduce hours, cut services or even close library branches; Fairfax County is not alone in this struggle. Libraries across the country have also been exploring innovative ways to contain costs while at the same time maintaining or even improving services to meet the needs of their residents. I am confident that Fairfax County will prove to be a leader in achieving this goal.

This issue has served to energize those in our Fairfax County community who appreciate the value our outstanding library system affords us. Thank you for rallying to support our libraries!





## 'Shiloh Rules' In battlefield satire,

o hell with Yankee bitches," is but one of the razor sharp barbs slung in "Shiloh Rules," a Civil War satire by playwright Doris Baizley that takes no prisoners in a cleverly crafted production at Port City Playhouse.

Skillfully directed by Mary Ayala-Bush, "Shiloh Rules" is set in the present at Shiloh Battlefield Park in West Tennessee. The play opens on the eve of a major reenactment of the 1862 Battle of Shiloh, and

though the rules of engagement are clear - no one is allowed in the park before dawn - a dedicated Union nurse and a mysterious Confederate refugee have slipped in along with their overeager apprentices to compete for the title of Reenactor of the Year.

Other potential recommendations call for increased funding for the Community Services Board, model programs for the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court and extended hours for computer labs at libraries.

"What we are hoping for is some attention to the problems of youth in our area which affect everything from education to the criminal justice system to the quality of life and the prospects for those kids," said Judy Harbeck, chairwoman of the education committee. "What we have found is that waiting until the Board of Supervisors and the county executive put out their budget is really too late."

One of the potential recommendations focuses specifically on the county's legislative agenda for the upcoming session of the General Assembly. The draft resolution identifies a need for regulatory flexibility to enable caregivers of children and youth to sustain their participation in the workforce. One way to accomplish that would be to allow people graduating from school or leaving a job a three-week grace period of continued benefits before cutting off access to daycare vouchers. Another legislative item on the agenda is increased funding for youth behavioral services, particularly children in special need programs and services of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court.

"Their government is failing them," said Del. Scott Surovell (D-44). "These kids are being asked to go to school with a hand tied behind their back."

THE RESOLUTION will be formally considered at the Nov. 20 meeting of the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens Associations.

Leaders of the effort say they have been working behind the scenes for the last three months to create a series of recommendations for county leaders in advance of the budget process. The text of the resolution calls attention to pressing needs in Fairfax County, using the strongest language possible to call attention to the needs of at-risk youth.

"A more or less perfect storm of

fiscal constraints and uncertainties has stimulated extensive efforts to consolidate and redesign smart services that could serve ever greater numbers of those with greater need at the same or lower cost," the resolution explains. "We call attention to needed services that serve an increase in county funding incorporated into planning for FY15 and beyond."

**Associations** 

With the exception of \$262,000 for the South County Reporting Center, none of the budget priorities have funding levels associated with them. Supporters of the resolution say that's because of the vagaries of the budget process, which has yet to take shape. Identifying dollar amounts would be difficult if not impossible because of how funding for these kinds of programs comes from multiple sources.

"Most of these services involve collaboration, so part of the money is from the state and part is from the county and part is from a grant," said Cleveland. "So what you have to do is get a county executive estimate on what the cost of something might be based on all these different entities."

## Creating a Feast for the Eye

Local designers share ideas for a striking Thanksgiving table.

hile a menu of turkey and gravy will satisfy the belly this Thanksgiving, a well-designed centerpiece that reflects the warm hues of fall will be a feast for the eyes.

From vivid floral arrangements that spring from gourds to tables piled with seasonal produce, local floral designers say that when it comes to creating Thanksgiving table décor as tantalizing as the meal itself, the options are vast.

Charles Gang, owner of Helen Olivia Flowers in Old Town Alexandria, and his team of designers often create colorful combinations of flowers and fruit in rich hues. "As far as fall arrangements, we're [using] fruit like apples and pears, we're seeing mini pumpkins in arrangements," he said.

In fact, Gang suggests creating arrangements using full-sized pumpkins as vases. "We're doing a lot of rustic hydrangeas, a lot of roses in deep orange and germini in a variety of colors like orange and violets," he said.

Floral designer Laurie Diver, of Conklyn's Florist in Alexandria and Arlington, often uses glass cubes and bubble vases as a receptacle

for her arrangements. "Flowers in orange, gold and maroon are great for fall," she said. "I also like to use hydrangeas that are green tipped with burgundy edges and lilies in rust, yellow and orange."

David Hicks, owner of Conklyn's, doesn't shy away from unconventional flowers. "We have a wholesale

shop that is open to the public," he said. "Two or three times per week, we import flowers from South America like kangaroo paws [a tubular flower] that come in bronze and rust and cottage yarrow that come in bronze and yellow."

Another surprise for fall, says Diver, are tulips. "We usually don't see them again until spring, but now we have an assortment of parrot tulips in orange, yellow or a combination of both with tattered edges that look very artsy."

Great Falls-based designer Alison de Wit of Distinctive Floral Designs, who isn't afraid to add a harbinger of spring to her autumn arrangements either, said, "A lot a spring flowers are available from Dutch markets."

She also combines traditional flowers with modern varieties. "You can combine a traditional hydrangea with a chartreuse spider chrysanthemum for a bright and unusual floral combination."

Floral designer Rachael Rinaldi, of Reston Floral Design in Reston, combines dried oak leaves with chrysanthemums in orange, burgundy, yellow or magenta. "Every fall, mums in rich colors are popular."

Hicks has seen a recent spike in the number of consumers who want to create budget centerpieces at home. "You can take eight to 12 blooms of cymbidium orchids in green and orange and put the elongated stems in a glass cylinder with some curly willow to give

it contrast," he said.

Hicks also suggests that those who want simple elegance "gather four hydrangeas and put them in a square glass container with rocks at the bottom and you have a simple and elegant centerpiece."

## Choosing Art

Local designers offer tips on of Transitions by Sharon Kleinman in Potomac, Md. "People's homes should be about what they like and how to banish blank walls.

hen Anne McCloud and her fiance, Mark Graham, moved into their Herndon home two years ago, with the exception of a large, deep red Chesterfield sofa, a present from Anne's parents, the furniture they had was left over from graduate school: a tattered antique chair in need of reupholstering and two side tables. The walls were bare except for a mirror that hung over the fireplace. Other than reupholstering the chair in a tapestry fabric with colors of gold and wine, their home remains unchanged today.

McCloud is finally ready to create a polished interior, however. She wants to purchase wall art that complements their existing sofa and chair. She wants their art collection to grow in harmony with their furniture purchases.

"We want to buy some original art," said McCloud. "We're even considering having a piece commissioned, but we're not sure how to coordinate the colors and we cannot afford to hire a professional interior designer. So we're doing this on our own."

WITH SO MANY CHOICES in art, fabrics and furnishings, it's easy to feel overwhelmed when it comes to do-it-yourself interior design. Building a collection of art that you love and combining it with furniture that that fits your style can be overwhelming for interior design novices.

Mia Belotti, an interior designer and owner of Maison et Jardin, Ltd. in Great Falls, said there are two ways to approach the design issue. "If you have an expensive piece of art, then you choose furniture around it. If you already have furniture, choose art that goes with it.

Scale and size are important. "You have to create a balance," said Belotti. "If you have a large piece of furniture against the bottom half of a wall, a small painting will look awkward hanging over it."

Designers agree that choosing art is personal. "I never tell clients what to like," said Sharon Kleinman,

what speaks to them."

Kleinman says it is possible to create a harmonious room with two opposing styles such as antique and modern. The key, she says, is in details such as framing. "If you have a traditional interior with antique furniture," she said, "I would have no problem taking a Picasso and putting it in a very ornate frame."

Some homeowners are also perplexed when it comes to color coordination.

"I don't think art has to match furniture," said Kleinman. "You don't want it to clash, but it doesn't have to match. If I had a room with soft blues and yellows, I wouldn't throw a painting in that had harsh colors like red and black. You want colors to be complimentary. If the interior of the room is warm color, the colors in the painting should be warm. The same is true with cool colors. The more neutral the room, the bolder the art can be."

Kelley Proxmire of Kelley Interior Design in Bethesda, Md., suggests that in the case of McCloud, furniture in bold colors does not have to dictate bold art. "In fact, neutral art on bold walls or in a room with bold-colored furniture can have a great impact,"

However, she said, "It's wise to match a color in at least one of the more prominent paintings, as it adds to the peacefulness of the room. Not all the paintings have to match, but keeping one of the tones consistent makes the components of the room harmonious,"

Chantilly-based designer Sallie Kjos of GreyHunt Interiors suggests that homeowners pay attention to the type of art that catches their attention. "If you have a passion for an artist, for example, Victoria Salvano, then base your decor around the colors that you are drawn to," she said. "For example, with her vibrant work, keep your main pieces such as the sofa, chairs and drapes simple and clean and add in pops of color such as teals, blues, fuchsias in your pillows, accessories, trimmings and throws to give punch and life to the room while tying in the art work.

Kjos also suggests grouping smaller pieces of art. "Go for a collage of different items or artwork," she said. "One of my favorites is taking old empty frames and hanging items inside, such as family pictures that are all framed the same that are smaller, a set of plates, candle sconces or whatever is special to you."

up as approachable, personable, and with a good sense of humor. Her No. 1 focus has always been on the children, she said. "I always frame the decision with 'what's best for our students."

With Garfield's student population at 370, she wanted to strengthen her leadership skills in another type of school. To that end, her goal is to make Stratford Landing (with 904 students) "the greatest place for 'teachering' and learning, with strong family, school and community relationships."

At Garfield, she already knows everyone's names and their families. She said "to replicate that in a larger manner will be a challenge

.... How to build those relationships with students, staff and family — knowing there's 2 and a half times as many of them."

She added: "I like to know all of my students personally, so I am going to have to know how to do that in a quick way, and also their history."

She is eager to transfer to a new place to learn its history and what's important there — "what are their hopes and dreams for them, and building where we want to go together is important."

At Garfield, 60 percent of its students are on free and reduced lunches. Stratford landing has less than 20 percent of students on free lunches. It is also an Advanced Academic Level IV Center (GT) and offers Foreign Language Experience (FLEX). There's a Discovery Garden, math competitions and Word Masters club. Its business partners are the Mount Vernon Kiwanis Club and Alexandria Elks Lodge No. 758.

According to Betsy Fenske, former Cluster 5 assistant superintendent, "Maureen is one of the strongest instructional leaders I know in terms of her focus on student achievement." She added: "She really works very diligently with her staff to make sure they are accommodating for all of children's needs."

At Garfield, Marshall has worked with a program called "Responsive Classroom," that focuses on children being a contributing a member of the school community. She has built a whole school culture on respect for each individual's character and academic success. Basically, it focuses on children learning how to be respectful of one another and working on caring for each individual and their character and aca-

"I not only want kids to excel academically, but I want them to have strong character and be future civic leaders," said Marshall. "And to make sure kids make the right decision, even when nobody's looking."

Garfield PTA President Liz McGhan says Marshall's a great principal to work with. "She knows so much about the development of a child," she said. "She also motivates, she cares about the staff, and she supports the parents."

Christine Slattery, assistant principal at Garfield, calls Marshall a "gift and a gem" with a contagious personality who is great at building relationships. "She's innovative and she thinks outside the box," she said. "And she's a model of our school mission statement."

Originally from New Windsor, N.Y., Marshall graduated from Boston College with a degree in early education and special education. She received a master's in curriculum and instruction with a concentration in reading as well as a doctorate in educational leadership from Virginia Polytechnic University.





## U.S. 1 Version 2.0: Reducing Congestion

his is the third article in my weekly series examining the U.S. 1 Multimodal Alternatives Analysis, our transit choices and why extending the Metro subway Yellow Line is the best alternative. Last week, I focused on how our transit choice for the highway will improve outcomes in our schools. This week I focus on traffic.

U.S. 1 has a long history. The road's cur-

rent alignment through the 44th District is a consolidation of three or four local roads re-

aligned between 1915 and 1935 into U.S. 1 and widened in the early 1970s. Before the Shirley Highway (now I-395) in 1941, it was the major north-south road in the eastern U.S.. Afterwards, it just became a major north-south road. Today, it remains the primary way in, out and through the 44th District.

U.S. 1's current configuration presents many problems. First, there are only two ways for the 120,000 people between Fort



Belvoir, Huntley Meadows and Alexandria, plus commuters to cross Little Hunting Creek — U.S. 1 and the George Washington Memorial Parkway (GWP) — and no route west between Lockheed Boulevard and the Fairfax County

Parkway (or Woodlawn after Mulligan Road opens in about six months). This creates numerous choke points, like those at Kings Crossing and Buckman Road and at Woodlawn Plantation when U.S. 1 is widened through Fort Belvoir in about four years.

Second, our entire transportation network is very car-centric. Cyclists put their lives in their hands and have no good way to get around our area or anywhere south or west. The rate of pedestrian deaths in the 44th District is double the state average.

Third, growing congestion has pushed commuter cut-through traffic onto secondary roads such as Fort Hunt Road, Old Mount Vernon Road, Sherwood Hall Lane and the GWP.

The U.S. 1 corridor should become more walkable, "bikeable," transit-friendly and interconnected so that people can move efficiently. Congestion will only worsen when we add 40,000 new people over the next 30 years, 17,000 new jobs and whatever the U.S. Army throws at us with the next round of base realignments (BRAC) scheduled for 2015.

What are the options? New dedicated bus lanes on U.S. 1 would provide some relief, but they will not generate the kind of redevelopment our area really needs. However, new bus lanes may be a bridge to the long-term solution.

I have serious reservations about light rail on a highway with a 45-mile-per-hour speed limit and dozens of stop lights.

It is unlikely that light rail would reduce commuter travel times versus car or bus travel. Reducing commuting times makes a transit mode attractive to people. Plus, there are significant engineering questions about whether light rail cars can climb over Beacon Hill given the grade.

A Yellow Line Metro extension would not only move the people who are already here,

but also the people coming in the future. A Metro extension can also stimulate attractive redevelopment that will create more interconnected local roads, such as more crossings of Little Hunting Creek or other connections between neighborhoods, along U.S. 1 and to help alleviate congestion.

A Yellow Line extension would give tourists better options for visiting Mount Vernon Estate and Woodlawn Plantation. It would give commuters, contractors and others more options to get to Fort Belvoir, the new U.S. Army Museum and points north such as Washington, D.C., and the Dulles Metro Corridor.

While extending Metro is the most expensive option, I am hopeful that once this study is complete, it will prove to be the most obvious solution.

A critical piece of the U.S. 1 Multimodal Alternatives Analysis is public input. Please participate in the community discussion.

### Someone More Mainstream

To the Editor:

After last week's election, Del. Scott Surovell (D-44) thanked his constituents for reelecting him, in a post on his blog. In so doing, he explained that "Not a single bill I carry can pass the House of Delegates without at least 17 Republican legislators vot-

ing for it." This is sort of true since the makeup of the House of Delegates in the wake of the election is 67 Republicans and 33 Democrats. In order to achieve 51 votes for any of his legislative proposals, Delegate Surovell would need to convince all of his Democratic colleagues plus 18 or more Republicans.

In February 2012, my letter was published in the Gazette going into detail about Delegate Surovell's legislative record and explaining that even among Democrats he is way out of the mainstream. Some of the highlights (better described as low lights):

- 1. He was one of only 18 delegates to vote against the Constitutional Amendment that would make it more difficult for the government to exercise the eminent domain power to seize private property.
- 2. He was one of only three House patrons for a bill to reinstate the State Estate Tax.
- 3. He supported a bill seeking restoration of civil rights (including the right to vote) for certain classes of convicted felons.
- 4. He was one of only two House patrons for a bill seeking to impose a 20-cent plastic bag tax.
- 5. He was one of only two House patrons for a bill seeking to almost quintuple the state's cigarette tax.
- 6. He was one of only seven House patrons for a bill seeking to impose a 5 percent gas tax.
- 7. He was one of only two House patrons for a bill seeking to repeal tax credits for the coal industry.

Forget about the 18 Republicans; Delegate Surovell rarely gains agreement from the other 32 Democrats. In last week's election, Delegate Surovell did not face a major party opponent. It is the privilege of the

citizens of the 44th District to continue to reelect a delegate who is out of touch with his own party, a party holding one-third of the seats in the House of Delegates. In his blog, Delegate Surovell expressed the hope that he would earn the confidence of the residents of the 44th District who voted for his opponent in the election.

Voters in the 44th District have two years in which to contemplate whether it continues to be appropriate to reelect a delegate who is so far out of the mainstream of his own party that it is unlikely he will ever succeed in getting anything significant done

for 44th District residents, unless gaining approval for yet another Route 1 transportation study (transit study in this case) can be considered to be a great accomplishment. Of course, Delegate Surovell has had other legislative accomplishments, as he has reported in his blog.

The point is that more could be done for residents of the 44th District were they represented by a more mainstream delegate, even a Democrat.


