It is a winter morning in Texas, and the air is cool. My mouth is dry and my anxious fingers fumble with the zipper on my sweater. Music plays behind the chatter of the patient families. We stand on a huge field in front of the First Calvary's Headquarters at Fort Hood Texas. The American flag waves as if America can feel the excitement of the families. The smell of pine drifts on the cool air and into my nose. The familiar smell comforts me and calms my nerves.

A voice comes over the speaker and announces the arrival of the soldiers we have been waiting for. A bus pulls up and my stomach fills with anxious butterflies. We see booted feet file off the bus and march into formation behind it. All the families are cheering and clapping. I can hear the low rumble of the bus as it pulls away, revealing the soldiers. They march onto the field and I cannot see their faces well, but I know they are searching for their families. I run past my family and the other families. I look around. I was only a four-foot-eleven fifth grader, so it is hard to look over the top of the towering soldiers and their families. I then catch a glimpse of a man. I see only the back of him, but I know who he is. He is looking for something. I look at his hat and it has a very familiar name on it: "BALLOU." I run to the soldier and tap on his shoulder. He turns around. His face lights up and he picks me up. I take in everything about Dad: his Old Spice cologne, the familiar roughness of his uniform, and his hugging arms.

"Katie," his voice shakes and I smile because I know that dad will never leave again.


