Priorities for '14

Elected officials cite accomplishments and challenges.

This is the first in a three-part series on the accomplishments of 2013 and the priorities for 2014 for Mount Vernon by local and state elected officials. Community leaders will share their observations in subsequent parts.

ount Vernon and the surrounding communities continue to be confronted by traffic congestion brought on by unprecedented additional numbers of military personnel assigned to Fort Belvoir to support the decisions made by the federal Base Realignment and Closure Commission (BRAC) to shift more military roles to Fort Belvoir.

This included the transfer of a significant portion of wounded warrior responsibilities formerly provided by Walter Reed Hospital, new military responsibilities, and the construction of a new state of the art hospital on the base which will

treat active duty wounded military and veteran retirees and their families. In addition, a new national U.S. Army museum is being built on the base. All of this will attract additional thousands of military personnel and visitors to the base and the area and place additional transportation burdens on the primary and secondary roads.

On the grounds of George Washington's estate the Mount Vernon Ladies Association completed a landmark new center for the study of George Washington complete with a library, conference center and housing for use by scholars. All this will contribute to the traffic in the Mount Vernon area and require collaboration between local, state, and federal representatives and the infusion of tens of millions of dollars over the forseeable future to construct roads and mass transit

Ceramic Therapy for A Wounded Warrior

Art assists veteran's recovery.

t my worst, I had double vision, my memory was shot and I couldn't focus on most any task," recalled Staff Sgt. Jonathan Meadows. His wife Melissa, a nurse, said that after Jonathan's medevac from Afghanistan earlier this year, "He acted like an advanced Alzheimer's case."

Like many Wounded Warriors from the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, Meadows suffers from traumatic brain injury. He is currently an active-duty patient in the TBI unit of the Fort Belvoir Community Hospital. Meadows is a member of the Connecticut National Guard, and he and his wife are from Ledyard, Conn.

His treatment at Fort Belvoir in-

systems to expand transportation infrastructure. Another overarching topic facing Mount Vernon is the continuing need to provide sufficient funding for the county school budget to keep pace with the growth and diverse needs of elementary and secondary education students.

Another a major public policy focus is the need to expand health care for civilian residents to adequately deal with the growth and diversity of the population, and the "Silver Tsunami" — 23 percent of the Mount Vernon population is now 55 and over. To meet the new demands the Lorton Health Plex was recently completed and construction of a major addition onto the existing Mount Vernon Hospital is now underway.

GERALD HYLAND, Mount Vernon District supervisor, Fairfax County Board of Supervisors:





- ❖ Approval of a \$30 million bond referendum for financing a flood control plan for approximately 200 homes in the Huntington community. Despite the fact that only a relatively small number of homes are affected, voters county-wide overwhelmingly supported the need to finance this much needed flood control program
- Approval and financing of artificial turf fields for Mount Vernon and West Potomac High Schools. The Board of Supervisors and School Board each contributed \$1.5 million to the effort, and private funding of \$100,000 was donated by the community from each school.
- * Completion of the Inova Lorton Healthplex, which was recommended by our Inova Mount Vernon Citizens Commission. Mount Vernon Hospital is now in the midst of a major expansion which, when completed, will enable the hospital to provide more medical care services to meet the growing demands of our community. The completion of the Lorton facility and the partnership between Lorton and Mt. Vernon helps to ensure the financial stability of both medical facilities.
- . In 2010, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) was proceeding to ignore the master plan for the Meadowood Stables and wanted to raze the large horse barn without community input. Consequently, we held a public meeting to get the community engaged, and due to that public pressure, BLM is now in the process of restoring the barn per the community's wishes. Because this is federal land, we also worked closely with Congressman Jim Moran.

- * Worked with the Inlet Cove community and the Federal Highway Administration to shift the widening of Richmond Highway south to reduce the negative impacts to the Inlet Cove community. We will continue to work with the community to mitigate noise infiltration into this community by studying various alternative design
- ❖ I established a district wide Visioning Task Force with the goal of identifying the future needs of the Mount Vernon District. We have been focusing on those recommendations by working to bring more public transit service on the Richmond Highway corridor, encouraging development in the Community Business Centers at North Gateway, Penn Daw, and Beacon Hill to revitalize these areas. Also, through collaborative Board initiatives, we are reducing homelessness, expanding youth recreational opportunities, and expanding senior citizen services, as recommended by our Visioning TF.

Q. What do you hope to accomplish in 2014?

- A. By working with developers in Lorton, Huntington, and along Route 1 at North Kings Highway, we can create more funds to provide artificial turf fields for all students in the Mount Vernon district.
- * Begin construction on the Laurel Hill Adaptive Reuse project. This is located at the former site of the closed Lorton reformatory and when completed, 78 acres of land will be converted into new townhomes and single family homes, 110,000 square feet of commercial space, and approximately 30.7 acres or 35 percent of the land will remain as open space. This plan makes this one of the crown jewels of development for the Lorton area.
- ❖ Begin the construction of the North Hill Village, located on the east side of Richmond Highway south of Beacon Hill. It is a 33acre site for a planned community to be developed in partnership with the private sector and the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority. It will include a large park, high quality affordable housing, and a diversified residential income mix.
- ❖ I support a plan for a rail line along Route 1 that would go south from the Alexandria City line to Woodbridge. I also support locating a transit center on Richmond Highway. The currently underway State-financed Transit Study looking at this area is one of the most important transportation policy undertakings in decades for the Mount Vernon District and I intend to closely monitor and participate in the debate and recommendations which emerge
- * The Workhouse Arts Center in Lorton is in need of financial assistance and we are working to design a new emphasis that will make it a more financially viable and attractive location for our residents and others throughout the region. For example, I support studying the feasibility and worth of creating an events center to include a theatre, a music venue, and/or a teen cen-

ter. I am committed to help make the Workhouse Arts Center a successful enterprise.

- Seven times previously I have urged my colleagues on the Board of Supervisors to support a meals tax referendum. I intend to once again ask the board members to support placing it on the fall ballot. If the voters pass the Referendum I propose that the funds raised, estimated at \$100 million, be dedicated to meeting the growing demands of our public education programs.
- ❖ I support efforts to identify additional cell phone towers sites that would be supported by the neighborhoods where they would be located. The additional sites are needed to improve cell phone communications for our residents.


Q. What do you view overall are the major challenges and decisions facing Mount Vernon residents in the coming year?

- A. First, adequately funding the growing needs of our public schools. Top quality public schools are needed to prepare future generations for competing successfully in our increasingly complex technology-oriented society. Quality public education has been and continues to be the engine of our economy and the primary reason families choose to live here and businesses choose to locate here.
- Second, it is essential that we deal effectively with the ever-growing traffic congestion in the district. Widening Richmond Highway is important, but not an answer by itself; it must be accompanied by a workable design that will accommodate mass transit along Richmond Highway from the Alexandria city line to Woodbridge.
- * Third, this coming year I will form a citizens' Task Force to look at the options for reusing the building and grounds of what is now being leased to the Islamic Saudi Academy (ISA) on Richmond Highway. They will be relocating to the northwestern part of the county. The building was originally used as the Mount Vernon High School, and then a middle school, before it was leased to the ISA. A variety of uses have already been suggested, such as the Northern Virginia Community College, relocating human services agencies, using it as a Mount Vernon Town Hall, and possibly a new elementary school. I look forward to working with the Task Force to explore the options on this important issue.

As your Supervisor, I will continue to listen and engage the community as I have done for the past 26 years. In that connection you are invited to attend and participate in my annual Town Hall meeting on Saturday, Feb. 1, at Mount Vernon High

A. • We hired a new superintendent, Dr.

Q. What are your and/or the School Board's top priorities for

A. Continue to find a way to maintain a high achieving school district by increasing funding over previous fiscal years; overcoming our projected \$100 million budget deficit; meet the challenges of a growing student body (currently 2,500 students per year) who are increasingly lower income and non-English speaking; conduct school boundary studies to address overcrowding, build a new elementary school and renovate seven elementary schools; and promote expanded business-community partnerships with our school system and students.

Q. What overall is the state of elementary and secondary public education in Fairfax County?


A. • Mount Vernon and the county public school system continue to provide an excellent education. However, the challenges to maintain that quality of education with diminished funding resources continues. The influx of students who are low income and non-native English speakers place an added burden on the school system. Students now receiving free or reduced cost meals is 27 percent of all students and 32 percent of kindergarten students. Countywide limited English proficiency students represent 16 percent of all students and 38 percent of incoming kindergarten students. Education costs for these students are approximately 50 percent greater than average, thus posing an added challenge for the school system to maintain a quality of education for all students.

A. • Passing a transportation bill for the first time in 27 years that will bring real money to road repairs and improvements as well as new road and transportation projects to northern Virginia.

*Creation of a Commission to study expansion of Medicaid in Virginia in response to the federal Affordable Care Act. I support Medicaid expansion and will support its expansion in the 2014 budget. There are 400,000 uninsured Virginians covered by Medicaid. All of us will benefit in lower health costs because these uninsured people will have access to proper medical care and will not be forced to use the emergency services in hospitals as their doctor's office. Expansion will bring 30,000 jobs to Virginia. Virginia has one of the lowest qualifying rates for qualifying citizens for Medicaid in the country. If we expand Medicaid we will improve the health of our citizens and our economy.

Q. On a more personal level what legislation did you sponsor that was passed?

- A. In the 2013 Session my bill, SB 829, to establish a program to reduce unemployment among Veterans, was passed and signed by the Governor. It will assist businesses to attract, hire, and retain Veterans
- ❖ I also sponsored a budget amendment to provide funding for the Virginia Values Veterans program. This will fund an already successful program to work with employers who are committed to hiring veterans, and especially disabled veterans.


Q. What are some of your legislative priorities for the upcoming session?

A. Two bills introduced in the last Session which I will continue to work on for passage are:

- ❖ A bill to allow military men and women serving in overseas posts to vote absentee by secure electronic means using their military email and CCard, which provides for encryption and a high level of security. The Virginia State Board of Elections and the Joint Leadership Council of Veterans Service Organizations supports this legislation.
- ❖ I am the chief patron of a bill to ensure that all insurance carriers who do business In Virginia alert their customers when a prescription drug is moved from one price to another. This will help Virginia families to better budget for their health care needs.

SCOTT SUROVELL, delegate, 44th District, Virginia General Assembly:

Q. In the General Assembly Session this past year what was the most significant 2 or 3 legislative accomplishments overall?



Q. For the upcoming General Assembly Session what will your top 2 or 3 priorities be and why?

A. • I will focus on introducing meaningful ethics reform legislation, prohibit use of electronic text-books without providing computers to every student, and introduce legislation to amend the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) with the goal to put more sunlight on the State Corporation Commission.

The experience with Governor McDonnell and his family's acceptance of gifts from an individual who

could gain from favorable Virginia state government treatment has highlighted the need for ethics reform in Virginia.

The Constitution of Virginia requires our school systems to provide free textbooks to all public school students. Aside from being fundamentally unfair, if a child's family cannot afford a computer or broadband access we are not meeting our Constitutional requirement if a school system is mandating electronic textbooks.


The State Corporation Commission is probably the most powerful State agency in Richmond but has very little accountability to the General Assembly or the public. There is no excuse why the Freedom Information Act should not apply to them.

Q. Anything else you would like to comment on to our readers for the upcoming year?

A. The Virginia budget environment continues to be challenging due to a weak economic recovery, and the adverse effects of the automatic budget cutbacks that the Federal Sequester placed on the Virginia economy and services. Therefore, we should not expect any new major policy initiatives in the near term.

ADAM EBBIN, state senator, 30th District, Virginia General Assembly:

Q. What were your major accomplishments in the past General Assembly Session?



- ❖ Passed legislation to allow election day staff to be transferred where the need is greatest and lines longest; this will help bring about improved election polling place efficiencies, and to reduce voters from being discouraged from voting by having to wait in long election lines.
- * Collaborated with Del. Scott Surovell to convince Governor McDonnell to reduce the new hybrid vehicle tax from \$100 to \$64.
- * Working with the McDonnell Administration, reduced the number of inmates in solitary confinement which will save the Commonwealth money and reduce the recidivism rate.

Q. What are your top priorities for the upcoming General Assembly Session?

- ❖ A. Ethics reform; repealing the Hybrid vehicle tax; initiating mental health services at community colleges; reducing the victimization in the Latino community from legal fraud.
- * Expand transparency In State government; hasten the processing of sexual assault kits to better prosecute rapists; repeal the anti-equality Marshall-Newman marriage Constitutional Amendment.

Q. Anything else you would like to say as you head into the upcoming Session?

A. Accepting federal Medicaid funds will be critical for Virginia to help the working poor to achieve access to quality health care services.

I will be an advocate for promoting workforce development and the Virginia Preschool Initiative to ready children for public school.

Although our unemployment rate has dipped to a low of 5.6 percent we must continue to remain vigilant about how to best grow our economy and expand economic opportunities.

Hoping for an Angel Rising Hope volunteer needs help for his son.

volunteer with years of service at Rising Hope United Methodist Mission Church which aids the needy along the Route 1 corridor, Abderrahim Lahlou believes people can be angels.

Now, after four heart attacks and unable to hold a steady job, he's hoping an angel from the Mount Vernon community will come forth. "I'm the one in need to help my son," he said.

His son, Adel, is a recent graduate of Mount Vernon High School. With his father urging him on, he worked very hard. His grades and test scores were outstanding. He was named Most Valuable Player stands a trophy case full of academic and sports awards.

When it came time for college, Lahlou's belief in the American Dream came true.

Adel won a full scholarship to Northwestern University, with total yearly awards and assistance amounting to over \$60,000.

But there was a hitch.

The university expects the family to provide \$4,300 yearly to cover books, personal expenses and travel. Lahlou can't provide it. Though his son is home now for Christmas break, he had no money to travel home for Thanksgiving. Adel might have to with-

It was 20 years ago when Lahlou and his wife Leonora immigrated from Morocco. She is Catholic and he is Muslim. He had worked as a CPA at the airport in Casablanca, but he couldn't find comparable

Willing to work hard, he bought a franchise with Jani-King doing office cleaning on the cross country team in 2010. In and maintenance work, employing as many their modest home on Buckman Court as five people. Meanwhile, when Rising Hope opened a few blocks from his home six years ago, he liked the idea of aiding the needy. He volunteered working in the food pantry and driving to pick up and de-

liver groceries. Life looked promising.

But then came problems with the frame chiser, the loss of his franchis, and then the heart attacks. ⊊

"After heart attacks[™]I thought to myself, 'Hey, God gave me an extra life. If only I can do something good to help others."

He increased his volunteering at Rising Hope. These days, sometimes it is a struggle. When he carries groceries to a shut-in in a third floor apartment, he must pant to catch his breath. Still, he knows God expects him to help.

doing for these kids because it matters."

Evans is the father of Cameron Evans, a T.C. Williams student who committed suicide last month. Donations raised for the family were used to help the firefighters buy toys for Alexandria children in need.

"It's not easy to be here today," said Deana Evans, who stressed the importance of being aware of mental health issues. "But Cameron touched so many lives in this community during his life and we wanted to be here to let you know that what you are doing is important."

Started nearly two decades ago by Alexandria native Capt. Willie Bailey, this year's drive collected more than 3,500 toys, bikes and gift cards for needy children in Alexandria and Fairfax County.

"I'm excited to be here again and happy to help out in any way I can," said Troop 1865 Eagle Scout Mikel Sevareid, who has raised thousands of dollars

over the six years that he has been volunteering in the toy drive. "There are so many kids who are less fortunate than me. It makes me feel good to help them have something at Christmas."

been part of Woodlawn's presence in the Mt. Vernon District for many decades.

It should be noted that the Woodlawn property is owned by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a private non-profit organization chartered by the U.S. Congress and based in Washington D.C. The Trust leadership made a business decision they hope will improve financial stability at the property (an issue of long-standing concern) thus their choice to appoint Arcadia as property manager and operator of expanded agricultural programs on

Lamentable as the loss of the stables as a public activity may be, it appears that there may be a greater betrayal of Woodlawn at stake as this operational transformation evolves. In general, the focus on and interpretation of agriculture is consistent with the historical roles the property has played since the 18th century through the ownership tenure of George Washington and his granddaughter Nelly Custis Lewis.

However, information emerging about the new tenant's plans seems to suggest that matters of interpretation and public presentation of Woodlawn's history and culture are very much at risk. No mention is made of its people and their historic association with the property. Little to no specific mention is made of the historic archi-








Spiritual Wellness in the New Year

What is it and how does one achieve it?

BY MARILYN CAMPBELL

s we begin a new year, many are focused on their spiritual health and well-being. In fact, the Na tional Wellness Institute names spiritual wellness as one of the seven dimensions of overall wellness. It's essential in life, say experts.

Lisa Jackson-Cherry, Ph.D., chair of the Department of Counseling at Marymount University in Arlington, who specializes in pastoral counseling and pastoral integration, believes spiritual well-being doesn't always have to do with religion. It's about being connected to something greater than one's self. "It doesn't have to be a higher power," she said. "It can be your community or nature, but the key piece is that there is a connection to something other than yourself.'

Elizabeth Rees, the associate rector at St. Aidan's Episcopal Church in Mount Vernon, said, "I would say at its heart, spiritual wellbeing is knowing ourselves to be loved and cherished by God and then living into that

Kathy Judd, Alexandria-based meditation teacher and director of No Place Like Om, said, "Spiritual health and well-being is when you ... feel just as, if not more, connected to what you can't see as to what you can. It's about knowing that there is an animating force that drives the show and seeing all the ups and downs of our human experience as just like that — a show."

Some say that expectation management

is a factor in spiritual wellbeing. "If there is a gap between expectation and reality, there can be a ... lack of contentment," said Rabbi Stuart Weinblatt of Congregation B'nai Tzedek in Potomac, Md. "When we set our expectations lower in terms of what we expect from others, we are less likely to be disappointed. It is appropriate to set our goals high, but our expectations lower. Goals motivate us, but when we have expectations, we set ourselves up for disappointment."

WHILE SPIRITUAL WELLNESS can mean different things to different people, experts said there are common factors that can help one achieve it, such as engaging with others. "When we think about spiritual health or well-being, we think about people being at peace with themselves and

From Page 14 others," said Jackson-Cherry.

"In my opinion," she said, "once people become connected with other people and not so consumed with themselves or their own tragedies or pain and they give of themselves to others, share their gifts, often they experience contentment."

"Community is a big one, and also what you pay attention to and consume," Judd said. "If you're constantly tuned in to the news cycle and people who are negative and arguing, you're going to see

the world from a certain viewpoint. ... If you take time to be in nature, read uplifting things, eat [the right] foods, and surround yourself with a community of people who are loving, supportive and want to bring out the best in you, you'll have a very different experience of the world."

Rees believes self-love is also a component of spiritual well-being. "In adult education

here at St. Aidan's, we've been listening to the talks of [scholar, author and public speaker] Brené Brown and talking about what she has to say about vulnerability. I have definitely found in my own life that when I dare to share the truth about my struggles with the people around me, it creates a new space for growth and depth.

"Until we learn to love and forgive ourselves, it's almost impossible to love and forgive others," she said. "For me, the Christian story in general, and the Church community in particular, is the place where that comes together and makes sense."

Prayer is an important part of many religions. "Spirituality is found both within the context of meditation and reflective time, which could be prayer, as well as being part of a larger community," said Weinblatt. "That is why people can find contentment in prayer and places of worship and as well as in other contexts."

Jackson-Cherry said, "When I'm working with clients, I find that people who have the healthiest spiritual well-being are people who have a sense of purpose in life or have a meaning in life.

They might not have achieved it, but they are working toward it.

Having a sense of purpose or meaning in life leads to contentment."

So how does one find a sense of purpose and meaning in life? "We've talked about this question a lot," said Rees. "What comes up most frequently is the idea of finding ways to live in the present, slowing down and finding God present in the moment. ... Hearing where other people are finding God, and taking the time to look for God acting in my own life and share that with others makes me much more aware of God all

> around, and helps me to remember that God is also acting in and through the people around me.'

> Judd said there is work involved in achieving spiritual well-being. "It takes practice, just like anything else," she said. "Yoga and meditation are extremely valuable. Spirit is nothing more than an energy field, so if there is a lot of static in the field, it's going to be hard

to hear messages that are there. So anything you can do to calm the 'talk radio' in your head will make it easier to listen. When you learn to listen, you are able to be lead, to be called, to find your call-

also a factor that can lead to contentment and spiritual well-being. "I think trying to ... find as much love and joy in it as possible is a huge piece," Judd said. "Also, worry less about what others think and be more willing to live and love greatly. Developing gratitude, as something that runs through all of our life, not just as something that comes when life seems to be going really well, is important

Rees said keeping a journal is a useful tool in developing gratitude. "One spiritual exercise that helps me sometimes is to practice gratitude by prayerfully journaling about the things for which I am grateful," she said. "Sit down and write 100 things for which you are grateful. You start with the big and obvious things, but then also find yourself digging deep for the small but ever-present graces of life. ... Journaling in general can be a great for spiritual well-being.'



Top Sports Moments of 2013 in Mount Vernon

he year 2013 provided several exciting moments in local sports. The Mount Vernon boys' soccer team won a state championship. Mount Vernon's Bill Adusei and West Potomac's William Rupp each won a state wrestling title and West Potomac's Katie Genuario earned all-state cross country honors.

Here is a look at the top moments in Mount Vernon sports for 2013.

Mount Vernon Boys' Soccer Wins State Championship

The Mount Vernon boys' soccer team lived on the edge during the 2013 postseason.

Three times the Majors' playoff hopes came down to a penalty-kick shootout, including the AAA state championship game against Cosby. Each time, Mount Vernon came out on top — thanks in large part to goalkeeper Lucas Belanger.

In the state final on June 9, Cosby had an opportunity to win the shootout but Belanger came up with a save. After each team converted its next chance, Mount Vernon's Erik Rodriguez put his attempt in the net to put the pressure back on the Titans. With Cosby needing a successful PK to extend the shootout, Belanger came up with another save, ending the match with a 0-0 (6-5) Majors victory and giving Mount Vernon its first team state championship since the football team won it all in 1983.


"I'm actually in shock that we did it," Mount Vernon head coach Tony Garza said after the game. "I'm shocked that we put it all together. We came in with eight losses — the most losses a state tournament team had — and we prevailed and went all the way through, so it was great."

Mount Vernon finished the season with a 14-8-1 record and won the National District championship. The Majors overcame a 3-7-1 start to the season due in part to the additions of Belanger and forward Rahim Costa-Dorsey, who had each been playing academy soccer.


"The biggest thing, though, is for the boys and the community," Garza said after the state final. "When we go to away games to schools out west — no disrespect to any of the schools out west — but a lot of boys, they hear stuff [from people] — you're Route 1 trash, you're poor. Some of the boys, they block it out. The Route 1 corridor, the community of Route 1 and Mount Vernon needed this win. We needed that [winning feeling]."

Mount Vernon's Bill Adusei, then a freshman, and West Potomac's William Rupp, then a senior, won state titles in their respective weight classes. Adusei won National District, Northern Region and state titles in the 126-pound weight class and finished with a 32-2 record. He placed third at nationals and became a freshman All-American.

"Adusei is a great kid who teaches in the room and is a total team leader," Mount Vernon head coach Anthony McDuffie wrote in an email, "even as a freshman."

Rupp won Patriot District, Northern Region and state titles in the 220-pound weight class and finished the season with a 42-0 record.

"I feel like, especially coming into this season, no one really knew who I was," Rupp said after winning states, "and I really had to throw myself out there ..."

Genuario placed 11th in 6A at the VHSL state cross country meet on Nov. 15 at Great Meadow.

"I think it's always been my goal to somehow make it [in the] top 15 and it feels awesome that I finally accomplished that," Genuario said at the state meet. "Our region is really tough and to only finish a few places behind last week [at regionals] is amazing."

Genuario finished with a time of 18:24, 40 seconds faster than her time of 19:04 at the 2012 state meet.

cludes vision and speech therapy, treatment to improve his memory and physical training. All of that is helping, Meadows said, but he surprises everyone when he identifies the key to his ongoing recovery - ce-

"All the problems go away when I'm working with clay," Meadows said. "It opened the door for recovery for me."

Meadows came to ceramics through the efforts of Blair Meerfeld, chairman of the ceramics department at the Art League of Alexandria. Meerfeld convinced Fort Belvoir officials to offer ceramics as one of their therapeutic activities, largely by demonstrating his potter's wheel before clinic pa-

Meadows signed up for Meerfeld's class and quickly got his hands on the clay. "At first, I made a little pig, then a three-legged elephant and a turtle," he recalled. "All of a sudden, overnight, I started making more complex subjects. I had never done anything in clay." One of Meerfeld's fellow instructors, Carla Amerau, was surprised at Jonathan's innate skill.

"It is amazing to me that less than a year ago, Jon showed up to take our class having never worked with clay," said Amerau. "Today he is producing amazing, emotionally powerful sculptures. They are works of art that creatively express his religious faith, life experiences and personal traumas."

"Jon's enormous talent is not something we taught him," added Amerau, a Mount Vernon resident. "It was probably always there. Our class just allowed him to express his ideas and feelings in a creative way."

The Art League is featuring Meadows's work, and ceramics from other wounded warriors, in a special exhibit at the Torpedo Factory through Jan. 5. Several of his pieces were on display for a special reception hosted by the Art League on Dec. 12.

The Art League is holding another reception for its Wounded Warrior exhibit at the Torpedo Factory on Jan. 5 from 2-4 p.m.




