Community Reviews Plans for Silas Burke Property

embers of the Burke and West Springfield communities were invited to review the plans of Sunrise Development, LLC to build an assisted living facility on the property of the Silas Burke House. The meeting was held Tuesday, Feb. 24 at the West Springfield Government Center.

Sunrise Development has applied for the property to be rezoned to accommodate the more densely populated living space they intend to build.

Though some have expressed concern for the well-being of the nearly 200-year-old former residence of Silas Burke himself if a new building were to go up nearby, Sunrise's proposal includes a guarantee that the house, "accessory structures" like the iconic windmill and immediate surrounding property, will be protected and maintained.

"The neat thing there is we're able to preserve the Silas Burke house in perpetuity," said Supervisor Pat Herrity (R-Springfield), "without a big investment from the county, in a very tight fiscal time."

Bulova to Create Transparency Review Commission

Group would include citizens, legal community and other organizations.

hen Alexandria resident Natasha McKenna was removed from life support and died on Feb. 8, the Fairfax County Sheriff's Office posted a release on the county website. It was an update to an earlier post on Feb. 5 that explained McKenna was an inmate at the Fairfax County Adult Detention Center who experienced a "medical emergency" on Feb. 3.

McKenna was scheduled to be moved to the Alexandria Adult Detention Center that day. When she fought against deputies transporting her, they used tasers to restrain her. At that point, the Fairfax County Police Department was notified and an investigation of McKenna's "in-custody inmate death" began.

February 19, the Police Department released another update, an 800-word description of the events leading up to McKenna's arrest and death.

She had called Fairfax County police

herself on Jan. 25 to report being assaulted. Officers accompanied her to a hospital and through a record check discovered an outstanding arrest warrant for assaulting an Alexandria police officer back on Jan. 15.

Though the officers involved have yet to be named, the content and amount of information released in under two weeks since McKenna's death is comparable to that which it took the county over a year to release following the officer killing of Springfield resident John Geer.

According to Fairfax County Board of Supervisors Sharon Bulova, that was indicative of the board's commitment to "making a stronger effort than before to make sure that we're putting out as much info as possible."

Amid Sen. Charles Grassley (R-Iowa), the ranking member of the Judiciary Committee, writing letters to the county as to why Geer's investigation has taken so long and how it's been handled, as well as public pressure from organizations such as the Justice for John Geer Facebook group and Citizens Coalition for Police Accountability, Bulova previously announced the board would seek

outside expertise to examine its policies for releasing information on police action.

AT THE FEB. 17 MEETING of the board, supervisor Pat Herrity (R-Springfield) introduced a draft policy for transparency that had been making its way to the Fairfax City Council.

"You don't have to look far to find a good policy on transparency," said Herrity. "If this had been enforced, we wouldn't have had a lof of the problems with the Geer case".

That Fairfax proposal mandated a release of basic facts, any conflicting information and confirmed identities of individuals involved with the incident — all within 72 hours of the incident itself.

"There were some good recommendations," Bulova said, "but I'm not sure that is the only thing that we want to consider. We're prepared to take a look at a number of models and best practices, to include the one the city of Fairfax is considering."

February 20, Bulova took another step and announced the creation of a new commission, made up of citizens, members of the legal community and other organizations such as the NAACP, to review police policies.

"This gives the community an opportunity to take part in our review," said Bulova.

In her release, the Chairman named Michael Hershman, founder of the Fairfax Group and a citizen appointee to the Board of Supervisors Audit Committee, chair of this commission. She plans to bring it before the Board in its March 3 meeting for endorsement. At that time, Bulova has said she will also announce the rest of the commission's membership.


Though the commission is a step, Herrity remains critical of the Board's lack of open discussion on the Geer case and others involving excessive and or lethal force by police officers.

"The most disturbing thing to me is we haven't had a Public Safety Committee meeting in well over a year," he said. "I don't know why not, there's not a good answer. And too much of the board's discussion has been in closed session. We need to get out into open session and have a dialog on our policies and practices and get them fixed."

BULOVA'S COMMISSION will have the opportunity to review both the county's search for "independent expertise" on releasing information on officerinvolved incidents and the Police Department's policies and training regarding use of force.



Managing Mental Illness in Jails

Natasha McKenna's death provides window on national concern.

national report released on Feb. 11 highlighted the prevalence of people with mental illness incarcerated in local jails.

"Serious mental illness, which includes bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, and major depression, affects an estimated 14.5 percent of men and 31 percent of women in jails — rates that are four to six times higher than in the general population.

... While most people with serious mental illness in jails, both men and women, enter jail charged with minor, nonviolent crimes, they end up staying in jail for longer periods of time." See vera.org.

Natasha McKenna, a woman with a long history of severe mental illness, died on Feb. 8, five days after being repeatedly shocked with a taser, restrained, hooded and forcibly removed from her cell by six deputy sheriffs "pursuant to its protocols for managing combative inmates.'

McKenna, a small woman according to press

reports, had been held in the Fairfax County Detention Center since Jan. 26, on a warrant from the City of Alexandria. Fairfax deputies were forcibly extracting her from her cell so she could be transported to the Alexandria jail.

Here is part of the police release on the inci-

"During the struggle to restrain McKenna, a member of the Sheriff's Emergency Response Team deployed a conducted energy weapon (Taser) on McKenna. While being restrained, deputies placed a spit net (which is designed to restrict and prevent spitting) on McKenna.

A nurse from the ADC medical staff was present at that time to check on her prior to transport and cleared her for transport. Deputies attempted to put

her in a medical transport chair, but McKenna continued to be combative and was moved to a restraint chair for transport."

To understand a little of what was happening, search for images of "spit net" and "prisoner restraint chair."

When the emergency response team was getting ready to load McKenna into a vehicle, "medical personnel from the Fairfax County Sheriff's Office checked McKenna and determined she was experiencing a medical emergency."

McKenna never regained consciousness.

The incident was recorded on video, but "the video is currently retained as evidence by detectives from the Fairfax County Police Department and will not be released at this time."

Less than two weeks after McKenna's death, the public knows a lot more about the details of this incident than previous cases involving the Fairfax County Police, but questions of what happened, how and why, greatly outnumber

It is standard operating procedure in the United States to warehouse disruptive people with mental illness in jails. A 2006 Special Report by the Bureau of Justice Statistics estimated that 705,600 mentally ill adults were incarcerated in state prisons, 78,800 in Federal prisons and 479,900 in local jails, according to the National Institute for Corrections.

We have to ask what constitutes humane, effective treatment for people with mental illness, and often substance use disorders, who end up in jails. Are the brutal images of Natasha McKenna's handling a common experience for people with severe mental illness in jails? While deaths resulting from such incidents are rare, they do occur. What can be done to provide

Breastfeeding is About Life

To the Editor:

As a fairly new Virginia resident, I like reading your summaries of county and state government actions that impact us all, including the General Assembly's crossover bills featured in your February 19-25 issue. I'd like to share one more. HB1499 protects mothers who breastfeed their babies in public; Del. Dave Albo is one of the co-patrons. With its passage in both chambers and a promised signature from Governor Terry McAuliffe, the Commonwealth will become the #48 state in the U.S. to support breastfeeding mothers and their right to feed their babies wherever necessary – be it a restaurant, rec center or retail store or any other public or private space where nursing moms find themselves needing to feed their children.

The grassroots coalition, VA Alliance for Breastfeeding Laws with its leaders Rebecca Geller (a local attorney and mother) and Kate Noon, should be commended for this family-focused effort. Concerned moms and dads from all breastfeeding is recommended by over the state contacted their legislators, visited Richmond, and testified in support of the bill during its various committee hearings.

When babies are hungry, they

we shouldn't be scared into using a designated lounge, public bathroom, or, worse yet, be told to leave the premises. Nursing is about sustaining human life. It's about growing a little human being into an adult. It's about life.

Studies by medical experts prove breastfeeding is best for babies. There are numerous health and emotional benefits to the baby and the mother. (The World Health Organization spells these out: http://www.who.int/nutrition/topics/ exclusive_breastfeeding/en/) There are economic advantages as well, as families and the Commonwealth (when helping our families through WIC and other supports) do not have to spend money on formula. About 80.5-percent of new Virginia moms breastfeed their babies at birth (CDC, statistics by state, 2014 report). By 6 months, it's only 53.7-percent who exclusively breastfeed or do a combination of breastmilk and formula to nourish their babies. By 1 year, it's 27.4-percent. Yet, the American Academy of Pediatricians at least until a baby turns 1-year old.

I am a mother as well as a volunteer who helps moms with need to eat. As nursing mothers, breastfeeding. I can share that

women experience many "boobytraps" in their breastfeeding journey that cause this statistical plunge. There are medical issues and societal issues. Not being able to breastfeed in public – or feel comfortable doing so – is one of those traps. When babies are infants, they are often eating every 2-3 hours. Not being protected to nurse in public, some women "shelter in place" in their homes. Yet, moms still need to

work, shop, take care of our families and carry on with daily life. Being restricted on where we can "legally" nurse in public makes breastfeeding success and life in general a little more difficult. And we don't need to make life more difficult for mothers; we need to support them for success! I'm so glad we'll finally have a law on the books to do just that.




