Katie's Cars and Coffee – Something Special

Weekly car show draws car enthusiasts and families.

arly Saturday mornings for three hours, the Great Falls Village Town Centre transforms into a spectacle of antique cars, new cars, custom cars, exotic cars and as of last Saturday, a never-before-seen in the Washington area car, as part of the weekly event Katie's Cars & Coffee.

The outdoor cars and coffee show, named for its locale Katie's Coffee House owned by Mike Kearney, began five years ago on April 3, 2010, as the brainchild of Kearney's frequent customer and friend Bob Morris.

Morris had visited a cars and coffee show in California and returned to Kearney with the suggestion of starting a similar show in Great Falls at Katie's. When Kearney agreed and Morris suggested holding the show from seven to nine on a Saturday morning, Kearney remembers being apprehensive of the time.

"I told Bob it was crazy to think people would be here at seven to nine in the morning, even coming from Bob Morris, who is in Katie's almost every morning at opening time," Kearney said.

KATIE'S AVERAGES 500 plus cars every week, and most arrive even before 7 a.m.

The first cars roll into the parking lot at 5 a.m. to secure the best spots.

Kearney finds it ironic now that the early morning hours is the time that works.

"Now that we are averaging 500 plus cars every Saturday for our show, the other Town Centre merchants would only really put up with us so much as long as we promise them we will be over by nine," he said. "If you show up at 9:30, it's all gone and you may never know it even existed."

Consistent appearances are Ferraris, Lamborghinis, Aston Martins, Porsches, Corvettes, Mustangs, the classics and many, many more.

A website titled katiescarsandcoffee.com that is not affiliated with Katie's Coffee House describes the show as a "scene out of your dreams after an intense day of car magazine reading" with cars of "every type imaginable."


Mazda of North America showcased the pre-production 2016 MX-5 Miata at Saturday's show. Collier Hyams, president of the Mazda Sportscar Club of Washington, D.C. helped arrange the showcase. Hyams initially learned of the show after playing Celtic music at The Old Brogue Irish Pub, the counterpart of Katie's Coffee House.

"I heard about the show and thought, 'Oh that's nice, they have a little parking lot to put cars in,' and then when I came here, I actually could not believe it," he said.

While this particular Mazda model has not been shown before in the Washington area, Hyams was still surprised at the large audiences it drew because of the Mazda's neighbors.

"It's parked next to two Ferraris, so I think it's amazing that it's generated this much response," he said.

Another fan favorite on Saturday was a long line of seven Ford GTs parked along-side one another with open hoods.

Chris Li, who grew up in Fairfax County and has been coming to the show for years, purchased a GT a little over a year ago and helped organize what he called a "smatter





ing of different types, tunes, modifications and personalities" of Ford GTs at Saturday's Cars and Coffee.

Li said the decision to bring the cars to a local show stemmed from conversations between some of the GTs' owners who were at the Carlisle Ford Nationals last May in Pennsylvania.

"I said you need to go to the biggest one in the area and when they asked where, I told them, Great Falls," Li said.

Cars and Coffee is the largest regular show of its kind on the East Coast, but Kearney believes what really makes the show unique is its local feel.

"With the layout of the shopping center and town, each car gets individual space and attention which is different from other shows," he said. "People really enjoy that local "coal."

Attendees of Katie's Cars and Coffee have the chance to enter a raffle for a classic Mustang convertible, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Bailey's Crossroads. Proceeds from the raffle benefit the charitable projects of the Rotary Club of Bailey's Crossroads.

Pat Borowski, the club president as of July 1, said the club loves sharing a fondness of cars with the show's visitors for a good cause.

"We get great traffic and terrific purchases on our raffle here, and that is a great thing," she said. "I have been consistently impressed by how many cars and how many people come every week." **MANY CAR OWNERS** have made coming to Katie's Cars and Coffee a regular part of their weekly schedule.

John Swift, a resident of Vienna, comes every week with either his 1979 CBX Honda 6 or 2014 Corvette. He said his favorite part about the show is "seeing all the different cars and talking to the people with cars, as it's an easy way to make friends."

He added, "I have Motorola in my blood. It's been there since I was 14 and I changed my first engine."

But the show does not just attract car enthusiasts – families are regular attendees as well. Mothers and fathers strolling the long lines of cars with their children and pets are a common occurrence every Saturday.

Katie's sells close to 1,000 cups of coffee, as well as almost 100 breakfast burritos and 150 breakfast paninis made with fresh local eggs every Saturday morning. Fresh muffins from artisan bakery Baguette Republic in Sterling and warm donuts delivered every Saturday morning from Duck Donuts in Herndon are also available for purchase.

Kearney said he loves how much energy the show brings to Great Falls on what otherwise would be a quiet and sleepy Saturday morning.

"It is the only day of the week that I get up at 4:30 a.m.," he said. "But to get here with all the cars, and see all these smiley people who get a kick in their step, is just something special." Safe Planning for Independence

Talking and planning about celebrating July 4, and throughout the summer months.

EDITORIAL

ndependence Day is a national celebration, and for many, that celebration includes alcohol. The summer overall and July 4 in particular are times of greater risk for drinking and driving.

This is true for the young adults over 21 living with you, and unfortunately also for many teens who are under 21. More on that below.

For all revelers in independence: Make a plan. Plan to celebrate with access to public transportation. Plan to have a designated driver. Plan to celebrate in a place safe and comfortable to spend the night.

But in case those plans go awry, here is an alternative safety net.

On the night of Saturday, July 4, the Washington Regional Alcohol Program will offer free taxi rides home (up to \$30), beginning at 10 p.m. for six hours until 4 a.m. the morning of July 5. Participants must be at least 21. Call 1-800-200-TAXI.

On July 4, 2014, more than 150 people used WRAP's SoberRide service rather than possibly driving home impaired.

In summer, 44 percent of all U.S. traffic

deaths are caused by alcohol-impaired drivers, according to statistics provided by WRAP. SoberRide is a way to help keep local roads safe from impaired drivers during this traditionally high-risk holiday.

> On July 4, historically, nearly 40 percent of traffic deaths in the U.S. are caused by drunk drivers; more than 20 percent of the drunk drivers involved

in those deaths during the 2013 July 4 holiday had blood alcohol concentrations of nearly twice the legal limit, said Kurt Erickson of

For parents of young adults who may be living at home and parents of those under 21, this is time to talk. Ask about plans, ask specifically about getting home. Remind those over 21 to take the WRAP phone number with

While you hope that young adults under 21 aren't drinking — because there are lots of dangers to binge drinking beyond drinking and driving - you know that many of them will be drinking. Talk with your teens about the problems of binge drinking. Let your younger family members know that you would much

rather pay for a cab or come get them yourself than run the risk of losing them.

This is a message important for the tail end of graduation season and good for the whole summer, which is the time of the highest risk for teen drivers.

Since 1993, WRAP's SoberRide program has provided more than 62,500 free cab rides home to would-be drunk drivers in the Greater Washington area.

Comments On Piney Run Bridge

To the Editor:

My thanks go to the Connection and reporter for covering VDOT's public information meeting concerning the Piney Run bridge replacement project on Walker Road. Unfortunately, my comments somehow came out sounding as if they had been run through Google Translate. I would like to clarify and amplify on those remarks. I am a frequent user of Walker Road and I have seen the roadway blocked by flash flood waters countless times. The current configuration is dangerous and obsolete. I came to the meeting in the hope that the bridge would be widened to two lanes and the approaches raised to reduce closures due to flooding. I well remember a "300 year" flood event several years ago that scoured away large chunks of asphalt, necessitating an extended closure and emergency repairs. Happily, both raising the height of the bridge and widening it are included in the designs. It is standard for VDOT to include pedestrian crossing options in its design

Design Option #1, which does not have a sidewalk. It is clear that there are many neighbors opposed to a trail in front of their homes and any pedestrian traffic on this stretch of Walker Road is years away from realization. It is better to make the more economical and practical choice of simply widening the bridge. If voluntary trail easements ever reach the bridge a decision can be made then. It is premature to do so now.

How to Pay for Medicaid Expansion?

To the Editor:

State Delegate Ken Plum's latest commentary on Medicaid expansion ("Political Prospects for Medicaid Expansion," The Connection, June 4) is not the first time he has written on the subject, but he has yet to explain how Virginia would pay for this. If one understands the proposal correctly, the federal government will fund the program using "federal funds" (a euphemism for taxpayer dollars) the first two years, with Virginia then starting to pick up

increasingly larger shares of the program in out years. Virginia's tab would start with 10 percent of the cost after the first two "teaser" years paid by those Federal funds and then progressively increase.

Given Governor McAuliffe's own previously announced multi-year deficit of \$2.4 billion, \$882 million over the next two years, and potential state employee lay-offs, where would that money come from—even for the ten percent? Law enforcement? Education? Transportation? Higher taxes? What happens when the Medicaid expansion becomes a line item in the Virginia budget for perpetuity?

As a delegate, Del. Plum has fiduciary and fiscal responsibility to manage the budget for all Virginians. Those favoring a Medicaid expansion in the State—predominantly Democrats-who write such commentaries, do not discuss cost specifics—i.e., how to pay for it—when it would become a permanent line item in the Virginia budget. Currently, commendable altruism exceeds the reality of the balance in the state's checkbook as confirmed by Governor McAuliffe's own projections. Republican-led fiscal prudence and fiduciary responsibility on this issue is the correct course of action for Virginia.



Gone But Always Remembered

As Father's Day approaches, (written Thursday, June 18th) I am reminded of one of my father's standard lines which characterize his positive attitude on life, for which I am eternally grateful - because I inherited it. My father would say that every morning that he woke up was a good day. Ultimately, my father would die a few months past his 87th birthday, having lived longer than either of his parents and his seven siblings. A child of the Depression, born in 1919, he spent his formative years not playing Little League baseball as I did, but rather selling newspapers and hot dogs at Fenway Park in Boston. Upon his return home, his mother would hold out her apron, into which my father would pour his day's earnings. At that time, life was not so much an adventure as it was finding a job/way to make money so the family could eat. His mother/my grandmother worked for a caterer, and at the end of her day, she would bring home remnants of her day's/evening's work: food that was discarded before the meal (chicken wings were not so highly regarded then as they are now.) My father/the Lourie family ate chicken wings often. And throughout his life, my father was happiest when eating chicken wings. The experience did not weaken him; it seemed to make him stronger and more grateful for what good fortune fell upon him later in life. In fact, all he ever wanted in life - aside from the obvious things, was "a hot meal and clean sheets." His upbringing and the hardships he endured seemed to simplify his life.

Another story he would tell - with a smile was concerning the bathroom in the tenement building where he lived with his nine other family members: it was down the hall, outside of the apartment in which he lived. There was no toilet paper; toilet paper cost money, money which they didn't have. There were, however, catalogues (Sears, Montgomery Ward, etc.) that were mailed and thus were free. Tenants would cut the pages into squares and hang them in the bathroom on a nail convenient to the commode. My father never complained about this; they were too poor to complain. Occasionally though, staples were not removed from all the squares.
Unfortunately, my father, like many other residents I'm sure, found out a bit too late. I imagine there was some pain and suffering, but my father always laughed when he told this story, as much for others' benefit no doubt as it was for his.

And so too do I try to make people laugh when I am asked to share my cancer stories. do this because my father always found the humor in things. And before I realized what I was doing and/or why I was doing it, it became clear that unbeknownst to me, I had been following a family tradition and one I am most proud to be continuing. This is not to say that being diagnosed with "terminal" cancer is a wonderful opportunity to find humor and attempt to make people laugh. Nevertheless, I'm not going to be negative. After all, I am my father's son. Of that I'm positive

One of the other things I'm super-positive about was how helpful my father would have been had he lived to see me diagnosed with cancer. He would have been my biggest booster, my 24-7 support staff, my unwavering source of encouragement, my inspiration, my up whenever I was down; a man anyone would be lucky to call dad; although I actually called him "Beez," the nickname given to him by his fellow knothole gang members (Benet was his given name). Whatever good fortune I'm able to experience going forward though, I'll do so with gratitude and the acknowledgment that none of it would have happened without having had the father I did and hearing about the life he led. Thanks for everything, "Beez." I'll see you Sunday.
