Picnic with the President Mount Vernon Neighborhood Friends raising money to upgrade fire suppression.

orne Campbell was told the historic property he bought on Robertson Boulevard was once part of an area where George Washington liked to have his pigs graze.

"It gives us an excuse to eat like a pig," said Campbell's daughter Jasmine. Originally from Australia, Campbell moved to the United

States and became a naturalized the five farms of his estate. THE GAZETTE American citizen. In 2001 he purchased the property.

> As an Aussie transplant, Campbell said he "thought buying a piece of America would be amazing." The family's living room is now adorned with two portraits of the Revolutionary War General.

The Campbell's are part of a community of homeowners with residences on the roughly 500 acres where Washington operated

For decades, the Neighborhood Friends group has supported the estate, including a program to fund maintenance and restoration projects.

Over the years, those projects have included re-shingling the mansion roof, restoring the windows of the mansion, reconstructing the blacksmith shop and repairing the east lawn slope.

"They really have stepped up to

do the not-so-sexy projects," said George Washington's Mount Vernon director of special gifts Carolina Camargo, "but they're crucial to keeping Mount Vernon going."

This year, the Neighborhood Friends group has undertaken helping fund a \$2 million endeavor to replace the mansion's outdated fire suppression system.

In the 1980s, Camargo said, a vacuum system was installed.

Though it was never required to be used, in the case of a theoretical fire, the mansion would be evacuated and the system would suck out all the air, keeping any fire from continuing or spreading.

But the generations-old home, Camargo said, turns out to be full of tiny holes, rendering this process much less effective. The new system, which has already started being implemented, provides a

Coleman Honored At West Point

ugene J. Coleman, III, of Alexandria, was named First Captain/Brigade Commander at the U.S. Military Academy on July 30.

Coleman, a graduate of the Class of 2012 at Mount Vernon High School, is now in his last year West Point. First Captain/Brigade Commander is the highest honor among the 4,400-member Corps of Cadets. In addition, he is president of the Class of 2016.

Because of his active involvement and leadership at West Point, he was one of two cadets selected to represent West Point at the NAACP Image Awards in Pasadena, Calif. in February 2014.

Coleman is a former student representative to the Fairfax County School Board for the 2011-2012 term. At his final school board meeting, he was honored as he received many accolades for his accomplishments while representing over 175,000 students. room-by-room "mist" that should be better able to isolate the fire.

The plan is to install the system throughout the estate's mansion and then move on to the outbuildings.

In the event of a fire, Mount Vernon staff would be able to rely on detailed digital documentation of every aspect of the house, a project undertaken by the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association, to restore it exactly as it was.

To help raise the money for the new mist fire-suppression system, the Neighborhood Friends hosted its annual Family Night Picnic in the evening on Aug. 23. Camargo said they expected around 1,700 friends, representing 1,600 households in the Mount Vernon area.

Families converged on the East Lawn of the estate overlooking the Potomac River and grazed on food from the new Alexandria Wegmans grocery store and refreshing beverages provided by Anheuser-Busch.

Together with those and other sponsors, Neighborhood Friends dues and other donations, Camargo said \$1.2 million of the \$2 million has already been raised for the fire-suppression system.

The evening's activities included horse-drawn wagon rides, a chance to explore the estate's own modern fire truck and play period games like "game of graces" and rolling hoops.

"It's wonderful the tradition this place has kept together," said Erik Kohler, who lives in Stratford on the Potomac and whose mother is a member of the Neighborhood Friends group.

Fan Causes House Fire

Schools Need Support at All Levels

t is encouraging to read in a recent Connection commentary by Jim Corcoran, president and CEO Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce ("Now Is Time to Unite for Education"), that the chamber is taking seriously the funding crisis facing Fairfax County Public Schools. Mr. COMMENTARY

Corcoran is absolutely right that K-12 spending at the state level has not kept pace with rising enrollments and costs. In fact, Virginia now ranks in the top 10 nationally in measures of wealth, but in the bottom 10 in support for public schools. Virginia ranks 41st out of 50 states in K-12 funding.

After eight years of painful budget cuts, the deep deficit FCPS faces for FY 2017 - perhaps in the range of \$100 million — is certainly due in part to chronic underfunding of public schools at the state level. However, the relative share of state and county contributions to the FCPS operating budget has not changed in that time. The annual transfer from the Fairfax County government to the schools has also not kept pace with growing enrollments and costs. FCPS is spending \$1,000 less per child, in real dollars, than in 2008 - the state and county governments share this responsi-

Mr. Corcoran correctly points out that FCPS has received increased funding from the county over the years. It is important to note that during the last eight years, however, enrollment growth and rising costs have outpaced increased revenue by \$500 M. In FY 2015, for example, the county increased the transfer to the school system by 3 percent resulting in an increase in revenue of \$51.5 M. In that same year, FCPS experienced unavoidable cost increases totaling \$78 M: a required increase to the Virginia Retirement System of \$38.9 M; health rate increases of \$19.9 M; and enrollment growth of \$19.5 M.

To balance the cumulative effects of inad-

equate budgets since 2008, FCPS has had to raise class size three times and forego regular teacher step increases four times, budget choices that are simply not sustainable. In that time the relative share of county and state funding has not changed, so both funding bodies are responsible for the very challenging position FCPS finds itself in today.

It is past time for school systems, local governments, PTAs, employee associations and businesses throughout Virginia to join forces and hold the General Assembly accountable for its responsibility to fully fund K-12 education in every corner of the Commonwealth. The Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce has an opportunity to lead the business community in that fight.

I hope the chamber also takes a leading role in local advocacy for full funding of FCPS for FY 2017 and beyond.

As Mr. Corcoran has often said, great public schools are the smartest investment we can make in our local economy. We are stronger together.

Long Delay Inexcusable

To the Editor:

On Aug. 29, 2013, John Geer was shot and killed by Officer Adam D. Torres of the Fairfax County Police Department as he stood unarmed in the doorway of his home in Springfield. This unjust and unprovoked shooting death caused great concern among the citizens of Fairfax County. Unfortunately, Commonwealth Attorney Raymond F. Morrogh allowed this tragic event to be ignored for nearly two

years. Until recently he impaneled a special grand jury to hear this case. On Monday, Aug. 17, 2015, the grand jury indicted Torres and charged him with second-degree murder. The indictment of Torres in the killing of 46-yearold John Geer marks the first time in the 75year history of the Fairfax County police Department that an officer has faced criminal prosecution in connection with an on-duty shooting. In Virginia, second-degree murder is punishable by confinement in a state correctional facility for not less than five years and nor more than 40 years. If convicted, Torres deserves an appropriate confinement.

As to Commonwealth Attorney Morrogh, his long delay in presenting this matter to a special grand jury is inexcusable. He failed in his duty to serve and protect the citizens of Fairfax County. This is just one example of Morrogh's failure to act appropriately as our prosecutor. Hopefully when his term of office comes to an end, he will retire or not seek re-election. We deserve better of our elected officials.



Jones Makes Biscuits With Own Personalities

Eatery mixes tradition with "Not So Classic."

wo women stood with noses pressed to the window at Stomping Ground on Mt. Vernon Avenue in Del Ray. "Oh, no," one of them said. "I didn't know it was closed on Monday. I've eaten here three times since they opened in May. I love their salads; they are so fresh." Disappointed, they head down the street looking for a second choice.

Nicole Jones, chef at Stomping Ground, said, "the Farmer's salad is different every day made with what's fresh at the market."

IN THE

The front window advertises a crab cake sammie (their nick-KITCHEN name for sandwich) on a house potato roll with homemade

tater chips and pickles. But the mainstay of the menu is biscuits - with homemade peach jelly or plum jam, with sorghum butter, pimento cheese or nutella, all made by the house-or "The Favorite" made with organic eggs, Benton bacon from Tennessee and Hooks cheese from Wisconsin. She said by using the best ingredients they can focus on the basics and don't need a lot of special sauces. On the other hand, her own favorite is the "Not So Classic" which has fried chicken with za'Atar spices, honey, hot sauce, red onion and benne seed tahini.

Jones measures flour into a large aluminum bowl. "I use white Lily cake flour. Southern grandmothers won't use anything else." She says she spent her formative years in Georgia. She uses equal parts butter and Crisco. The secret is to have it really cold. "The colder it is, the higher they rise." Jones uses both baking powder and baking soda. "One mistake people make is to put in too much baking powder to help it rise. But then it has a weird metallic aftertaste."

One fat goes in first and her hands squeeze it between her fingers until it

breaks down it into pea size pieces. Jones said, "I like to feel it. With a pastry blender you can't. The only way to describe it is to smudge it — I guess I just invented a new cooking term." Next Jones makes a well in the flour mixture and mixes in the buttermilk with a wooden spoon. "The wooden spoon is important. I don't know why. This is a critical juncture where the liquid hits the gluten; the clock starts ticking." Then she turns the dough twice and forms it into a rectangle about 1-1/2" thick. Carefully pushing down an aluminum form, she cuts out the biscuits side by side. "This is another place people screw up; they turn the cutter. You have these nice flaky layers,



placing them side by side on the baking sheet, careful not to turn the form and ruin the flaky layers she has created by laminating the dough.

called laminating the dough, and the last thing you want to do is pinch the dough by turning the cutter. "We're always fighting the tough."

Jones said making biscuits can be different every day. If it feels on the tacky side you add more flour; if it's humid outside, you add less buttermilk. It can depend on the thick-

ness of the buttermilk, the weather, the amount of patting you do. She said this can be difficult for restaurants that are in the consistency business. In the beginning the menu was more extensive, but then Jones realized she was just coming up with novel ideas for the sake of making dishes. Now she is focusing on her original goal: good food and good service. She says she encourages the wait staff to sample everything so they can translate it to the customers. She said, "Good food can't save bad service." The menu has now expanded to dinner and includes one-dish community dinners on Thursdays and Fridays, fun things like a low-country boil.

Jones spends a lot of time educating. "I take that really seriously." But she said, "I walk a line between the excited, living and breathing food to something that doesn't land well with the public." For instance, she tried sorghum butter with the biscuits. Sorghum is a Southern substitute for molasses and goes back to the slave trade, as do many Southern foods. Cassie Meddis, the manager, said, "They freaked out (in a good way) about the sorghum butter honestly. I love the South. I miss it." But they have tried to transplant Southern hospitality to Del

Peach jam cooks all day on a burner next to the biscuit counter. "It's been all about peach this year because the peaches have been so good." On an average day the cook makes 400-600 biscuits in small batches so they can be served fresh and warm. Jones says everyone's biscuits look different but "we're very comfortable with them if they look unique." Her grandmother in Lithuania, who made Jones fall in love with food used to say, "You can learn a lot about a person from their biscuits."

5 Top Spots to Watch College, NFL Football

he days are getting slightly shorter, the air has a familiar crispness to it, and the dog days of summer have a little less bite. All of this can mean only one thing: The college and NFL football seasons are on the way. From beers to

Ramparts Tavern and Grill, 1700 Fern St.

Televisions dot the walls — behind the bar, on the sides of the pub, and behind you and they're tuned at any given time to half a dozen games. Pull up a chair, ask for a local brew (Port City's always on tap), and when you get hungry, order some chili nachos, wings, or their trademark "hot peas" — flash-fried black-eyed peas that are a finger-food staple.

Bugsy's Pizza, 111 King St.

To be perfectly honest, no self-respecting list of college-football viewing spots can leave out Bugsy's, a pizza mainstay on lower King Street in Old Town. While the downstairs dining room offers great service and great pizza, the upstairs is where you'll want to go to catch the big (or little) game. The sports bar is cozy but welcoming; you needn't feel like you have to be a regular to sit back and watch your favorite team play. Order one of the restaurant's specialty pizzas — you can't go wrong with the Farmer's Market or Taco pies — and a pitcher of beer with some friends and you'll be in excellent shape. The restaurant's pasta and calzone options are great choices, too.

Reynolds Street Bar and Grill, 34 Reynolds

Situated just off of Duke Street in the West End of Alexandria, Reynolds Street Bar and Grill has plenty of character – and, during games, plenty of characters, too. This eatery is far and away one of Alexandria's quintessential sports bars, sporting


Southside 815, 815 S. Washington St.

Let's get one thing straight: You'll always find a crowd awaiting you at Southside. But in general, it's a friendly crowd, and there's always one bar stool available just for you. From the time the restaurant opens at 11:30 a.m. on Saturdays until closing time, the sports bar draws a crowd, and the multiple televisions are turned to all the major games. If you're looking for an appetizer to share, you can't go wrong with the Boardinghouse Breadbasket — an array of cornbreads, biscuits, and more — or the Southside nachos, which will surely feed a crowd. If you're looking for hearty meal for one, the sausage biscuits and gravy are offered during brunch on the weekends (perfect for the noon game), and the jambalaya pasta will carry you through in the evening.

Theismann's Restaurant and Bar, 1800 **Diagonal Road**

Of course, no football-viewing list is complete without Theismann's, founded nearly four decades ago by Washington football team quarterback Joe Theismann. The bar is a great place to watch the game with no interruptions; the dining room offers a more relaxed viewing experience. (And on nice days, if the game is going poorly you can abandon it entirely and sit outside.) The restaurant offers brunch, lunch, and dinner on the weekends; you'd do well to order the CAB salad if you're feeling virtuous, and the crab cakes if you're not.



Mount Vernon's Miller Commits to Old Dominion

hen Mount Vernon's Jessica
Miller was younger, she
dreamed about a day when
she could compete in college sports. However, up until her sophomore year of high school, she'd never
thought that she would be playing Division
I field hockey.

"I have been interested in collegiate sports since I was very young; however, my family, friends, and I always thought it would be for soccer," Miller wrote in an email. "I knew I was interested in playing field hockey in college at the end of my sophomore year when I was chosen to represent Virginia in the National Futures Championship."

The National Futures Championship is an annual event hosted by Team USA to help elite players refine their skills and garner interest from collegiate coaches. Miller, who received feedback from multiple coaches, verbally committed to Old Dominion University (ODU) in June, becoming the first field hockey player from Mount Vernon to commit to play at the Division I level in quite some time.

"It's very exciting for me to be able to make a Division I field hockey team. It has been a goal of mine, and I'm excited to be able to represent Mount Vernon High

School," Miller wrote. "I am really looking forward to the high level of play and learning from the coaching staff. I have always done well when I am being pushed. I am very competitive and I want to succeed. I still have a lot of work to do regarding my skill and I'm ready to work for my spot on the field."

As a freshman, sophomore, and junior, Miller served as a captain of Mount Vernon's varsity soccer team. After playing soccer for 12 years, and only picking up field hockey once she got to high school, Miller decided to channel her energy into her field hockey career and make soccer her secondary sport.

"My sophomore year, I decided to quit my

club soccer team and do the Futures field hockey training," Miller wrote. "After that I knew field hockey would be my main sport. I ... just got tired of [soccer]."

Miller will not return to the school's soccer program this spring.

The two-time all-region selection and second-team all-state defensive midfielder didn't find the recruiting process easy. To catch the attention of ODU's coaching staff, Miller attended numerous camps hosted by the school, participated in an Olympic development program, and competed on a select team, Capitol Pegasus.

"The recruiting process is not a fun process to say the least," Miller wrote. "There were many weekends that I would wake up at 4:30 a.m. and have to be down in Virginia Beach by 8:45 a.m. and have a weekend of training for 14 hours. Many college coaches go to the tournaments to scout. One week a coach will email you and then the next week they won't. It is a very frustrating process."

Miller's coach was able to provide a letter of recommendation to the coaches at ODU, which helped Miller get the attention she needed.

"Coach [Jessica] Edwards inspires me to do my best because she has believed in me from the start," Miller wrote. "She has put so much time and effort into me and the rest of the team every season and I don't want to let her down."



Baywood Hotels is planning to break ground this fall on a 92-room hotel in the Woodlawn area.

Penn Daw area of U.S. Route 1

The former Penn Daw Plaza shopping center was rezoned as part of a 2012 Comprehensive Plan amendment for the Penn Daw area and is set to be replaced by a mixed-use development. The development will feature 400 apartments, 41 townhomes and ground-level retail. The Shelby, a luxury apartment community at 6200 N Kings Highway, has already been built out by Insight Properties. The project team is hoping to break ground by the end of 2015

33-acres along U.S. Rt. 1 by Lockheed Blvd.

In March, members of the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing authority voted in favor of moving forward with interim agreement to develop the remaining 33 acres of North Hill. (Fifteen acres out of a 1981 land purchase have been developed as Woodley Hills Estates.) The Community Housing Partners of Virginia and Philadelphiabased developer Pennrose partnership have proposed building 329 multi-family apartments in two separate buildings, 144 townhomes and leaving some space for a park.

The Hersha Group has finished with demolition of the Fairview Motel and obtained construction permits to move forward with a new 108-room development renamed Fairfield Inn & Suites. Construction is moving forward.

Once the site of Habitat for Humanity's ReStore, Gold's is undergoing a \$2 million expansion while continuing to operate. No completion date has been released, however work is finished on a new saltwater pool and construction is nearly finished.

Widening of Richmond Highway Still Underway

3.5 miles of U.S. Rt. 1 between Mount Vernon Memorial Highway and Telegraph Road

The \$180 million project to widen Route 1 from four to six lanes, while also accommodating mass transit, bicycles and walking, is expected to be completed in 2016.

"Embark Richmond Highway" transportation and land use planning team for Route 1, Bus Rapid Transit and Metro Expansion

The team is a collaboration of Fairfax County staff from various departments and agencies working with a 13-member citizen advisory group to help coordinate community input. The next meeting is open to the public and scheduled to take place Sep. 21 in the South County Government Center at 8 a.m.

The Parker at Huntington Station

Adjacent to the Huntington Metro on Huntington Avenue.

The decades-old VSE office building situated by the Huntington Metro was torn down and is set to be replaced a 390-unit, four-to-six-story residential development, as well as a 15-story, 260,000 square foot office-retail building and a 150-room hotel. Rezoning and a site plan were approved in 2012, and apartments and a parking garage are nearing completion. They are pre-leasing.

Lennar multi-family housing development "Huntington Crossing"

The project team has just applied for re-zoning for the 6.3 acres site adjacent to the Huntington Metro and right up against the water. The draft plan calls for five stories and approximately 360 units, however hearings are not yet scheduled.

Welcome from Fairfax County Police Chief Roessler

Dear Community Members:

The Fairfax County Police Department was established on July 1, 1940 and today we have an authorized strength of 1,372 sworn law enforcement officers who protect and serve the communities of the County. On average, officers respond to over 400,000 calls for service each year. As we engage with the communities we serve, we understand our profession must always assess our services and constantly strive to challenge each other to re-engineer how we deliver essential law enforcement services in a community that exceeds 1.1 million residents. We are fortunate to have an engaged community which continues to assist us

in preventing and fighting crime, increasing the culture of safety to preserve the sanctity of life for all, and keep pace with rapid urbanization.

Your Police Department proactively undertook an independent review of its use of force training, and related policies and procedures. The review, conducted by the Police Executive Research Forum, proposed 71 enhancement recommendations. The core theme of change is adopting the philosophy of the sanctity of life in all we do. We have initiated policy changes and embarked on many training programs which embrace state-of-the-art decision making models and best practices for de-escalation and escalation techniques and new initiatives to safely interact and divert from jail those suffering mental illness. Currently 43 percent of our patrol officers are certified in Crisis Intervention Team training and all

recruits now receive parallel training.

Other recent policy changes include the concepts of being able to hold and contain events in order to develop successful resolutions to each call for service when possible.

In 2014, the Police Department began a self-assessment process to align all of its policies and procedures to com-

ply with several hundred national standards established by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. The on-site assessment, required to obtain accredited status, is scheduled for early 2016 and will be conducted by assessors from outside the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Department continues to maintain its accredited status from the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commis-

During the last year the Department's social media presence has continued to expand in efforts toward sharing more information with the community. Recently the Department posted 10 years of officer-involved shooting case summaries and data on our public web site. Our goal is to share information on officer-involved shooting cases in order for the community to better understand the investigative processes of

these events and to engage in dialogue on these matters.

In 2013, the Department created a Chief's Council on Diversity Recruitment. Its strategic mission is to assist the Department to increase the cultural diversity of the sworn, civilian, and volunteer workforce to better reflect the diversity of the communities we serve. When visiting the Chief's web site you can view the diversity scorecard accountability measure, read the Council's strategic plan document, and learn about the varied volunteer opportunities you can engage in with the Police Department.

Several community members have graciously volunteered time from their busy personal lives to establish and serve on a Communities of Trust Committee which is comprised of all public safety agencies and reports directly to the chairman of the County Board of Supervisors. This effort aligns well with recommendations from the Task Force on 21st Century Policing. Many forums have been held throughout the community and numerous initiatives are in development to increase public engagement with the community to build upon mutual

The Police Department, along with the Community Services Board, other public safety agencies, and mental health advocates have partnered to develop additional crisis intervention programs, including a drop off center which will provide a viable jail diversion alternative for those in mental health crisis. We look forward to achieving this critical strategic goal.

In recent years a majority of our homicides have been domestic related. On July 1, 2015, the Fairfax County Police Department launched a Lethality Assessment Program in which all patrol officers have been

trained to administer an assessment to provide resources to victims of domestic violence which are available 24/7. This program truly demonstrates engagement with many partners who share our goal in increasing services and eliminating domestic violence.

In early 2015 another community engagement endeavor was launched with the creation of the Ad Hoc Police Policy and Practices Commission. This Commission is comprised of five sub-committees which are conducting reviews of the Police Department as related to use of force; communications; recruitment, diversity, and applicant vetting; and independent oversight and investigations. The Commission will make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors this fall. The Police Department is highly engaged with all of the community members serving on the Commission and we look forward to positive change recommendations to better serve all of Fairfax County.

The Police Department values technology advances and we are migrating to a new records management system to assist all personnel in achieving an intelligence led community policing model. The Department is also preparing to institute an electronic summons system for issuing traffic and criminal violations. Our patrol cruisers are equipped with in-car video recording devices and we are exploring the viability of body worn cameras with community stakeholders.

Animal Welfare League of Alexandria

The Animal Welfare League of Alexandria

SERVING Animals

(AWLA) is responsible for animal services in the City of Alexandria, and also trains dogs, operates an animal shelter and provides humane education classes for children. According

to Megan Webb, Executive Director of AWLA, the group has 27 full- and part-time staffers and over 150 volunteers.

AWLA takes in animals that have been rescued by the city, as well as animals that have been surrendered by their owners. In the year 2013, AWLA adopted out 1,041 pets to families.

AWLA cares for wild as well as domestic animals, from deer to possums to raccoons. The group also works closely with local vet clinics, who provide medical services to sick or injured animals who need care before they are ready for adoption. Opportunities to foster puppies and kittens are also available through AWLA. For more information or to learn how to volunteer with AWLA, visit www.alexandriaanimals.org, or call 703-838-4774.

Fairfax County Animal Shelter

The Fairfax County Animal Shelter (FCAS) estimates that between 4,000 and 5,000 small animals come through its doors each year, according to its website. The shelter deals primarily with dogs and cats, but also other small animals like rabbits and

birds. A foster program is available through FCAS for the care of dogs and cats, and families who wish to be part of the foster program must go through a training session before taking animals into their homes. Other volunteer opportunities with the shelter range from telephone assistant to pet groomer and bather to cat socializer. Potential volunteers may submit an online application at fairfaxcounty.gov/animalshelter, and must attend a volunteer orientation. For information on volunteering or adopting a pet, visit the website or call 703-830-1100.

Humane Society of Fairfax County

The Humane Society of Fairfax County (HSFC) has a main office in Fairfax and a farm in Centreville. The farm is home to horses as well as nearly 30 dogs, according to HSFC Corresponding Secretary Marlene Hammer. A full-time manager lives at the farm to take care of the animals there.

The HSFC's main office is also home to the cats available for adoption through the group. Rather than being housed in crates, the cats are allowed to roam around in rooms at the shelter.

The Humane Society operates almost entirely on a volunteer basis. Aside from sheltering animals, they offer a pet food pantry as a service to the community and operate a thrift shop next door to the Fairfax location. Aside from one paid staff member, all proceeds from sales at the thrift shop go toward the shelter's operating costs. Visit www.hsfc.org or call 703-385-7387.





Dyke Marsh Wildlife Preserve, a Watery Wonderland

housands of drivers whiz through a Mount Vernon jewel every day, harried commuters and soccer parents zipping through a national park and a rare, freshwater, tidal, vanishing wetland. Few stop to watch a Halloween pennant dragonfly patrol the waters, a bald eagle eviscerate a fish, planthopper bugs suck sap or swamp mallow blossoms open to the sun.

The George Washington Memorial Parkway splices through the Dyke Marsh Wildlife Preserve in northern Mount Vernon along the Potomac River shoreline. It is the "nearest thing to primeval wilderness" in the Washington area, wrote Louis J. Halle in 1947 when he biked from the city at dawn to watch the wetland awaken. It was one of largest tidal, freshwater marshes in the Washington area and one of largest tidal, freshwater, temperate, climax, river-

ine, narrow-leafed cattail in the National Park Service (NPS) system.

Congress added the 485-acre preserve to the national park system in 1959 "so that

fish and wildlife development and their preservation as wetland wildlife habitat shall be paramount."

Dyke Marsh has 300 known species of

plants, 6,000 arthropods, 38 fish, 16 reptiles, 14 amphibians and over 230 birds. Parts of it are 2,000 years old.

The wetland once stretched to over 200

acres, but it has shriveled to a 60-acre, fragile remnant. Erosion eats away almost two acres a year, at an accelerating rate which means it will be gone in 20 years, concluded the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS).

Dredging from 1940 to 1972 that hauled away almost half of the marsh destabilized the whole system, changing it "from a semi-stable net depositional environment into a strongly erosional one," reported USGS.

Dyke Marsh is getting hit from all sides. On the west side, uncontrolled, mucky sediment flows into the marsh like lava during storms and turns the marsh orange.

Dyke Marsh has endured years of excavation, dumping, pollution, invasive species, poaching, illegal bow fishing, hunting, runoff, off-leash dogs and endless

The good news: NPS is designing a restoration plan and has some funding.

Fairfax County has a plan to fix the gush of sediment pouring in from the west. Funds are needed.



Rescued

A Great Blue Heron was rescued by an animal control officer after it was the call for the injured bird around 6:45 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 6. A passerby saw the bird standing in the wetlands when a snapping turtle bit its leg. Chase located the bird in the wetland water near the boardwalk but when she approached, the bird moved deeper into the water, unable to fly. Chase walked into the water and rescued the injured bird. The bird was then taken to a local veterinarian, who contacted a wildlife rescue league to assist in its recovery.

Road Projects in Region To Keep Traffic Moving

n Northern Virginia, the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) is working to keep up with growth in the area with transportation projects at both ends of the spectrum. Whether it's a new highway overpass, intersection improvement, or high occupancy toll lanes, the goal at VDOT is to keep the traffic moving.

On the Capital Beltway (I-495), the 495 Express Lanes opened in 2012 to give motorists an option when traveling through this corridor. Two additional lanes were constructed on the beltway in each direction between the Springfield Interchange (where I-95, I-495 and I-395 meet south of Washington) and a point on the beltway just north of the Dulles Toll Road. These lanes are free to vehicles with three or more occupants, while vehicles with one or two occupants will be able to use the lanes by paying a toll electronically. The express lanes use dynamic pricing to manage the flow of traffic and keep motorists moving, and roadside equipment monitors traffic, adjusting toll prices periodically to maintain free-flowing travel. As traffic increases, the toll price goes up to manage demand.

In December 2014, VDOT opened a 29-mile stretch of express lanes on I-95/395 between a point just north of Edsall Road in Alexandria, to Garrisonville Road (Route 610) in the south. These express lanes are reversible: on weekday mornings, the lanes

head-north to cater to commuters heading to busy employment centers like Tysons Corner and Washington, D.C.; and in the afternoons, the lanes head south. Again, vehicles with three occupants can use the 95 Express Lanes for free, while cars with one or two occupants can choose to use the lanes by paying a toll, which varies depending on the number of cars in the lanes at that time. All vehicles using the 495 or 95 Express Lanes need an E-ZPass, or an E-ZPass Flex, which has a switch to engage the toll-free option when there are three or more occupants.

Another highway construction project is underway at Seminary Road and I-395 in Alexandria. There VDOT is building a multifaceted project that include a new 0.8-mile auxiliary lane on I-395 North between Duke

Street and Seminary Road, as well as a new ramp from the HOV lanes to the Seminary Road bridge overpass, and a new pedestrian bridge over I-395. These projects are intended to improve the flow of traffic associated with the Mark Center, a federal government building located in that area. The auxiliary lane opened in February with the HOV ramp and the stand-alone pedestrian bridge scheduled to open later this fall.

OTHER recently opened "Megaprojects" include the Fairfax County Parkway Extension, linking Springfield to Richmond Highway in southern Fairfax County; the fourth lane-widening project, which added an extra lane on I-95 North and South between Springfield and Occoquan; the Telegraph Road interchange on the Capital Beltway

in Alexandria; and the 495 Shoulder Lane project on the inner loop of I-495 between the 495 Express Lanes' northern endpoint and the George Washington Memorial Highway. Similar to the shoulder lane on I-66, this shoulder lane is open during the morning and evening rush hours, with a red "X" or green arrow signaling its availability for travel.

In Arlington, just west of I-395, VDOT is putting finishing touches this summer on a new bridge carrying Washington Boulevard over Columbia Pike. This new bridge replaces a 1940s-era bridge, and includes bike and pedestrian access along Columbia Pike plus room for a future streetcar if needed. The bridge was renamed the Freedmans Bridge after the historical "Freedmans Village," a community the Federal government established in 1863 for newly freed slaves, that once occupied this area of Arlington.

VDOT officials are now looking to transform Northern Virginia's Interstate 66 into a multi-modal corridor that moves traffic and people quicker and in a more reliable way. The project, known as Transform 66, is a multi-modal proposal that will to incorporate transit, carpooling and express lanes. The project is divided into a 25-mile stretch between Haymarket and the Capital Beltway, and a separate project inside the beltway with a toll option for travel through Falls Church and Arlington.






