# Garza Tours on the First Day of School

hough she visited several schools on the first day of the new year, Fairfax County Public Schools superintendent only received one welcome banner. That was from the articulate student leaders at Mantua Elementary School, who told her "sense of community" and "great teachers who encourage creativity" were among their favorite things about the school.

Mantua capped a full day of visits for the superintendent as she begins her third year with the school system. Her tour began at Hayfield Secondary School and included stops at Lynbrook Elementary School, Walt Whitman Middle School and J.E.B. Stuart High School.

Along the way, Garza said she was impressed with the "enthusiasm" and hearing the positive things students had "to say about going back to school."

Improved literacy across all school levels is one of the goals of the system's new

strategic plan and Portrait of a Graduate education blueprint. Garza spoke with teachers and principals about their plans to develop students into stronger writers and communicators.

In Mantua's library, Garza experienced a project started last year where students learn to produce a QR code and link it to a video they make themselves about books they liked reading. Other students can then scan the code with library-provided iPads and essentially browse titles by reviews from their peers.

"It's exciting to see it take hold," Garza said.

Regarding the playing out of the first day of later start times, Garza said she'd heard generally positive feedback. "Largely people have been supportive of the change and we're grateful for that. It was a very smooth start."

# 'Privileged to Join the Lanier Family'

# Lenart takes reins at middle school.

rin Lenart, Lanier Middle School's new principal, always pictured herself as an educator. Raised in Tennessee, her first dream was to become a teacher.

"When I was 3 or 4, my brother came home from school and told me about his wonderful teacher, and I was mesmerized," she said. "I had a chalkboard, a picnic table and benches, and I 'taught' my stuffed animals."

Then in high school, said Lenart, "I had an English teacher who challenged, frustrated and inspired me to the core. She made me better and want it more – she put the fight in me."

So the determined young woman obtained a bachelor's in English from Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn., a master's in educational leadership and an administrative license. Along the way, she also fell in love and married an Army intelligence officer, Michael Lenart. He's now a major and they have a daughter, Chelsea, a freshman at GWU.

Erin Lenart taught high-school English in both Tennessee and Georgia before moving with her family to Northern Virginia when her husband was transferred to the Washington, D.C. area. From January 2009 to June 2010, she was an eighth-grade English teacher at Thoreau Middle in Vienna.

"I loved the challenge of the kids and figuring out how to reach them," she said. "I was taking what I'm passionate about and getting them to be engaged in it and love learning through my content and teaching methods. It was also about getting to know the kids."

**IN LENART'S OFFICE** at Lanier is a framed saying from a former student. It reads, "A teacher plants seeds that bloom in a life forever." And, said Lenart, "I really

believe that. And you get another chance every August; it's a rebirth, a renewal. You always get to try to improve and do better."

She also had good leadership examples in her life. One of them was Bruce Jobe, her principal at Northwest High in Clarksville. "He was phenomenal – probably the most inspirational person I ever worked for," she said. "He supported leadership development and innovative practices."

In Lenart's second year teaching there, he asked her to be a class sponsor. The next year, he put her in charge of all the schoolspirit activities for students and staff. He also placed her on the superintendent's advisory council because, she said, "He saw great potential in me. I was hungry to learn and absorb new things, and he urged me to go into administration."

One of her priorities, she said, is to stay as connected with the students as possible. "You get into this profession for the kids," said Lenart. "And the more we're out there, the more we understand what teachers are doing and understand where the students are currently and their struggles."

After teaching a year-and-a-half at Thoreau, she became the assistant princi-

pal there. "I loved it," she said. "I really learned and better understood collaborative teaming, quality assessments and community-building because Thoreau already had these structures in place."

Eventually, though, Lenart wanted to apply those concepts at the high-school level "to make a difference for kids and our profession, because that's our future." So in February 2012, she became the assistant principal at West Springfield High.

"It was a fabulous community, with phenomenal teachers and a supportive region and cluster," she said. But she wanted to be a principal so, when Lanier Principal Scott Poole left to become Woodson High's principal, she applied for his job and got it.

"He was much beloved here and did some fantastic work," said Lenart. "It's a family at Lanier and I feel privileged to join it. Even three of the state senators went here, and how lucky am I to be in Fairfax City and work with Superintendent Peter Noonan, Assistant Superintendent Phyllis Pajardo, Assistant Superintendent of Region Five Frances Ivey and Executive Principal of Region Five Becky Baenig?"

Lenart was officially announced as the new principal, shortly after the school year ended. "I was ecstatic," she said. "Lanier always felt right to me – the demographics of the community and the diversity."

"I knew Scott a few years and was familiar with this school and the fine work in teaming going on here," she continued. "And the more I researched this community, I felt a strong match to it. I'm half Korean, and being able to work in a diverse community helps you understand your own diversity."

Besides that, said Lenart, "Middle school is such a fun, quirky time for students, where kids are trying to come into their own identity.

They come in a little unsure of themselves and, within two years, they leave with a level of confidence and some assuredness about what's next. It's so fascinating to see and be a part of this process."

She began her new job July 1 and started meeting the teachers and staff. "The feeling I get is that Lanier is a family that grows

together, celebrates successes together and asks tough questions of each other," she said. "And we all rally around our students."

Lenart also praised the level of commitment to the school by its teachers and senior leadership. Her philosophy of leadership is to "lead from the center, hear all perspectives and never, ever forget what it's like to be a parent, teacher or student. So when there are decisions to be made and initiatives and work to be done, you may not make everyone happy, but at least you can articulate [the reasons for] it to your community and understand the ripple effect. It really does take a village."

She plans to continue Lanier's focus on literacy in all content areas, saying it'll come from the teachers. And she noted a "sense of urgency" in making sure students are on grade level by the time they leave there. Although Lanier has some of the most state-of-the-art technology, Lenart said that, with Fairfax County's budget challenges, the school will "take a hard look at reallocating some of our resources to have a replacement plan for it."

She also intends to examine Lanier's remediation and enrichment programs to make sure they're differentiated for each student "to create the prescription each student needs to be successful."

**LENART EXPECTS** the toughest part of her job to be finding the balance between work and home. "Because I want to learn so much, I'll have to pull myself away from work so I can get home to my family," she said

The most satisfaction, said Lenart, will come from "working with the staff to better understand what made them so great so far and what opportunities I can bring to the table to help our school grow." She's also excited about "getting to be with the students, relearning the middle-school mindset and being a part of what's next."

And she's looking forward to getting to know the parents via coffees, the PTA and informal meetings at school and community events in the City of Fairfax. Said Lenart: "I want to let them know that my work is our work, so I welcome their voice."

# Fairfax County NAACP to Hold Freedom Fund Banquet





# Focusing on Suicide Prevention

# Help is a phone call away.

his week is Suicide Prevention Week. Preventing suicide means paying attention to mental health and treating depression, and there is no better time to focus on that than the first week of school.

In 2013, more than 41,000 people ended their own lives in the United States, more than 21,000 with firearms. (Compare to the number of murders in 2013, 16,120.) In 2013, more than 800,000 people were treated in U.S. emergency departments for selfinflicted injuries. More than a million adults report making a suicide attempt each year, while many more people struggle with thoughts of suicide, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death for Americans overall and the second leading cause of death among adolescents and young adults aged 15-29. More than half of suicides involve firearms.

In 2013, 1,047 Virginians died by suicide, with white males accounting for 716 of those deaths. The Southside region had the highest suicide rate at 19.3 per 100,000 in 2013, while the Northern region had the lowest rate at 10.1 deaths. (By comparison, there were 383 homicides in Virginia in 2013.)

Two groups particularly at risk are youth and the elderly. Data from the Virginia Department of Health indicates that rates of suicide in Virginia were higher for older people than youth

— but suicide is a leading cause of death for young people.

One strategy to prevent suicide is to learn about the warning signs of suicide, which can include individuals talking about wanting to hurt themselves, increasing substance use, and having changes in their mood, diet, or sleeping patterns, according to the CDC. When these warning signs appear, quickly connecting the person to supportive services is critical. Promoting opportunities and settings that strengthen connections among people, families, and communities is another suicide pre-

Exhibiting any of the signs listed below is reason for an immediate call to the National Suicide Prevention hotline at 1-800-273-8255 (TALK). If you cannot reach someone on this line, go to an emergency room, make sure you or your loved one is not alone until professional help arrives and remove all firearms, sharp objects, drugs, alcohol and other things that could be used in a suicide attempt.

- ❖ Talking or writing about suicide or death.
- ❖ Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.
- \* Talking about being a burden to others and how the world would be better off without him/her.

# Customers create like crazy at Paint Your Own Pottery.

porting the slogan, "Create Like Crazy," Paint Your Own Pottery is proving to be popular with both individuals and groups as a destination for fun. And it's right in downtown Fairfax.

On a recent Saturday, Andrea Hardwicke painted a ceramic bowl there to use for soup or cereal. "I liked it a lot because I could do whatever I wanted," she said. "I got to choose my colors and design and even use the different artistic styles I saw around the room. There's lots of pretty artwork on display."

The shop is in a yellow building at 10417 Main Street and is open Monday-Saturday, 10 a.m.-7 p.m., and Sunday, noon-6 p.m. And inside, within a cheerful atmosphere of brightly colored walls, a yellow-and-blue checkerboard floor, music and lots of tables and chairs, is where the magic happens.

"At any time, there are more than 300 different choices of pottery to paint," said store manager Dawn Forester. "I believe it's one of the largest and most diverse selections in Northern Virginia. The store's been here 20 years, but it was recently remodeled and updated and is under new management."

Walk-ins are welcome, but appointments are strongly suggested for weekends during the school year. (Phone 703-218-2881; www.CreateLikeCrazy.com).

Or if they make something that needs to go into one of the two kilns on the premises, they may come back and get it in a week.

"Our customers range from little kids to senior citizens," said Forester. "People come, for example, to have their children's handprints made, have birthday parties and other celebrations here, and corporate events, too. No experience is needed; we'll give them as much or as little help as they like."

Some people go there by themselves, such as a court reporter who recently came in to paint in between her court cases. Others want to make a gift for someone else. But usually, said Forester, people come in together. "It's a social activity," she said. "Sometimes, it's a Scout troop and other times, it's a couple on a date."

Just ask Stephanie Villatoro. "Six of us came here today," she said. "We're with the girls' ministry at Jubilee Christian Center in Fairfax, and this was our annual outing for the leaders to get to know each other. We were looking for something fun to do, and this is close to the church and is something different. I'd recommend it to others because it's a fun, relaxing atmosphere to hang out and talk while making something beautiful to take home."

"And you don't have to have talent to do it," said one of the leaders, Anna Maylett.

it very much and I'm hoping to bring my granddaughters here, too." Customers select what they want to paint. The choices range from figurines to plates, bowls, cups, piggy banks, tea sets, vases, religious items, ceramic boxes and picture frames. And there are items for men, women, teens, boys and girls. "We even have firetrucks and sports trophies that people can paint," said Forester.

It usually takes 90 minutes to complete a project and, once it's fired, kitchenware may be used for eating and drinking. It's also toprack, dishwasher safe.

"We give people instructions on how to get the best, possible results for their vision," said Forester. "We explain which colors go best together and have people think about their background colors, as well. We also tell them how to layer or blend the colors for their desired effect."

EVERY SATURDAY at 3 p.m., Paint Your Own Pottery holds a class. "It's to teach painting techniques so people will feel comfortable with it," said Forester. "The cost varies according to what they choose to paint, but they won't pay a studio fee. We also run various,

discount promotions throughout the year."

❖In addition, some noteworthy events are on the horizon. On the second and fourth Saturdays of the month, from 7-9:30 p.m., is Social Artworking. It's canvas painting on table-top easels. Participants receive step-by-step instructions and leave with a finished painting. The next one is Sept. 12, and people may bring the beverage of their choice, including alcohol for those 21 and over. Light refreshments are served.

❖The shop also plans to contribute bowls to the Capital Area Food Bank's Empty Bowls event, Sept. 30, in Springfield. It's a fundraiser for the organization, which feeds hungry people in need. For \$30, people may paint two, ceramic bowls – one for themselves and one to donate to the event.

"Our goal is to donate 30 bowls," said Forester. "People may do this here all month long through Sept. 26. And it's a good service project for students, too."

She's also proud of the business's community involvement with the arts. "We put City of Fairfax Theatre Co., Fairfax High, Woodson and Paul VI theater posters in our front window," she said. "And we add decorations to match the

play's theme.

Recently, Fairfax resident Molly Stephenson brought her daughters, Kiara and Mikaela Fenn, and their grandmother, Gloria Fenn, to the shop, and they laughed and chatted with each other while painting. Kiara, a fifth-grader at Providence Elementary, dabbed polka dots on a dinosaur figurine for her desk. And Mikaela, a Fairfax High freshman, painted a Triceratops figurine for a birthday gift. Meanwhile, their grandmother painted a happy face on a flower figurine for herself. "Whatever we do together is fun," she said. "But this is especially exhilarating, watching all the creations take shape."

Painting two bottle stoppers that may be Christmas stocking stuffers, Stephenson said, "I find it relaxing to come here, listen to music and just paint. It's also fun to see what your piece looks like after it comes out of the kiln, because it's always a little different."

And that's what Forester likes best, "When customers come back and pick up their finished items and you see the smiles on their faces. They say they're surprised at how bright the colors are and how good it looks, and that makes me happy.'

# Muskett Leads West Springfield to Season-Opening Win Over Robinson

Junior quarterback throws four touchdown passes, rushes for one.

ith the score tied and 1:17 remaining in the fourth quarter of Friday's contest against Robinson, West Springfield quarterback Peter Muskett took the shotgun snap and headed around left end.

Moments later, the Spartan signal caller was sprinting down the sideline, turning a decent gain into a game-winning touchdown, putting the finishing touch on a fantastic season-opening effort.

Moments after Robinson tied the score, Muskett turned a quarterback trap play into a 55-yard touchdown, propelling the Spartans to a 35-28 victory on Sept. 4 at West Springfield High School. The junior and second-year varsity starter played a role in each of the Spartans' five touchdowns, leading West Springfield to its first season-opening win since 2012.

"He's a stud and he's only going to get better," third-year head coach Jason Eldredge said. "As soon as he actually starts reading the field, he's really going to be a scary football player."

Muskett took over as West Springfield's starting quarterback early in his sophomore season and led the Spartans to a share of the 2014 Conference 7 championship. West Springfield defeated Washington-Lee in the opening round of the 6A North playoffs before suffering a 27-24 season-ending loss to Lake Braddock in the quarterfinals.

**THIS SEASON**, West Springfield returns nine starters on offense and retained offensive coordinator Anthony Parker, bringing

continuity to that side of the ball while helping Muskett grow as a quarterback.

"The continuity thing is priceless," Eldredge said. "Unfortunately, one of [Muskett's] weaknesses early on is his ability to read and make quick decisions. That he's overcoming now, as you can see. Obviously, the physical gifts he brings to the table [are] something special, but at that position it's your mind that has to be just as sharp. Being in the same offense one year to the next is a huge help to that."

Muskett completed 11 of 18 passes for 287 yards and four touchdowns, with one interception against Robinson. He also carried 19 times for 130 yards and a score.

"I feel a lot more confident and we're clicking easier," Muskett said about his second season as a varsity starter, "and it's just completely different from last year."

Muskett connected with sophomore Jordan Hughes for a 57-yard touchdown late in the fourth quarter, extending West Springfield's lead to 28-20 with 2:49 re-

maining. Robinson responded with a sixplay, 60-yard drive, capped by quarterback Alex Miller's 1-yard sneak for a touchdown. Senior running back Sean Foncha reached the ball out and broke the plane of the goal line on the ensuing two-point conversion attempt, tying the score at 28 with 1:26 remaining.

Muskett would score the game-winning touchdown on the first play of West Springfield's ensuing drive.

"He's much faster," senior left tackle Brock Vaughn said about Muskett, who increased his speed by running track. "... When he gets in the open field ... he's just gone."

After West Springfield and Robinson traded punts for much of the first quarter, Muskett gave the Spartans a 7-0 lead with a 94-yard touchdown pass to junior Daniel Adu with 1:38 remaining in the opening quarter.

Robinson led 14-7 late in the third quarter, when Muskett connected with senior Darean Robertson for a game-tying 48-yard

touchdown.

On West Springfield's next possession, Muskett again found Adu, this time for a 26-yard score, giving the Spartans a 21-14 advantage.

"Honestly, [Muskett] put the team on his shoulders and when we needed it, he responded," Eldredge said. "That's the character of that kid. He works his tail off in the offseason. For him to do what he did today, he's a stud."

Foncha scored on a 17-yard run with 7:08 remaining in the fourth quarter, diving into the end zone to cut West Springfield's lead to one. The Spartans blocked the Rams' ensuing extra-point attempt and maintained the lead at 21-20.

Foncha carried 16 times for 89 yards and one touchdown. Senior running back Dajon Lee led Robinson with 119 yards on 16 carries. His 7-yard touchdown run with 2:41 left in the second quarter tied the score at 7.

Miller completed 4 of 10 passes for 47 yards and a touchdown.

**FOR WEST SPRINGFIELD**, Adu finished with four receptions for 143 yards and two touchdowns. Hughes had four catches for 68 yards and a score.

"[Our] ultimate goal is [a] state championship, but we view anything less than our 9-3 record last year as a disappointment," Muskett said. "We want to match that and surpass it."

West Springfield (1-0) will open conference play on the road against Mount Vernon (1-0) at 7 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 11. Robinson (0-1) will host Woodson (0-1) at 7 p.m.

"We had injuries," Eldredge said. "We were down to our last guys — we had a JV line-backer crew out there in the fourth quarter — so to me, we gutted it out. The irony of that is the way we lost our season last year, on the 1-yard line in the quarterfinal against Braddock with 1 second to go, for us to come out and win in the last seconds, means that maybe we've grown up a little bit."
