and that makes you our superheroes every day," she


With the birthday of the U.S. Marine Corps on Nov. 10, it was fitting to have a joint celebration with Veterans Day organized by her military organization.

"We let them work it," said Senior Marine Instructor Col. Caroline Simkins-Mullins (U.S. Marine Corps ret.). "The students planned, practiced and conducted it. It was our mission to keep it safe and professional."

With roughly 160 members in the U.S. Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, Simkins-Mullins said Mount Vernon's is one of the larger groups for that branch in the area.

At the beginning of the program, a color guard marched in with the flags and then the student members demonstrated several disciplined formations.



ATM Skimmer Uncovered

An off-duty police officer called Fairfax County Police Department when he noticed a fraud device (skimmer) on an ATM in the Huntington area on Friday, Nov. 13.

The officer had inserted his card at Citi Bank ATM at the 7-Eleven, 5834 E North Kings Highway, around 11 a.m. when he noticed that the card slot fell off and he saw internal electronic components. After examining the machine, and the cash dispenser, he noticed a small hole and saw that there were batteries, a camera and a data storage device on the machine. The card slot and cash dispenser had been taped on.

The victim called police prior to making any cash transactions on the machine and was not victimized.

Police are asking customers to recall whether or not they may have used this machine recently as they don't know exactly how long the skimmer was in place.

Police offered the following advice: Always check bank statements and look for discrepancies. Look closely at ATMs when making financial transactions. Skimming devices may be affixed loosely with tape; contact bank personnel and police immediately.

Northern Virginia is among the wealthiest areas in the country, and many if not most of us go through our usual routines without encountering evidence of needy families among

But more than 51,000 children who attend Fairfax County Public Schools are poor enough to receive free or subsidized meals, a significant measure of poverty. That's 28 percent of students in Fairfax County Pub-EDITORIAL lic Schools.

In Arlington more than 31 percent of the students are poor enough to receive free or subsidized meals; that's 7,749 students at

In Alexandria, 8,664 students are poor enough to receive free or subsidized meals. That's 59 percent of the 14,671 students en-

These are children who are living in families who may be on the brink of homelessness, families who must choose between medical bills, car repair, heat and food. These are children who may not be sure that they will have a meal between the meals they get in school. "You couldn't ask for more," said Simkins-Mullins. "You see the pride and professionalism in doing this, carrying it out."

Michael Skinner, the namesake of the field house, also took the podium to share a few memories from serving in World War II. Crafting Perfect Admissions Essays

Local educators offer advice on how to write effective independent school admissions essays.

inger Wilner spent almost every morning last month hovering over her MacBook Pro, at a window seat in Starbucks, scouring a series of essays. She was looking for fatal mistakes. Errors ranging from comma splices to illogical arguments could torpedo weeks of late-nights spent in front of a computer. The words weren't hers, though. They were those of her 13-year-old daughter, who is in the midst of applying for a slot at one of the Washington-region's independent schools.

"I haven't spent this much time proofreading since I was in college," said Wilner, an Arlington mother of two. "She's a good writer and put a lot of effort into these essays. But that's probably true of the other type-A students who are applying to these schools, too."

That's right: 'Tis the season for independent school admissions. Families are scrambling to meet the application deadlines for local private schools. In addition to school tours, open houses, applicant interviews and standardized tests, many independent schools require prospective students to demonstrate their writing and critical thinking abilities in the form of an essay.

"It ... gives the applicant another opportunity, beyond the interview, to share more about their passions, interests, character and creativity," said Lisa Knight, director of admission and financial aid at Flint Hill School in Oakton.

The essay is a chance for the applicant to

give the admissions committee a glimpse of the qualities that distinguish them from hundreds or even thousands of other students who seek one of a handful of slots at a school.

"We hope that the students will reveal something about themselves," said Clare M. Dame, director of enrollment management at Randolph-Macon Academy in Front Royal. "We want to get to know them and what motivates them. Hopefully some of their personalities will come through as they write about their goals or the person they admire."

Admissions officers at independent schools that are considered academically rigorous are looking for well-read students who have a solid command of grammar and punctuation. "As we are reviewing ... essays, we are assessing their ability to write," said Dame. "As a college prep school, we expect every student to go from Randolph

Macon Academy to a four-year college. In order to succeed ... a student needs to know how to write fairly well."

In addition to writing abilities, admissions committees review applicants' aptitudes for analytical thinking, creativity and intellectual curiosity. "Are they making a thorough and well-structured argument?" asks Mark Reford, D.Phil., of BASIS Independent School in McLean. "How intellectually resourceful are they? How do these kids think and are they able to express themselves thoughtfully and carefully and clearly in writing?

"They should come ... with an ability to express arguments clearly and concisely," he continued. "Over the long term, what that involves is an education where the students are used to investigating topics where there isn't a right or wrong answer. They have to be used to thinking through a problem. What's important is the quality of their analysis."

Admissions officials look for applicants who demonstrate excitement about attending a particular school. "The ... essay gives us an idea of why they are considering our school," said Dame. "It helps us to know them and what motivates them to come to a college-prep, Air Force JROTC school."

Applicants should use specific examples that show they understand the school's culture and environment and how they would fit into it. "In writing why they want to come to Randolph-Macon Academy, they need to be able to talk about the school itself so that we understand that it is an essay written specific to our programs, and not just a generic essay generated for all the schools that

they might be considering," said Dame.

Admissions officers can spot essays for which applicants have received an abundance of help. Such assistance can become particularly apparent when a student's application includes a writing sample from a standardized test, such as the Secondary School Admission Test (SSAT), which requires students to organize and write essays in a limited amount of time without help.

"We really value the essay from the SSAT because you're seeing their thought process and how they express themselves in a first draft," said Terri Collins, director of admissions, Oakcrest School in McLean.

Applicants should not eschew all assistance, however. In fact, school officials encourage applicants to get help proofreading their essays. Many families actually seek guidance from an independent educational consultant.

"We follow a strict code of ethics, so we don't help them write the essays or help them pretend to be someone else," said Leigh Ann Cahill of Independent School Options, an educational consulting firm in Alexandria. "But we show them how to present their best selves."

At the same time, essays that read like they've been written by the student, using age-appropriate language, are often the most engaging and most credible. "Don't necessarily try to write in the most erudite and intellectual manner unless that is natural for you," said Dame. "Efficient, concise language is most effective and often says what you mean to say better than trying to use the thesaurus."

WP Ground Game Dominant in Playoff Victory

Sophomore Cleveland rushes for 291 yards, 4 TDs against West Springfield.

est Potomac's regular-season meeting with West Springfield resulted in the Wolverines producing season-lows for rushing yards (50) and points during a 28-9 loss to the Spartans on Oct. 9.

One month later, the Wolverines' first play from scrimmage in Friday's postseason rematch with the Spartans nearly doubled their rushing output and gave onlookers a glimpse of what would be a dominant performance on the ground.

With West Potomac facing first-and-15 at its own 10-yard line, running back Daiimon Cleveland took a handoff, headed to his left and turned up the field. After about 15 yards, the sophomore cut back to his right, dropped a West Springfield defender with a stiff arm, brushed off another Spartan and headed to the end zone for a 90-yard touch-

Cleveland would score three more touchdowns in the second half and No. 9 West Potomac defeated No. 8 West Springfield 40-19 in the opening round of the 6A North football playoffs on Nov. 13 at West Springfield High School.

The Wolverines rushed for 437 yards and five touchdowns Friday night and earned the program's first playoff victory since 2011. West Potomac will travel to face No. 1 South County in the quarterfinals at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 20.

"Hats off to [the Spartans] the first time we played them," West Potomac head coach Jeremiah Ross said. "They out-coached us, they out-played us, but we really felt like that was not indicative of the type of team we were, so we had to come out and prove that tonight."

How did the Wolverines get improved rushing results against the Spartans?

"We made some adjustments," Ross said. "... We were able to game plan a little bit

us; I think we were a little bit more prepared for it. [We used] a couple different formations, a couple different packages, put a few more physical matchups in there that we felt were to our advantage."

Ross, a former three-year starter at right tackle for Fresno State University, praised the performance of the West Potomac offensive line, which is composed of left tackle Jordan Burgess, left guard John Leon, center John Holzworth, right guard Ozzie Opoku and right tackle Tay Diggs. Tight ends Grant Monson and Horace Johnson also contributed to West Potomac's success on

"I thought they played excellent," Ross said. "... The challenge for our guys is they're a great group of kids, fundamentally sound, they play hard — but [they need to finish]. We want them to stay on blocks and finish and we felt like we did that a little bit better tonight.

maintaining it, snap to whistle."

Running backs Cleveland and junior Justine Annan took advantage of the Oline's performance, combining for 380 yards and five touchdowns.

"Daiimon and Justine continue to get better," Ross said. "... Justine's a junior, Daiimon's a sophomore [and] they get better every game."

Cleveland carried 25 times for 291 yards and four touchdowns, highlighted by his 90yard first-quarter scoring scamper.

"I saw them go to the right and the play was going to the left," Cleveland said. "I was just like, 'OK, I'm going to have to cut back.' As soon as I cut it back, I knew I was gone. I saw the first dude, threw him, I saw the second dude and threw him and I was like, 'Yeah, I'm in the end zone."

Cleveland on Friday surpassed 1,000 rushing yards for the season. He has 1,030 yards and 20 touchdowns on the ground and is averaging 6.4 yards per carry. He also has 12 receptions for 132 yards and a touch-

"He's a great player," Burgess said. "He's going to be an even better player. And the good part about it, he's only a sophomore."

Annan carried 15 times for 89 yards and a score on Friday. His 4-yard touchdown with 10:39 remaining in the second quarter gave West Potomac a 13-0 lead.

Senior running back Jarrod Denham had seven carries for 57 yards for the Wolver-

After falling behind 13-0, West Springfield quarterback Peter Muskett threw an 8-yard touchdown pass to Jacob Estes and scored on a 13-yard run, leading to a 13-all tie at halftime. West Potomac controlled the second half, however, starting with a touchdown on the opening possession of the third

The Wolverines marched 63 yards in 11

plays and took a 19-13 lead when Cleveland punched it in from 1 yard. West Potomac led for the remainder of the con-

Cleveland also scored on runs of 6 and 45 yards in the third quarter. After Cleveland's fourth touchdown, West Springfield linebacker Marshall Wilson was taken off the field on a stretcher as a precaution after suffering a neck/back injury.

A 33-YARD TOUCHDOWN pass from quarterback Mark Ellis to Cory Jones gave West Potomac its largest lead of the night at 40-13 with 8:18 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Muskett threw a 19-yard touchdown pass to Najee Green with 5:36 left in the fourth quarter. Muskett completed 27 of 40 passes for 295 yards, with two touchdowns and one interception.

Muskett's interception came in the first quarter with the Spartans trailing 7-0. West Springfield faced second-and-6 at the West Potomac 11-yard line when Wolverine linebacker Johnson intercepted Muskett at the 2-vard line.

Ellis completed 8 of 12 passes for 85 yards and a touchdown for the Wolverines.

West Springfield, which won a share of the Conference 7 championship last year, finished the season with a 6-5 record, including losses in three of its final four games.

After earning its first playoff win since 2011, West Potomac (8-3) will travel to face South County (11-0) at 7 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 20 in the 6A North quarterfinals. The Stallions defeated the Wolverines 53-20 during the regular season on Oct. 30.

"It feels good to be able to bring that back to the school," Burgess said. "We know we've always had a good tradition here, but Coach Ross has really helped bring it back."



A Visitor's View of Alexandria

Born and raised in a small town on the Hudson just above New York City, Private Robert Knox Sneden enlisted in the Union army with the 40th New York's topographical engineers and wound up posted to virtually every major scene of fighting during the Civil War, including Brandy Station, where his capture in 1863 by Mosby's irregulars led to a prison stint at Andersonville.

As artistically prolific as he was peripatetic, Sneden sketched and mapped everywhere he went. At his first posting, in Alexandria, he was assigned to Gen. Samuel Heintzelman's III Corps staff at Fort Lyon, now the elevated site of Metro's Huntington Station. From that hilltop aerie, Sneden busily sketched and mapped the city and its immediate surroundings as the defenses of Washington were taking shape.

The map above was drawn in September 1862 and found in Sneden's pocket sketchbook. It depicts an Old Town veined with stockades to

protect its dual railroad hubs and vital roundhouse. A major battery at over-scaled Jones Point covers the Potomac River. Forts Lyon and Ellsworth (on Shuter's Hill) monitor Duke Street, the city's main east-west thoroughfare. To the south, across the stone causeway built in 1810 where Richmond Highway now crosses Hunting Creek, lay terra incognita. Intelligence identified the marshland just below Hunting Creek as a den of swamp-dwelling secessionists; Sneden likely avoided it altogether. That may be why he made this particular map's several errors, misidentifying all of the major roads south of Old Town and mistaking Quaker-owned Walnut Tree Farm—later named Wellington Villa and now known as River Farm, just three miles below Alexandria—for George Mason's Gunston Hall, actually located another dozen miles downriver on Mason Neck.
