In a statement for the occasion, state Sen. George Barker (D-39) said, "Almost no one else would do what (Kathy) did. She accomplished what she set out to do, helping those with the least."

Fairfax County Board of Supervisors Chairman Sharon Bulova was on hand for the awards, held at the Waterford at Springfield, along with each district Supervisor. Together, they honored the 178 group and individual nominees for volunteer service awards with an official proclamation declaring April 8, 2016 "Volunteer Recognition Day" in Fairfax County.

Neighborhood Gala To Benefit Hollin Meadows STEM

ith the \$50 million rift between the Fairfax County Public Schools adopted budget for Fiscal Year 2017 and the advertised transfer from the Board of Supervisors still looming, parents and community supporters of Hollin Meadows Elementary hope to protect their school's highly valued STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) and outdoor garden programs.

On April 30, the Hollin Meadows Partnership will host the sixth annual Neighborhood Gala fundraiser at a private residence close to the school in the Mount Vernon area of Alexandria. The tented event raises money through admission tickets, raffles, a silent auction of more than 150 items and outright donations.

Last year, Neighborhood Gala donations reached around \$55,000.

At Hollin Meadows, they have a special full-time STEM teacher as well as a 10,000 square-foot outdoor garden.

"The garden is really amazing," said gala committee member Jennifer Lipner, who has a second grader and incoming kindergartner at Hollin Meadows. "We have a parttime garden coordinator who helps plant, harvest, measure and weigh. It's a great learning opportunity and gets the kids outside."

Lipner said the garden harvest has been so bountiful in the past that the school has donated dozens of pounds of sweet potatoes and provided lettuce for its annual Thanksgiving feast.

With about 50 percent of Hollin Mills, a Title 1 school, eligible for free and reduced meals, Lipner said the programs are also

critical for teaching about healthy eating habits.

"It makes a big impact on the community," she said.

The Sixth Hollin Meadows Neighborhood Gala to benefit the STEM and outdoor garden programs is scheduled for April 30 from 7-11 p.m. For more information or to bid on a silent auction item, visit www.biddingowl.com/hmpgala. Beware of Scams

ecently, I attended a presentation at the Hollin Hall Senior Center by our Fairfax County Police on the growing threat of scams

targeting seniors, sponsored by Mount Vernon at Home. This is an issue that I championed this legislative session in Richmond - combating these scams and protecting seniors are among my top priorities. Almost 20 percent of Fairfax County homes have residents over 65 years of age, so our community is a tempt-COMMENTARY

flam men. We all need to be hypervigilant and recognize that it is OK to hang up the phone or not to answer the door, and certainly it is a good idea to call the non-emergency

police number for our Mount Vernon sta-

ing target for con artists and flim

tion, 703-691-2131, if you are at all dubious or concerned.

There are many scams aimed at seniors via the internet, over the phone and in person. Amazingly, just while I am writing this, I received a "robo call" encouraging me to press 1 to get a free "senior alert" product of some sort. I can't tell you more because I promptly hung up, which I recommend you do as well.

Likewise, be very careful of the "woodchucks," those guys who will cut down that "dead tree or limb" and end up charging you hundreds, sometimes thousands of dollars. Same goes for the guy who says he is "in the neighborhood" and just wanted to save you some money while he "seals your driveway" or "repairs your roof." Ask for a written estimate and tell him that you are going to get two more estimates. A legitimate business (and one with a license) expects that.

Some of the scams include the popular IRS robo calls that look real on your caller ID because they use a 202 - Washington, DC, area code. Remember, the IRS will never call you. They write to you only. Do not call them back or engage with these con artists on the phone. Hang up!


There is the "warrant for missing jury duty" scam. And, the caller pretending to be your grandchild who is in trouble out of state and supposedly "needs bail money." That one almost tricked my Dad. These guys are good, so don't feel stupid if they take

Online scams are legion. For example, you may recently have gotten an email with the subject line "Get Protected." The email describes that the Social Security Administration (SSA) is supposedly offering great new features to help taxpavers protect their personal information and identities. It sounds so good that you may be tempted to click on the link provided — don't be fooled.

It's a scam!

Scammers pretending to be from the SSA

send out the email offering new features to help consumers monitor their credit and learn whether someone is engaging in unautho-

rized use of their Social Security number. It sounds very official and may even mention the "SAFE Act of 2015."

The Social Security Administration is not offering such a program. It's actually a "phishing" email designed to get you to click on the link. Doing so could cause "malware" to be installed on your computer, like viruses and spyware.

The link might also take you to a "spoof" site designed to look like the SSA's website and ask you to provide personal information, like your Social Security number and bank or credit account numbers. It's all very clever. Be alert. And never click on any links.

Unsure about whether it's for real? Here are a couple clues: "hover" your cursor over the address link in the email. If it's fake, you'll see that the address is an unrelated .com address, not the .gov address it appears to be. Sometimes it may be in your junk folder. If so, that's because your email filters recognized that it wasn't for real but they can't catch everything.

If you're unsure if an email is coming from the government, call or email them yourself. But use an email address you find yourself, not the contact info listed in the email sent to you.

During the 2016 session, I was the patron of HB620, which would have allowed financial institutions to hold suspicious transactions for a period of time until it could verify the validity.

I look forward to continuing to work on this and encourage all residents to contact me regarding this important issue if you have an idea for how to curb senior exploitation. You may reach me at delpkrizek@house.virginia.gov.

onnection Newspapers won dozens of awards from the Virginia Press Association for work done in 2015. Award winners were announced on Saturday, April 9, at an awards banquet in Richmond.

While the papers won awards in many categories, the common underpinning was community journalism, accessibility of information, and reporting on critical issues like transparency in government.

EDITORIAL

Thematically, the papers won multiple awards for stories and

sections that were informative and helped make communities, events and resources more accessible to our readers.

Examples included Ken Moore's reporting on Robert Simon's role in Reston, which included coverage of Simon's 101st birthday, Simon's ongoing influence, and his obituary. The series won first place.

Print newspaper obituaries play a vital role in local communities, reflected in Jeanne Theismann's first place award for three obituaries in the Alexandria Gazette Packet. Earl Lloyd was born into "the cradle of segregation" yet persevered to become the first African American to break the color barrier in the NBA. veteran and survivor of the Battle of the Bulge. He was a beloved local doctor for more than 60 years. And Ferdinand Day was the first African American to be elected to chair a public school board in the state of Virginia.

We are lucky to have cartoonist Steve Artley to skewer and edify many issues, including his first place cartoon that suggests Alexandria could solve parking and housing problems by placing both on barges in the Potomac River.

Jean Card, Renee Ruggles and Laurence Foong have collaborated over several years on the Insider's Guide to the Parks, which won awards in Mount Vernon and Vienna/Oakton, capping several awards for informational graphics.

Our Newcomers and Community Guide to Arlington was described as "Informative, well written, with good use of graphics." Winners included Steven Mauren, Eden Brown, Vernon Miles, Shirley Ruhe, Laurence Foong.

Sarai Johnson, Hope Nelson, Shirley Ruhe, and Steve Hibbard won second place for entertainment pages in the Alexandria Gazette Packet, weekly coverage of arts, entertainment, food and things to do in Alexandria.

Reporting on elections, the environment, health and fitness, and organizations that are designed to help others also garnered awards.

Little Hunting Creek Cleanup

This past weekend, state Sen. Scott Surovell (D-36) and Del. Paul Krizek (D-44) held their 2016 Little Hunting Creek Cleanup near U.S. 1 in Lee District. In coordination with the Friends of Little Hunting Creek, Surovell and Krizek were able to host three different cleanup sites in the Hybla Valley area: Janna Lee Avenue Bridge, Mount Vernon Shopping Plaza behind the Shoppers and Post Office, and Creekside Village Apartments. The three sites totaled over 25 volunteers that collected over 1,800 pounds of trash and 115 trash bags. Volunteers found a variety of items that included three dozen balls, three car tires, one mannequin leg, two toy children's cars, one air conditioning unit, two folding chairs, four bicycles, one small animal skull, one propane tank, and one child's lounge chair. With the assistance of Robert O'Hanlon's tree service, the cleanup volunteers were able to extract 10 grocery carts from the Janna Lee Avenue site.

Vital Upkeep

To the Editor:

I disagree with Mr. Spiegel's expressed concerns [Letter, "Decision on Re-Paving," April 7] about road resurfacing in the Ft. Hunt area. There's no need to "speculate" about how the decision was made Scott Surovell outlined the reasons why this resurfacing is long overdue in his comments in May 2015 which was widely distributed throughout the district. http:// scottsurovell.blogspot.com/2015/ 05/weekly-column-major-pavingoperations.html

The county (and the state) invested too little in road repairs in the recent past.

I appreciate that professionals at VDOT were able to make the de-

cision to resurface our streets rather than having it be decided by the local (or state) legislature. Mr. Spiegel seems to be concerned that having professionals do their job is somehow a bad thing - I

Upkeep of infrastructure is vitally important. We owe it to those whose taxes paid for our roads (in some cases 50-plus years ago) to take care of them. We also owe it to ourselves and our neighbors to take care of common areas. It's hard to imagine a more cost-effective infrastructure maintenance procedure than road milling and resurfacing (which reuses the recycled asphalt). I'm no expert, but it seems obvious to me as I walk our neighborhood that patching and tar are not appropriate for

road surfaces that often have cracks every 6 inches or less. Areas that have been recently milled often have potholes and large cracks penetrating deep into the substrate which seems to indicate the maintenance resurfacing may have already been delayed too long. Rebuilding roads from the ground up is far more expensive than periodic maintenance.

There's a well-known aphorism about being "penny-wise and pound foolish." One could make the case here, I think, that arguing against necessary road resurfacing is penny foolish, especially given the small amount that we each pay as citizens and property owners for this vital upkeep.



ome of the most spectacular gardens will be in bloom and on display during the 83rd annual Historic Garden Week in Virginia. The statewide event will include 30 different tours of more than 200 homes and gardens. Old Town Alex-

andria and Arlington, Falls Church and Fairfax County are participating in the Northern Virginia tours.

"These houses are historic and they all reflect the homeowners' personalities and interests," said Catherine Thompson of the Hunting Creek Garden Club in Alexandria. "Some are owned by young families. Some have small gardens and some have large gardens."

The Hunting Creek Garden Club teamed up with The Garden Club of Alexandria to organize the Old Town tour, a walking tour which includes five row houses with courtyard gardens. In addition to the private homes, which were all

many original architectural features, tour goers will have access to the Carlyle House Historic Park, LeeFendall House Museum and Garden, George Mason's Gunston Hall and George Washington's Mount Vernon Estate and Gardens.

"They are all really wonderful and beautiful homes and gardens and we feel very lucky to have them on the tour," said Thompson. "The homes are within two to three blocks of each other, so unlike some other [areas], we run a walking tour."

> From large oak trees planted shortly after the Civil War and gardens bursting with colorful blooms from hydrangeas, camellias, rhododendron, crepe myrtles and wisteria to homes with views of the Potomac River and clematis flowing over a pergola, visitors will be treated to vivid spring displays as five Old Town residents open both their homes and gardens.

> "People don't expect to have these amazing gardens behind these homes that can appear tiny from outside," said Amy Bertles of the Hunting Creek Garden Club. "One home has two gardens with amazing sculptures that were

built during the 1700s and 1800s and still retain done by the home owner who is an artist. She decorated her garden with a few of her sculptures."



In Arlington and Falls Church, Gothic Revival, Greek Revival, Arts and Crafts and Victorian architecture await visitors who take the tour hosted by the Garden club of Fairfax. The gardens include four 100-year old holly trees, an herb garden and a garden of Victorian-era plants. Two of the homes are on the National Register of Historic Places and are Virginia Historic Landmarks. The tour also includes visits to Mason Neck State Park, Gulf Branch Nature Center and The Falls Church.

Properties are chosen for the tour by local garden

clubs. "They're looking for properties that they know the public will enjoy," said Karen Miller Ellsworth of the Garden Club of Virginia and director of Historic Garden Week. "They're looking for beautiful interiors, an interesting history and a really nice garden."

In addition to its aesthetic appeal, Historic Garden Week, which 3,300 Garden Club of Virginia members spend more than a year planning, has a significant economic impact. "[Visitors] travel from 30 states and foreign countries and 25 percent ... spend the night and average \$1,207 on their [Historic Garden Week] trip," said Miller Ellsworth. "As a group, they spend \$2 million in Virginia each spring. The cumulative economic impact over the last 45 years is an impressive \$425 million."

Historic Garden Week began in 1927 when the Garden Club of Virginia organized a flower show and raised \$7,000 to save trees planted by Thomas Jefferson at Monticello. Money raised from the Historic Garden Week tours fund the restoration and preservation of nearly 50 of the Commonwealth's significant historic public gardens as well as a new initiative with Virginia's state parks.

Old Town tour tickets are \$45. Group tours for 10 or more people are \$40 per person. Single-site tickets are \$25. Tickets may be purchased on tour day at any of the homes and at the Alexandria Visitors Center. Advance tickets are available for \$40 per person at www.vagardenweek.org and at the Alexandria Visitors Center, 221 King St., Alexandria.



Meet the Chef: Pawel Podbielski

The Making of Filet de boeuf Wellington

hef Pawel Podbielski sprinkles flour on the counter so the pastry won't stick. He is making Filet de boeuf Wellington, a customer favorite, at Le Refuge on Washington Street. "Last Saturday night I made 12 of these and they all sold out," he says. "I'm getting this pan nice and hot and then I'll add Kaola gold oil because it's no trans fat and has a buttery taste."

He has portioned out pre-cut whole tenderloins, puts a little salt and pepper on both

sides and then sears each side to rare. "Now I'll let it rest for KITCHEN about an hour so it won't make the pastry soggy." Podbielski

heats up an adjoining skillet and tosses in white mushrooms. "Another minute and a half just to get good color." He strains off the oil and adds a bit of veal demi glace to coat the mushrooms.

"While the meat is resting it gives me time to get the egg wash ready." The whites of five eggs slip through his fingers into a bowl as he whisks 2 yolks and three whole eggs together for the wash. "I'll probably use the whites for meringues." The skillet on the stove has been replaced with a large saucepan bubbling with chunks of potato, cucumber and onion with a splash of vinegar for the cucumber soup, on today's menu as part of the cold soup trio. "The trio includes a small cup of red pepper, gazpacho and cucumber soup." Victor Flores places large red peppers directly on the flames of two burners to give them a nice crust. Then they will be submerged in an ice bath so the skins will slip off easily.

Hugh Fregnan is sautéing shredded purple and white cabbage in one skillet and slices of zucchini in another for the side dish to accompany the Wellington. "It will be on the plate with a little pureed carrot," Podbielski said. Podbielski visits the oven and pulls out a large tray of pate au choux that will be filled with ice cream and splashed with chocolate sauce for dessert.

Podbielski moves to the counter and places two tenderloins side by side on one of the pastry sheets. He reaches for a small square of duck mousse. "When we get whole ducks in, we make the mousse in house."

He spoons a layer of mushrooms on top of the mousse and folds a second pastry sheet over the tenderloins, tamping it down to get the air out. With a small pizza cutter Podbielski cuts around the tenderloin to make a circle, brushing the top with egg wash to give a nice color. Then, he cuts a small crescent to pinch in a design on the top of the crust. "I like to make them look nice."

"I'll brush butter on the cooking platter so the pastry won't stick; I'm pretty generous. Then I'll put it in a 400-degree oven for as long as the customer or-

dered. If they want it rare, it's in the oven just until the outside is a nice golden brown. If they order it well done, we walk a tightrope on the pastry getting burned." He finishes it off with a ladle of madeira sauce and the side of cabbage and zucchini.

"We have a lot of regulars who order the same thing every time. More power to them. Sometimes we get particular orders and we go above and beyond to satisfy them." Fregnan adds, "We have a group that comes in once or twice a week and we make special order potatoes for them."

Podbielski says he has been at Le Refuge about eight months. He came from a few other places including Monty's Steak House and most recently To Your Taste Catering. "I went to school to learn how to fix cars and worked in a shop for a while but that wasn't for me. I fell into restaurant work and loved it. But if you'd ask me what I was going to do in high school, I'd never have said a chef."

Jean Francois Chaufour, owner of Le Refuge for 33 years, shakes his head. Today part of the electricity went off and the three dozen soft-shelled crabs for the lunch special haven't arrived yet. Chaufour arrived in America from Beaugency France in 1976. He worked in D.C. as a waiter with his wife Francois and then became owner of Le Refuge, because he explains, "in France they don't give young people a chance. It's much better here."






