

Inmates Explore Ways Back to Community

Inmate Resource Fair at Fairfax Adult Detention Center helps inmates overcome hurdles upon release.

occara Puller moves table to table at the Inmate Resource Fair at the Fairfax Adult Detention Center on Tuesday, Sept. 20. Puller and the small group of other female inmates make contacts with the 20 vendors in attendance which represent the diverse partnerships the Sheriff's Office has made to help with their releases. Governmental agencies, businesses, non-profits all come together in the single room to share pamphlets, flyers and individualized advice for the 200 inmates, male and female, some of whom are veterans, that will visit the fair by the end of the day.

The partnerships, sitting behind tables lining the grey and beige painted room, help with the vast array of hurdles the inmates will face upon release: food, shelter, clothing, medical care, mental health care, employment, transportation, acquiring job skills and overcoming stigma.

"This is a great program," explains Fairfax County Sheriff Stacey Kincaid. "Anytime we have an opportunity to help men and women get the services they need it's a great feeling. We help them realize that every day is a new opportunity."

**PULLER** leaves the fair with a stack of papers, "info on groups to help," she explains. It's info that's useful to every inmate when they're about to be released. "if they can take it seriously then they can be successful," she says.

Puller has participated in many programs during her two years. She joined book club, has been studying for her CDL and has plans in three years to be "working for a company, have a 401k, be stable and collecting paychecks," Puller explains.


They are simple goals, but meeting these basic needs are often the difference between thriving upon release and recidivism.

"Some leave here with nothing but the bag of personal belongings they came in with," explains Lieutenant Jaime Popik, Supervisor of Inmate Programs and Recreation. That means no connections in the community, no support structure and lacking the means to acquire food and shelter. The inmates will also leave with the stigma of being incarcerated and trying to move back into the community, to be someone's neighbor, explains Popik, which means they often feel that they have no ties.

Popik hopes the community keeps an open

mind, giving the inmates a second chance. "Think of them as family," Popik explains,

"Think of them as family," Popik explains, "who had the worst day of their life and made a horrible decision. They're just normal human beings who made mistakes."

For Puller, the fair helps build upon the resources she acquired during the past two years. She received the medical assistance she needed, learned from the programs she participated in that those who had a hard

life can still rise above it. "These resources help people who don't have any light," Puller explains, thankful for the help.

who does credit repair help," Puller suggests.

Northern Virginia is a unique area because the community is so active and supportive, Kincaid explains. "This is an opportunity to get involved," says Kincaid. When the Sheriff's Office visits the community it responds and "when offenders get out they share the resources that have helped them by word of mouth." Consequently, the circle of those that benefit from the fair grows larger than just the 200 attendees.

# Music, Food, Crafts, Carnival and Fun

#### Fairfax Fall Festival is Saturday, Oct. 8.

utumn is on its way and so is the 40th annual Fairfax Fall Festival. It's set for Saturday, Oct. 8, in downtown Fairfax and admission is free. Vendors will be there from 10 a.m.-5 p.m., with the carnival running until 8 p.m. and musicians performing in Old Town Square until 8:30 p.m. (Rain date, Oct. 9).

"We're looking forward to four stages of fantastic entertainment, over 400 artisans and vendors, amusement rides and many other fun attractions for the entire family," said Fairfax City Mayor Steve Stombres. "I'm especially excited about the addition this year of a mechanical bull for the thrill seekers, a silent disco for the quiet types and a petting zoo for children, all at Old Town Square. We hope to see everyone from the City of Fairfax, plus residents from around the region, at this fun, annual tradition."

Crafts booths and displays will line both sides of University Drive, Main Street and Sager Avenue, where hundreds of juried fine artisans will sell their handmade works. Items will include jewelry, dolls and toys, quilts, woodcrafts, needlework, pottery, vases, wind chimes, paintings and photography.

Food offerings – from booths as well as specialty food trucks – will include burgers, fries, chicken, barbecue, Thai food, kettle corn, ice cream and pie. There'll be two food courts: one will be at University Drive and Sager Avenue, and the other will be at University Drive next to the SunTrust Bank parking lot at 4020 University Drive.

Three beer gardens are on tap: At the Main Stage at University Drive and South Street, in Old Town Square at University



Drive and North Street, and at University Drive and Sager Avenue.

The festival fun also includes a community market, business expo and Touch-a-Truck. Presented by Fairfax City Parks & Recreation and Department of Public Works, Touch-a-Truck will be on University Drive

near Armstrong Street and will enable children to see and explore City of Fairfax work vehicles and equipment. There'll also be a Harley Davidson show-and-tell; and new this year for parents is a baby rest stop at Sager Avenue.

#### Children's Stage

The Children's Stage will be in the SunTrust Bank parking lot at 4020 University Drive, The entertainment lineup is as follows: 10:30-11:15 a.m., Mr. Skip; 11:30 a.m.-noon, Turley the Magician; 12:15-12:45 p.m., eMotion Dance & Fitness; 1-1:45 p.m., Rocknoceros; 2-2:30 p.m., Tiger Eye Tae Kwon Do; 2:30-3 p.m., Reptiles Alive! (wildlife educators with exotic animals); 3:15-4 p.m., Mad Science; and 4-5 p.m., Bach2Rock.

In addition, the carnival rides will be in that same area, as well as face painting, balloon art and fake tattoos.

#### Main Stage

The Main Stage and beer garden, at South Street and University Drive, will feature live music from 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Performing will be: 11 a.m.-1:30 p.m., Vinyl Invention, playing classic and modern rock, R&B and funk; and 2:30-5 p.m., Mirage, playing Fleetwood Mac and Stevie Nicks songs.

#### Old Town Hall

Old Town Hall, at 3999 University Drive, will host Art Alive! It's presented by the Fairfax Commission on the Arts and will feature hands-on entertainment for all ages. The fun will include a chalk festival and painting for everyone, and Paint Your Own Pottery will help people make either free, paint-and-take pottery or mosaic pumpkin plaques.

#### Old Town Square

Old Town Square is at the corner of University Drive and North Street. Entertainers there will be: 10 a.m.-noon, Main Street Community Band; 12:30-3 p.m., Alex Hilton

#### **Parking**



# Independent Police Auditor Marks History

# Kudos to Board of Supervisors for unanimous approval of independent police auditor; now on to the Civilian Review Panel.

he Fairfax County Board of Supervisors voted to create the position and office of independent police auditor on Tuesday, Sept. 20, creating the first civilian, independent oversight of law enforcement in Fairfax County. The unanimous vote demonstrated the board's commitment to the ongoing process that began early in 2015 when Board of Supervisors Chairman Sharon Bulova established the 32-member Ad Hoc Police Practices Review Commission.

Police Chief Edwin Roessler expressed strong support for two keystone recommendations of the Ad Hoc Commission, the auditor and the Civilian Review Panel, next up for consideration and implementation by the Board of Supervisors.

Many commission recommendations have already been approved, including the establishment of the Diversion First program providing treatment rather than jail for people in mental health crisis, development of an overriding use of force policy, and more transparency in police communications.

Independent oversight and civilian participation in reviewing police use of force, officer-involved shootings and citizen complaints will play a vital role in maintaining Fairfax County

Police Department's reputation as being one of the very best law enforcement organizations in the nation.

Some critics complain that the final language approving the auditor limits the independence of the office, but the auditor will be briefed on investigations contemporaneously, providing a window of oversight and sunshine not previously in place. There are more than 200 different civilian oversight structures around the

or country. While civilian oversight is a national best practice, the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing recommends that every community have community oversight of police, with each community developing the model that is best locally.

Public Safety Committee chair John Cook (R-Braddock) is tasked with shepherding major recommendations through the Board of Supervisors. He pointed out that the specifics of the approval for the auditor are not locked in stone; revisions after a period of experience would not be surprising.

Recommendations by the Independent Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee for the Fairfax County model included establishing the Independent Police Auditor and establishing a Civilian Review Panel to respond to commu-

nity concerns or complaints about alleged incidents of abuse of authority by the FCPD.

The panel as proposed would not conduct investigations and would not be involved in the disciplinary process for any officer, but would review select investigations after they are complete. The panel would also not overlap duties with the auditor.

The panel could issue public reports, and meet with the auditor periodically, providing its views to the Board of Supervisors and the chief of police as to policy and practices changes that may be warranted. The panel could also hold periodic public forums around the county to gather information and suggestions about the FCPD, public perceptions and recommendations for policy and procedure, involving other police advisory committees and members of the Board of Supervisors as appropriate.

Indications are that there will be some modifications to the proposal for the Civilian Review Panel over the coming weeks. It's a good time for those with interest to tune in.

The board's Public Safety Committee will discuss the creation of a Civilian Review Panel at its next meeting, scheduled for Oct. 25 at 1 p.m. at the Fairfax County Government Center.

# Support the Meals Tax

To the Editor:

The referendum on the November 8 ballot in Fairfax County to permit a surcharge on prepared food (a "meals tax"), if approved, will bring Fairfax into conformity with its neighbors. Montgomery County (Md.), Arlington, Alexandria, Falls Church, The City of Fairfax and the towns of Herndon and Vienna already have this tax. They are thriving.

When approved and implemented, this new revenue source will bring in an additional \$100 Million a year. Somewhere between one-quarter and one third will come from visitors to Fairfax. ter, Fairfax has been struggling to maintain what makes this a great place. Our excellence is at risk. Of course, it would be wonderful if the Commonwealth would meet its obligations to us, but they have consistently fallen short. This is the only new revenue available to us.

On November 8, I will vote and urge my friends and neighbors to vote YES on the meals tax referendum.

Instead of taxpayer relief, why is the answer always raising or introducing taxes? Since assessments in this area continue to rise, our tax bills escalate relentlessly without relief in sight. The Supervisors turn away from tough budgetary decisions. It is much easier for them to use the homeowner as a handy ATM machine to keep their coffers full. Enough is enough. Defeat the meals tax and force the Board instead to find

meaningful economies in the County budget.

#### Facing an Urgent Threat

To the Editor:

On Sept. 27, 2016, the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals hears oral arguments on the Clean Power Plan (CPP), the most significant step our country has ever taken to address climate change. The CPP, which has been attacked in the courts by polluters and their political allies, will save lives, create new opportunities in communities across the country, help strengthen our economy, and bolster U.S. global leadership. Oral arguments will reveal the truth - that the CPP is

consistent with the law, earlier court precedents, and other U.S. **Environmental Protection Agency** (EPA) programs. Given the extraordinary threat posed by climate change, the stakes simply couldn't be higher for our environment, our economy, and the next generation. Climate change is an urgent threat – and the Clean Power Plan is the most significant step our country has ever taken to address it.

The environmental and public health impacts of climate change are of great concern. Additionally,

climate change could also take a toll on our economy—from harming outdoor tourism and threatening coastal communities with sea level rise. The tourism and travel industry is Virginia's 5th largest employer, supports 287,700 jobs and more than \$7.5 billion in payrolls in 2010. The leading travel and tourist destinations for the Commonwealth are in Northern Virginia in Arlington, Fairfax and Loudoun counties, near the nation's capital. This industry is at risk as climate change threatens many vacation destinations and natural areas in Fairfax, like Great

Falls, Pohick Bay, and Mason Neck. These areas also support other jobs and industries like public transportation, restaurants, retail shops.

On three separate occasions, the U.S. Supreme Court has upheld EPA's authority and responsibility under the Clean Air Act to protect human health and welfare by limiting carbon pollution. The Clean Power Plan will save lives, create new opportunities in communities across the country, and help strengthen our economy.





# Opening Season with Double Delight

Virginia Opera brings 'The Seven Deadly Sins' and 'Pagliacci' to the Center for the Arts.

irginia Opera opens its 25th season at the Center for the Arts with a fascinating double bill not previously seen in North ern Virginia.

The double-bill includes Kurt Weill's satire about unfettered capitalism "The Seven Deadly Sins." It is a work that includes both singing and dancing about two poverty-stricken sisters who take a journey across America. They fall prey to sins: Anger, Lust, Greed, Envy, Pride and Jealousy along with Hunger.

The second half of the twin-bill evening is a new production of "Pagliacci" by Leoncavallo. It is a tale about an actor playing a "clown" who nevertheless experiences the great burdens and sorrow, just like any other real person. And his burdens take place in a fast-paced all-consuming journey of jealousy and murder

This is the sixth consecutive season featuring the "First of Firsts" series introducing local audiences to operas never performed by Virginia Opera, said Adam Turner, Virginia Opera's Principal Conductor and Artistic Advisor.

"Virginia Opera makes a bold repertory choice with this season's opener designed to pique the interest of both newcomers and seasoned opera goers alike," said Turner. "Virginia Opera is truly excited to present this unique pairing."







miscreants' innocent victims. Criminals do not "pay their debt to society" through incarceration, which requires massive security expenditures and provides food, shelter, and medical care at taxpayer expense.

Governor McAuliffe claims to believe that Virginia, to be "more equal," must give such criminals the same or more say in governance as their victims. Rapists must have the same say as the women they raped, thieves the same say as those from whom they stole, bank robbers the same as bank depositors, kidnapper and hostage, the innocent man walking down the street and the gang who beat him senseless.
