## The One to Watch

## National political and media attention laser-focused on the race for Virginia's 10th Congressional District.

s LuAnn Bennett, the Democratic challenger for Virginia's 10th Congressional District seat, spoke to supporters at a political "house party" in Herndon, a New York Times reporter stood to one side, taking notes.

Last week, Barbara Comstock, the 10th District's freshman Republican, was shadowed by a reporter from The Wall Street Journal as she met with constituents during several campaign events.

The national media attention is just one indication of how the 10th District is being tracked as a crucial battleground race in a "bellwether" district. In the 2014 midterms, Comstock easily retained the seat of her GOP predecessor and mentor, U.S. Rep. Frank R. Wolf. When Wolf announced his retirement in 2013, ending a distinctive three-decade career in Congress, the seat instantly became battleground territory.

The race has even attracted attention outside the United States. In August, the BBC featured a story about the negative impact Donald Trump, the GOP's controversial presidential nominee, may have on "down-ticket" Republican candidates.

While Comstock has repeatedly declined to say if she supports the man at the top of the GOP's ticket, Democrats have repeatedly tried to tie Comstock to Trump.

prime pick-ups in their path to regaining a majority in the House. Earlier this month, the Democratic National Committee (DNC) signaled its support for targeted House races by transferring \$2.5 million to help them out.

In Washington's costly media market, each candidate has been modest in purchasing air time.

So far, Bennett has released two

Committee's "Red to Blue" program, which offers targeted campaigns "financial, communications, grassroots, and strategic support."

Comstock appears prepared for the battle, as she has raised well over twice as much money as her opponent's campaign.

Through June - the last Federal Election Commission reporting date - Comstock's campaign had total receipts of \$3,246,229, and was still holding \$2,256,612 in hand. The Bennett campaign had

> raised \$1,207,309, and had \$871,830 remaining.

### **DEBATES**

In the intense fight for votes, the two McLean residents are preparing for their first debate, sponsored by the Loudoun County Chamber of Commerce, which will be held Oct. 6 at the National Conference Center in Lansdowne. Comstock and Bennett will clash again on Oct. 19, at a second debate, at the Northern Virginia Chamber of Commerce in Tysons.

## Wannabe Beekeepers Wanted

eekeeping is a trending hobby, but many stung by the idea don't know where to begin. On Sunday, Oct. 8, from 2 - 5 p.m. at the Reston Association Headquarters Conference Center, master beekeeper Todd Harding teaches wannabe backyard beekeepers the basics of procuring, naintaining, and feeding bees. but is open to everyone, regardless of address.

While tending for bees is not as frequent as walking and training a puppy, bees require care, but the rewards are sweet. During his afternoon class called "So You Want to be a Beekeeper," Harding shares the basics of maintaining hives and equipment as well as the amount of space, work, and expense in-

The honey bee population is under threat from mites, diseases, and pesticides. Participants learn the plight of pollina-The class is held in Reston at tors, how to spot and thwart pecially for successful gardening," the home-owners association, problems in their hives, and connect to local clubs, teaching groups, and mentors.

"Why should folks sign up for a \$100 class when I can help them make a decision about whether to pursue this hobby?" asks Harding, whose dozen honey bee hives are located on an easement near Reston's community organic gardens. Ten years ago, he wanted to learn beekeeping skills but did not know where best to place his hives. The class covers that possible conundrum, too.

"We understand the need to increase pollinators in this area, essaid Patricia Pearl Greenberg, Environmental Resource Supervisor, Reston Association. "We also see

## Passions in their Place

# Art, craft and food festival Clifton Day returns Oct. 9.

n 2005, Frank Burdell of Fairfax started blowing glass. He was driving back from Niagara Falls with his family when they stopped randomly in Corning, New York and decided to take a few short classes in blowing, fused glass and etching.

Burdell went on to take more classes back in Northern Virginia, in Sperryville and Warrenton. Before long, his "addicting habit" had amassed him a large body of work: hand-made blown glass works of plates, bowls and vases of various sizes and shapes.

"Your mind can't wander," Burdell said.
"You focus on that one part thing, doing nothing but that glass piece. It's very intensive work. Hot work, and challenging."

To support his hobby, and to share his art, Burdell began to sell it under the name Lucky Break Glass Co. Ten years ago, he began bringing the works to the annual Clifton Day festival.

"Clifton is one of the only venues I have a chance to sell it, show it off and meet people," he said. "And since I live so close, I see a lot of neighbors, people my kids know. And I have repeat customers who expect me to be there, so I'm there."

Burdell is one of around 150 vendors scheduled to participate in this year's Clifton Day, along with antique dealers, artists and bakers. The festival, celebrated in the historic downtown area, began in 1967.

"It takes months of planning and a dedicated team of volunteers to organize and coordinate all the logistics for Clifton Day," event chair Barbara Hutto said in a statement. "But in the end, it's gratifying to produce this family-friendly event, which show-

cases one of the area's most beautiful and historic towns."

In addition to the vendors, tens of thousands of expected visitors can expect live music throughout much of the day, a Civil War reenactment, dance performances, pony rides and a wide variety of foods and drinks.

**THE 2016 FESTIVAL,** hosted by the Clifton Betterment Association (CBA), is a fundraiser for the Girl and Boy Scouts, Clifton Lions Club, Acacia Lodge, the Clifton Presbyterian Church and other nonprofit groups.

"These nonprofits help make Clifton a special place to live," CBA president Michelle Stein said in a statement. "The festival provides a way to support them and recognize their contributions to the community."

Clifton Day is also the one day of the year the Virginia Railway Express stops in Clifton. It provides round-trip service from all stops between Manassas and Rolling Road. The ride to Clifton is free and the return trip costs \$5 per person (free for children under two years old).

This means the town draws exponentially more visitors and from further afield than any other day. For new Clifton resident and small business owner Lauren Betz of Sweet Annaline's custom-decorated sugar cookies, the immediate swell of customers is a cherry on top of her already feeling welcomed to the community.

"I've heard that it's very large," she said, "but as long as weather holds, we should expect some great traffic."

Betz is planning to have lots of cookies decorated with fall themes, as well as some iconic Clifton images including the Texaco sign and festival gazebo.

Pat Lasus of Fairfax Station is a member of the Clifton Day planning committee and coordinates the eight vendors in a special art and crafts demonstration area.

She said favorites such as a potter, beekeeper and birdhouse builder will all be

back.

"Everything in there, someone has made," Lasus said. "It's the value of creating something and having other people enjoy it. We've known each other in this square for many years." Lasus will have a booth herself where she'll show off items she's created from Angora wool spun from 13 rabbits she keeps as pets. A new group in the craft area based out of Centreville will be rolling decorative paper beads and donating the profits to assistance for Haiti.

**CLIFTON DAY** is scheduled for Sunday, Oct. 9, from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Admission is free. Parking starts at five dollars per car. For more information visit www.cliftonday.com or the Clifton Day Facebook page.



## Independent Police Auditor Marks History

## Kudos to Board of Supervisors for unanimous approval of independent police auditor; now on to the Civilian Review Panel.

visors voted to create the position and office of independent police auditor on Tuesday, Sept. 20, creating the first civilian, independent oversight of law enforcement in Fairfax County. The unanimous vote demonstrated the board's commitment to the ongoing process that began early in 2015 when Board of Supervisors Chairman Sharon Bulova established the 32member Ad Hoc Police Practices Review Commission.

EDITORIAL Police Chief Edwin Roessler expressed strong support for two keystone recommendations of the Ad Hoc Commission, the auditor and the Civilian Review Panel, next up for consideration and implementation by the Board of Supervisors.

Many commission recommendations have already been approved, including the establishment of the Diversion First program providing treatment rather than jail for people in mental health crisis, development of an overriding use of force policy, and more transparency in police communications.

Independent oversight and civilian participation in reviewing police use of force, officerinvolved shootings and citizen complaints will play a vital role in maintaining Fairfax County

he Fairfax County Board of Super- Police Department's reputation as being one of the very best law enforcement organizations in the nation.

> Some critics complain that the final language approving the auditor limits the independence of the office, but the auditor will be briefed on investigations contemporaneously, providing a window of oversight and sunshine not previously in place. There are more than 200 different civilian oversight structures around the

country. While civilian oversight is a national best practice, the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing recommends that every community have community oversight of police, with each community developing the model that is best

Public Safety Committee chair John Cook (R-Braddock) is tasked with shepherding major recommendations through the Board of Supervisors. He pointed out that the specifics of the approval for the auditor are not locked in stone; revisions after a period of experience would not be surprising.

Recommendations by the Independent Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee for the Fairfax County model included establishing the Independent Police Auditor and establishing a Civilian Review Panel to respond to community concerns or complaints about alleged incidents of abuse of authority by the FCPD.

The panel as proposed would not conduct investigations and would not be involved in the disciplinary process for any officer, but would review select investigations after they are complete. The panel would also not overlap duties with the auditor.

The panel could issue public reports, and meet with the auditor periodically, providing its views to the Board of Supervisors and the chief of police as to policy and practices changes that may be warranted. The panel could also hold periodic public forums around the county to gather information and suggestions about the FCPD, public perceptions and recommendations for policy and procedure, involving other police advisory committees and members of the Board of Supervisors as appropriate.

Indications are that there will be some modifications to the proposal for the Civilian Review Panel over the coming weeks. It's a good time for those with interest to tune in.

The board's Public Safety Committee will discuss the creation of a Civilian Review Panel at its next meeting, scheduled for Oct. 25 at 1 p.m. at the Fairfax County Government Cen-

## Understanding Cyber Security Challenge

To the Editor:

As our dependence on technology increases, so too does our vulnerability to cyber attacks and having our personal information used against us. We see attacks on private sector organizations like Target, JP Morgan, and most recently, Yahoo where a consumer's data is compromised and often exploited for financial gain. I find it even more disturbing, however, that similar attacks have occurred on government information systems, particularly those within the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) and the IRS. Just these two examples show that our government's information systems are less protected compared to those in many private sector organizations. I was also disturbed to learn from the Chairman of the Oversight Subcommittee for Science, Space and Technology that a recent witness from the GAO







Waters and company also brought back a three-acre corn maze full of eight-foot-tall stalks. Last year's design of farm mascot "Henry" the cow has been replaced by a Chinook Helicopter, a farewell gesture to former head grower

Workhouse **Arts Center** theater opens new season.






