Celebrating Joshua Owusu's Life

Stratford Landing student loses brain cancer battle.

oshua Owusu's bell-like soprano voice floated through the reception hall, carrying the words "Maybe we found love right where we are," from singer Ed

Sheeran's hit "Thinking Out Loud."

A video projected on one side of the hall showed Owusu, a sixth grader at Stratford Landing Elementary School, performing confidently and innocently onstage, sharply dressed with suspenders and a clip-on bow tie.

Some of those gathered took videos of the projection with cell phones, others watched and smiled, tears coming. Others looked away.

Owusu was diagnosed with brain cancer — glioblastoma — in March earlier this year. On Sept. 26, he died while in the care of INOVA hospital and with family members.

The reception on Oct. 8 directly followed Owusu's funeral at Aldersgate United Methodist Church in the Mount Vernon area of Alexandria. The service included a poem inspired by the young student and a choir of his sixth-grade classmates singing "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" directed by Lianne LaFleur.

Many wore green, Owusu's favorite color, while others wore ornate black and white dresses and robes with geometric and flowery patterns.

Near the center of the room, the boy's parents sat at a table accepting a steady stream of embraces, words of condolence and other caring hands reaching out for them.

"Joshua had an incredible smile and spirit of life," said Stratford Landing counselor Stephanie Kasparek. "It seemed as though every moment was a new adventure for him and he took risks, inside the classroom and outside with peers. That thirst for knowledge did not dissipate even after brain surgery and radiation treatments."

ryant Principal Tanganika (Tangy) Millard isn't basking in last year's graduation success. Millard is working to ensure her students receive individu-

alized and real-time attention required to succeed adults.

Located at 2709 Popkins Lane, Bryant Alternative High School is part of Fairfax

County Public Schools which educates 186,000 students from K-12. Of that, Bryant serves 310 students, ages 17-22, in grades 9-12. Many of Bryant students are eli-

gible for free and reduced-price meals.

Millard's vision for Bryant is based on innovation and three core values: Educating the mind, building character and nurturing the spirit. She also brings a new perspective to alternative school

thinking.

"What usually comes to mind when you think about alternative schools is bad kids," Millard said. "This is not true." Around 90

percent of Bryant students choose Bryant because of its flexibility. Some enroll in Bryant to advance their progress. Others want to fin SEE BRYANT, PAGE 3

ish faster for personal reasons. The remaining 10 percent attend because of a mistake they've made at a base school. These are the second-chance students.

EDUCATING THE MIND

Flexibility is a common component of alternative high schools. Bryant operates on a 4x4 schedule, where students enroll in four classes per semester rather than eight. According to Millard, this allows students to focus on learning while balancing other life responsibilities. Students also complete diploma requirements in small class size settings of 10-15 students on average, thus allowing greater student-teacher interaction

With the new hire of Apex Coordinator Jennifer Diglio, who has had 17 years in FCPS, Millard has stepped up flexible options for students. Apex is an online high school curriculum that allows students to work from school and home to complete courses. According to Diglio, any Bryant student can sign up for an Apex course. "It offers students the option to move through courses at their own pace, the ability to take courses not offered at Bryant, such as precalculus, and it provides real-time results on quizzes," said Diglio who monitors progress in person, online and by cell phone.

Millard hired Courtney Ben in 2016 from Carl Sandburg Middle School by eking out funds to expand and adjust learning modules for special education students.

"Literacy is a huge area of need," said Ben, the special education English teacher. With

Ben's addition, the special education department totals five, each teacher with their own specialty, including math and science.

BUILDING CHARACTER

"I realized after June's graduation that students needed more focus on what comes after graduation," Millard said. "Graduation is a huge achievement for these kids [many are firsts in families to graduate] but there is more than that." One goal is to help students envision a future beyond a \$10 hourly job.

That's why she's employed Celeste LaCour-Williams, career development coordinator and national certified counselor. She

helps students with the process of selfawareness, career exploration and post-secondary planning. Before graduating, LaCour-Williams said, "All students have a plan."

As many Bryant students know, the journey forward is not always easy. Shortly after Bryant's Sept. 6 Convocation to celebrate the new academic year, the school experienced a tragedy with a shooting of a 17-year-old Bryant sophomore in Lorton. Millard gathered students and teachers together to express what they were feeling. "We need to talk about this as a family," she said to the group. "We need to take care of each other"

Millard, Diglio, Ben and LaCour-Williams are happy at the changes they've seen since that event. Students are back on track. Class attendance is 80 to 85 percent. "It's a miracle," one of them said. "It's the way we deliver lessons," said the other. "It's the leadership of Principal Millard," LaCour-Williams concluded.

Habitat NOVA Celebrates Completion of Two New Homes

wo families achieved their dream of building and owning their own home, thanks to Habitat for Humanity of Northern Virginia (Habitat NOVA). On Sept. 18 the Mansaye and Omar families were joined by more than 90 volunteers, Habitat NOVA board members and staff, project partners, and guests in celebration of their newly completed homes. Dan Storck, supervisor for the Mount Vernon District of Fairfax County, served as guest speaker. The new homes were designed pro bono by Sanchez Palmer Architects & Triad Engineering. Key corporate partners included E*TRADE, The Stafford Foundation, Capital One, Leidos, Inc., Wells Fargo, Freddie Mac, Fannie Mae, and Bean, Kinney & Korman, P.C.Community volunteers worked more than 1,500 hours over the course of 19 months to build the two Clayborne Avenue homes. In addition, each family completed 400 hours in "sweat equity" to finalize the construction. Built to EarthCraft Gold standards, each house is

"The Mansaye and Omar families earned the right to own these homes. They worked so hard to establish great credit. Owusu was enrolled in the Advanced Academic Program center at Stratford Landing. His base school was Groveton Elementary.

"He touched a lot of people in the short time he was there," said Stratford Landing assistant principals Shirley Shannon and Christine Prahl.

"If you did not have the pleasure of encountering Joshua, he was a happy, charismatic child, whose smile could

brighten anyone's day," said Stratford Landing principal Maureen Marshall. "He was loved by all who knew him."

The Stratford Landing and Aldersgate communities came together to raise money help Owusu's family with the funeral and burial costs. "So they could grieve without worrying," Marshall said.

They also created sign-ups for families to provide food for Owusu's family, as well as the reception.

"The generosity of the Aldersgate and Stratford Landing communities was astounding," Kasparek said, "especially since most donors had never met Josh or his family." In his homily at the funeral service, the Rev. Jason Micheli explained that Joshua wanted to be a pastor when he grew up.

"If I'd had more time with Joshua I might've tried to talk him out of being a pastor," Micheli said. "After all, it's not a gig that pays very well but, then, Josh is smarter than me and he already had a plan figured out for that wrinkle."

As a kind and non self-conscious peace-maker among his friends, siblings and even parents, Micheli said that Joshua was "already a pastor, to you all."

"Josh was filled with a spirit that could've only come from Jesus Christ," Micheli said, interpreting from the Bible's book of Matthew: "I can't begin to an-

swer why Josh isn't here, but I do know where Josh is now. I know because whenever anyone asks Jesus about heaven in the Bible, Jesus responds by saying, 'You've got to know this kid.' You've got to become just like him."

At Stratford Landing, students and staff had already been spending time learning about dealing with cancer in their immediate community.

On Sept. 23, the school hosted a Lemon Face Contest to benefit Alex's

Lemonade Stand Foundation for Childhood Cancer. Mother Michelle Crabtree also spoke to the school recently about her first grade son, who is in remission from leukemia.

"You don't think about children with cancer until your child is diagnosed with cancer," Crabtree said in a statement.

"Childhood cancer is considered rare, yet in the 2015-2016 school year, there were four students either currently fighting cancer or that were cancer survivors at Stratford Landing.

"Awareness is key in helping to get more research dollars dedicated towards childhood cancer," Crabtree continued. "Maybe a student from Stratford will grow up to be a researcher that helps find better treatments and one day a cure for childhood cancer." Rain fell steadily outside the church during Owusu's reception. His burial service was held that afternoon at Mount Comfort Cemetery.

"Tragedy should not befall children, but that is the harsh reality that sometimes needs to be faced," Stratford Landing counselor Kasparek said. "Joshua looked his tragedy in the eyes, and chose to live in spite of it."

MVHS Teacher Studies at Estate

enneth Trotman, a history and social studies teacher at Mount Vernon High School, was one of 160 educators from across the nation selected to participate in the George Washington Teacher's Institute, a four-day residential professional development program, at the Mount Vernon Estate this summer. New Taxes Should Be Last Option

To the Editor:

All governments need tax revenue to administer essential programs and services. Therefore, they should be very frugal in their decisions to spend the taxes collected from hardworking taxpayers. They also should ensure that all programs and services are essential and run efficiently and effectively before raising or asking for new taxes.

But, does Fairfax County follow those standards? Keep the following in mind when you go to vote on the meals tax question.

In the last two to three years the Board of Supervisors (BOS) spent \$10 million on bonuses to employees whether they earned it or not, spent \$30 million to bail out of a bank because it did not have a secure loan from an

arts foundation in Lorton, bought property at prices substantially higher than assessed value, the county subsidized housing in plush communities where units are valued from \$800,00 to \$1 million. Also, BOS gave themselves a hefty pay raise to \$95,000 per year, although they were being paid substantially more than surrounding jurisdictions.

I sent the BOS an email before the 2017 budget hearings setting forth major programs and services that should be evaluated before any taxes are raised and that email was ignored not even extending me the courtesy of an acknowledgement. Unless the BOS can assure us that all programs and services are essential and are administered efficiently and at the least cost, stop wasting money, no new taxes should be imposed. Raising or adding new taxes should be the last option not the first.

Home Improvement for Holidays

Local contractors say there is time to spruce up your house and yard

hanging temperatures and falling leaves are a signal the holidays are near. From Thanksgiving through the New Year, homes are filled with guests and schedules are stacked with parties. Getting one's home guest ready by the holidays may be daunting, but it's doable with proper planning and realistic expectations, say local contractors.

Now is the time to begin projects that don't require elaborate planning, building permits or products on back order. "A window and door replacement project could be completed before the holidays if you started the process right away," said Michael Winn, president of Winn Design + Build.

Fall is a perfect time to begin projects that depend on outdoor elements, he noted. "The weather in the fall is generally ideal so it can be a great time to take on those exterior projects," said Winn. "Be ready, be decisive and start now. The fall is a great time to undertake exterior improvements such as new siding, trim, roofing, painting and landscaping."

He added that he recently "renovated a front porch, [adding] new windows, new trim and exterior painting. A fresh coat of paint can do wonders and satiate your remodeling urges until after the holidays when you have the time to tackle something a bit more ambitious."

While there probably isn't time to complete an extensive kitchen remodeling project, Winn says that smaller projects like adding new countertops, updating plumbing, changing electrical fixtures, painting and refinishing wood floors can be completed before the onslaught of holiday entertaining and breathe new life into a tired bathroom or kitchen.

"A bathroom may be a candidate if it's a 'pull-andreplace' [meaning that] the layout remains the same and the materials you select are stock or have a quick lead time," said Winn. "If you're not already well into the design process, your kitchen or renovation is probably best postponed until after the holidays."

Still, minor cosmetic improvements can give the illusion of a major change. "We recently designed and built a new entryway with built-ins for a client that creates a welcoming first impression for guests as well as needed storage for the owners," said Bruce

A pragmatic approach to a project is an important factor in increasing the likelihood that it will be ready in time for holiday entertaining. "If homeowners start early and have a realistic scope of work, it could be done," said Wentworth. "Quality work is important with home improvements and fast is not always part of that formula."

Architect Kai Tong of Hopkins and Porter Inc. in Potomac, Md., recently finished a project that he says offers a strategy and timeline that, if started now, would easily result in having an entertainment space by the holidays. His client wanted space for his television and sound equipment, so Tong designed a custom built-in unit for media and display.

"The design was intended to be the visual anchor of the new entertainment space, and to be harmonious with an existing lighted cove ceiling, adjacent columns and other architectural features in the room. The medium-stained cherry wood furthered that harmony," said Tong.

A millwork shop completed the design within six weeks. During that time, audiovisual specialists wired the space while the Hopkins and Porter team completed other renovation work, including preparing the wallpaper and removing existing wall sconces.

Tong said that overall, there was "very minimal on-site disruption."

Securing a contractor to begin a project could be a stumbling block, but not one that is insurmountable. "Most of the better contractors are in-demand and have production backlogs of two to six months," said Winn. "If your project is small and your timing is flexible, you may be able to squeeze [it] into their schedule. Many contractors have 'gaps' in-between their projects, while they're waiting for a permit to be issued or if they finished a project ahead of schedule. They may be able to accommodate your project if the timing is right."

The Army will conduct the public meeting on October 20, 2016, to review the Proposed Plan, which identifies the Preferred Remedial Alternative for the five sites. Identified in this Proposed Plan are the options for addressing the Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) and recommended approaches. Written and/or oral comments on the Proposed Plan will be accepted at this meeting.

The T-16 Range (FTBL-027-R-01), approximately 232 acres, and the Demolition Area-USACE (FTBL-025-R-01), approximately 489 acres are located in the northeast corner of the Fort Belvoir Main Post. The Grenade Court (FTBL-007-R-01), approximately 100 acres, is near the center of the Main Post. The Booby Trap Site (FTBL-024-R-01), 4 acres, is located in the southern portion of Main Post. The Remedial Investigation determined that the potential for MEC to remain at these four sites is plausible, but not high. The recommended alternative for these sites to address MEC is Alternative 2: Land Use Controls. This remedy is recommended for these sites since there are no known areas of elevated density of MEC or munitions debris (MD).

Demolition Area-01 (FTBL-018-R-01), 312 acres, is located in the northeastern portion of FTBL Main Post. Approximately 45.5 acres of the Demolition Area-01 were identified during the remedial investigation to have an increased density of MEC/MD in an area where mine training occurred. The recommended alternative for this site to address MEC is Alternative 3: Focused MEC/MD Removal and Land Use Controls. The focused removal would be implemented in the high MEC/MD density area of the site.

Mystery and History Mix In Port City-Gadsby's Event

Port City Brewing, Gadsby's Tavern, and St. Paul's Episcopal Church commemorate 200 years since Female Stranger's death.

ong before Alexandria's current heyday, when the Port City was in the middle of becoming a port city, a mystery woman came to Gadsby's Tavern with her gentleman caller, became ill, and died, her final resting place the St. Paul's Cemetery. "To the memory of a Female Stranger," the gravestone reads in part, launching two centuries' worth

APPETITE of lore and theory about her identity, her companion, and her presence in Alexandria in the first place.

On Friday, Port City Brewing teams up with Gadsby's and St. Paul's Episcopal Church to commemorate the 200th anniversary of her death, with the release of the brewery's annual Long Black Veil black IPA Paul's Cemetery to view the and a series of events at both the tavern and the cemetery that evening, following a beer-only release event at Port City on Thursday night from 4-9 p.m.

"We're very excited for it," said Port City's Chris Van Orden. Visitors "can just come to the happy hour, which is at Gadsby's Tavern. ... Then there's the Quest, where you actually take a shuttle to St. Paul's Cemetery to visit the grave of the Female Stranger.'

The event at Gadsby's will feature Long Black Veil as well as some of Port City's other offerings, paired with some appetizers and light fare. Tavern docents will be on hand to offer tours and provide a bit of historical context before daring event-goers board a shuttle to travel across Old Town to the St. gravesite for themselves.

At the cemetery, visitors will be treated to docent-led tours of the gravesite, including the Female Stranger's, and will even be treated to a 1800s-era funeral service reenactment.

But back to the beer. Long Black Veil "is a black IPA, which is a very hoppy beer with some dark malts in there as well. It looks like a stout or a porter but drinks closer to an IPA." Van Orden said. First brewed in October 2014, "it's got citra and centennial hops, which are citrusy and piney ... with a little bit of dark, slightly chocolately character to it too."

"It will be on draft for a little while, but it's a not a beer that lasts forever," Van Orden said.
