'Clawing Away For Information'

Parents of Annie McCann pursue human trafficking as possible factor in her 2008 death.

or Mary Jane and Dan McCann, losing their 16year-old daughter Annie was a personal catastrophe.

"This unholy journey we're on now," Dan McCann said, is like "our own twin towers."

Annie McCann was a junior at West Potomac High School when she was last seen by her parents, early on the morning of Halloween, Oct. 31, 2008.

Two days later, Annie was found dead in Baltimore, poisoned to death with lidocaine, a numbing medication.

Years later, the McCanns are still looking for answers.

"We just have to keep clawing away, clawing away, clawing away for information," Mary Jane McCann said. "It's amazing we could get out of bed and put one foot in front of the other. If it weren't for our faith in God, we wouldn't be here.'

Baltimore police investigated Annie's death and offered the theory that she committed suicide by drinking the antiseptic Bactine, which she had a bottle of for cleaning pierced ears.

Annie also left a note in her room, saying,

"Life is too short." She took a lot of money, clothes, and the car she had been driving to school.

Annie McCann was a junior at West Potomac **High School when she** was last seen by her parents, early on the morning of Halloween, October 31, 2008. Two days later, Annie was found dead in Baltimore, poisoned to death with lidocaine, a numbing medication.

"The runaway note, your jaw drops, first plane," Dan McCann

said. Then after learning Annie's death: "Your whole world is destroyed, OK?"

McCann's parents describe their daughter as artistic, funny, a high-achieving student beginning to come into her own.

"She's the fun-

from my daughter, no."

Though they initially went along with Baltimore police, the McCanns began to believe the case was much more complex than it was being treated.

But after struggling to obtain Annie's official autopsy report and having it reviewed by forensic pathologist Dr. Michael Baden in October 2009, "It crystallized for us," Dan McCann said. "It would've been impossible for Annie to kill herself using Bactine. At that point, we were starting to think, 'It looks like she was murdered."


The medical report showed more than 22 bruises and abrasions to Annie McCann.

Over time, the McCanns parents came to the painful conclusion that their daughter was sodomized and brutalized before being poisoned to death with lidocaine, and the lidocaine did not come from Bactine.

This was not the finding of Baltimore police, nor the FBI, which McCanns say confirmed BPD's findings.

"They did harm, actual harm, to us, by rubber-stamping a shoddy investigation," Dan McCann said. "You can well document, Annie was seen happy, animated, unbruised, tasting, sampling cannolis in Little Italy Baltimore. Hours later, she's battered, brutalized, with poison in her stomach. I don't see how you can connect those dots in anyway but homicide."

For months, the McCanns reached out to U.S. Sen. Charles Grassley (R-Iowa), head of the Senate Judiciary Committee. Grassley

has previously engaged with Fairfax County in requesting information from Fairfax County Police regarding the shooting death of Springfield resident John Geer by Police Officer Adam Torres.

They made direct contact with Grassley's office in November 2015. By January, they had a meeting with senior counsel Jason Foster, they said. Then in March, Grassley

wrote to FBI director James Comey, Jr., requesting information on the case from them.

Grassley followed that up with an Oct. 11 letter: "I requested non-redacted copies of all records related to the FBI's involvement in this case, including the recommendations list and the communications strategy document ... and all records relating to communications about the McCann case

between or among FBI employees or BPD."

Grassley goes on to say he received "limited documentation" in response from the FBI, leading him to conclude "It is unclear whether the FBI even opened a criminal inquiry into this matter."

The congressman requested all non-redacted documents related to Annie's case and asked several additional questions, all of which he set an Oct. 25, 2016 deadline for.

Still searching for answers, the McCanns' lawyer recently reached out to Fairfax County Commonwealth's Attorney Ray Morrogh to explore the possibility of looking at the case from an angle of Annie being a victim of local human trafficking.

At a meeting with Morrogh's office at the beginning of November, the family handed over documents, theories and leads they've gathered with a private investigator.

"I agreed to look at them," Morrogh said.
"It's a terribly sad case. They're obviously devastated. I want to do everything I can to help them." Morrogh said he really doesn't have any jurisdiction over any potential murder in Baltimore, but human trafficking out of Fairfax County is something he could pursue.

If that view is confirmed, the question is does he see probable cause to assert jurisdiction.

"We just don't know yet," Morrogh said. "You want to help a grieving parent in a situation like this. We'll do everything we can to find some answers."

Husband Arrested For Murder

airfax County Police Major Crimes detectives have an Alexandria man in custody for fatally stabbing his wife in the 8400 block



of Diablo Court. A murder warrant was obtained for Ricardo Molina-Martinez, who is in his late 40s. The victim is Yesenia Membrano-Diaz, 35, of Alexandria.

Officers had responded to the home on Nov. 28 at 4:50 a.m. after a resident reported she heard screaming outside and then saw a woman outside on the ground.

Officers found the Membrano-Diaz; who was unresponsive, suffering from trauma to the upper body.

She was pronounced dead at the scene.

Detectives from the Major Crimes Division and from the Crime Scene Section investigated. A K9 team and the police helicopter, Fairfax 1, responded to help search for a suspect.

One Suspect Arrested for Robbery, Another Still at Large

Robbery suspect

Man Sentenced to 17 Years for Child Pornography

ucas Aronson, 31, of Alexandria, was sentenced on Nov. 18 to 204 months in prison for production of child pornography, enticing minors to engage in sexually-explicit conduct online and recording the acts. Aronson was also ordered to serve a lifetime of supervised release, register as a sex offender upon release from prison, and to pay a total of \$20,000 in restitution to his victims.

Aronson pleaded guilty on Aug. 23. According to admissions made in connection with his plea, Aronson posed as a minor girl

while using video and text chat websites to chat with minor girls online. Aronson engaged in sexually explicit chats and enticed some of the minors to engage in sexually explicit activity on web camera and recorded the videos, which he maintained on a thumb drive that was found in his residence. In January 2015, Aronson was arrested after streaming a video of a toddleraged female engaged in sexually explicit conduct with an adult male on a chat website.

Dana J. Boente, U.S. Attorney for the East-

ern District of Virginia; Leslie R. Caldwell, Assistant Attorney General of the Justice Department's Criminal Division; Colonel Edwin C. Roessler Jr., Fairfax County Chief of Police; and Clark E. Settles, Special Agent in Charge of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Washington, made the announcement after sentencing by U.S. District Judge Anthony J. Trenga.

This investigation was a part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative to combat child sexual exploitation.







Expand Early Voting Now in NOVA

he success of early voting in the 2016 Presidential Election reaffirms my conclusion from visiting 12,000 homes last year — Virginia should expand early voting.



In 2016, I personally knocked on over 12,000 doors and after July 1, using an online secure application form, I helped over 900 voters sign up to vote by mail from their home. Nearly all of them had no idea they could vote early or vote from home. The vast majority of these voters did not participate in non-presidential elections (or even some presidential elections) because of a disability, lack of transportation, long commutes or disabled family members that required 24-7 home care.

This year, early voting exploded. In 2008, a little over 99,000 Fairfax County residents voted early. That dropped to 92,000 in 2012, but exploded this year to 120,000. The same was true in Prince William County. The rea-

son? Localities opened more early voting locations and kept them open longer.

There are two major reasons people do not vote early or by mail. They do not know they are eligible or voting early in-person is not always convenient.

There is no question that the legislature should pass what's called "no excuse" early voting.

The State Senate has passed no excuse early voting twice, but the legislation is always killed in the House of Delegates and it is unlikely to pass in the near future.

In the short term, Northern Virginia's localities need to expand early voting and they can.

Nearly all voters who ride the Metro's Yellow, Blue and Orange Lines or the Virginia Railway Express are eligible to vote by mail or vote early because they work outside of the jurisdiction in which they live. Localities need to set up early voting stations at all Metro and major transit stations.

If you cross a county line — from Stafford into Prince William, Prince William into Fairfax, or Fairfax into the City of Alexandria — you can vote early by mail or in-person. If you work day takes you more than 11 hours from home,

you can vote early.

Seniors who have trouble standing in line are eligible to vote early.

So are individuals caring for disabled family members. All first responders are eligible to vote early or by mail.

COMMENTARY

Fairfax, Prince William and Stafford County governments and public schools employ thousands of people. They need to get early voting information out to their employees. Social

service providers need to ensure that qualified voters receive information.

Finally, in non-presidential elections, many voters choose not to take time from work to participate in state and local elections. Our localities should better publicize early voting stations and have longer hours to increase participation.

Facilitating more early voting will require more election officers and thus more money, but shorter lines and fewer disruptions save all of us time on Election Day and encourages more participation in our democracy.

Facing Addiction, Tools in Fairfax County

The following information was provided by the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board.

he Surgeon General released the firstever report on Facing Addiction in America on Thursday, Nov. 17. Among key findings in the comprehensive report are treatments and management of early interventions of substance use disorders, the many paths to wellness and recovery, and a vision for the future, which encompasses a broad, inclusive public health approach.

The Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board reported a 9 percent increase in the number of individuals served with a history of heroin use from FY 2014 to FY 2015.

Through the first half of 2016, the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department assisted 40 patients with suspected heroin or opiate overdoses.

There were 18 deaths from heroin overdoses in Fairfax County in 2015.

Approximately 23.5 million Americans are in recovery from addiction. While addictions are common, many who become addicted are unaware of the treatment and supports that can help them recover.

In our community, the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board (CSB) can help. A new, anonymous online screening tool is now available on the CSB website. For help on where to find resources, talk to someone at the CSB at 703-383-8500 or visit the Merrifield center for a screening: Walk-in hours are Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Merrifield Center is located at 8221 Willow Oaks Corporate Drive, Fairfax, just off Arlington Boulevard at the corner of Willow Oaks and Williams Drive.

The national opioid and heroin overdose crisis has captured the attention of residents and

leaders across the country. Addiction is a medical condition and overcoming the powerful drive to use substances is difficult; support from family, friends and colleagues can help loved ones get started on the path to recovery. In conjunction with the release of the new report, behavioral health advocates urge all to observe a national night of conversation to engage in discussions about addiction and substance use disorders with those you love.

CSB clinicians and therapists urge parents, family members and caregivers to talk children about alcohol and drug use.

Oftentimes, parents have more influence over their children's behavior, including substance use, than they think. Talking to your children about alcohol and drug use is not always easy, but it is important. Become informed, from reliable sources, about substances to which your children could be exposed, and about substance use disorders, and talk openly with your children about the risks.

Some tips to keep in mind, from the National Council for Behavioral Health and the CSB: Be a good listener; set clear expectations about alcohol and drug use, including real consequences for not following family rules; help your child deal with peer pressure; get to know your child's friends and their parents; talk to your child early and often; and show support toward people in recovery. Extend kindness to people with substance use disorders and encourage treatment. Be supportive, not judgmental, of those that have problems.

Additionally, all are encouraged and welcome to attend upcoming, free community forum with a focus on drugs, addiction and personal stories of recovery and healing. CSB personnel and resources will be on hand.

"Parents Reaching Out To Educate Communities Together (PROTECT) Against Substance

Abuse," a forum hosted by the Unified Prevention Coalition of Fairfax County will be held at 7 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 5 at the Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) Gatehouse Administration Center, in the First Floor Cafe. Hear the personal stories of those with lived experience; parents, young adults, and professionals. A resource fair with community organizations will be held from 6:30 to 7 p.m. Free parking is available at the bottom of the garage. Register for the event.

PUBLIC HEARING ON WATER RATES AND PROPOSED 2017 BUDGET

At 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, December 15, 2016, Fairfax Water will conduct a public hearing on its Proposed Schedule of Rates, Fees, and Charges and the 2017 Annual Budget. The hearing will be held in Fairfax Water's offices at 8570 Executive Park Avenue, Fairfax, VA.

The proposed changes, to be effective April 1, 2017, include the following:

- 1. An increase in the Local Facilities Charge from \$10,240 to \$16,020.
- 2. An Increase in the Service Connection Charge from \$1,150 to \$1,240 f.
- 3. An increase in the Quarterly Billing Service Charge from \$10.10 to \$12.20 f.
- 4. An increase in the Base Commodity Charge from \$2.68 to \$2.81 per 1,000 gallons of water.
- 5. A decrease in the Turn-Off / Turn-On Charge from \$52 to \$44.
- 6. An increase in the Fees for Use of Fairfax Water Fire Hydrants to include the increase in the Commodity Charge.
- 7. An increase in the Overhead Charge for Labor from 104% to 105%.
- 8. A decrease in the Installation of Sewer Use Meter Charge from \$46 to \$35.

Revenues are expected to be \$171.3 million in 2017. Water sales are expected to provide \$149.2 million. Approximately \$22.1 million is expected from connection charges, investment income and other sources.

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

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LTA Stages 'A Christmas Carol'

Charles Dickens' classic is a holiday tradition.

he Little Theatre of Alexandria (LTA) is staging the Charles Dickens' classic, "A Christmas Carol," just in time for the holidays — from Dec. 2-17. Watch as Ebenezer Scrooge, a miserly Victorian humbug, travels with ghostly guides through Christmas past, present, and future to find the true meaning of the season. The show has a cast of 32 actors, 16 of whom are under the age of 18, some as young as age 6.

Lloyd Bittinger, who produced the show in 2012 and 2015, said "A Christmas Carol" has become an Alexandria tradition during the holidays. "There are hundreds of people who come to see the show every year, year after year. We try to put enough fun elements into the show, like music, singing, dancing, and special effects (fog, snow, lightning, etc.) to make it a warm and fun experience, in spite of Scrooge himself. We want the audience to leave the theatre feeling happy, singing a song, and loving having been there. We want this to be the start of their holiday period."

Director Michael J. Baker Jr. said LTA's team of producers, designers, actors, and volunteers have fashioned the stage in the mold of an 1843 Dickens Village. Baker, who portrayed Scrooge five times with different directors, said, "My journey as Scrooge has given me an everted view of 'A Christmas Carol' and the Dickensian terrain as a whole. I have endeavored to sculpt a portion of the tale from the actor's perspective — how Scrooge perceives the world and his audience, instead of the reverse."

In addition, he said: "Things discussed but never seen come to life in this latest LTA rendition. The chapel, the schoolhouse, Scrooge's bed chambers, Marley's under-

world and Scrooge's own funeral procession are but a few of the new revelations. Each serves to enrich Scrooge's metamorphosis and highlight the play's overall themes of gratitude, generosity, and hope."

Co-producer Russell Wyland, who has been involved with LTA's productions of "A Christmas Carol" for about 15 years, said: "People tend to think of 'A Christmas Carol' as an easy show because LTA does it every year. But in many respects, the show actually become harder each year, as we try to make it new for the audience." In addition to co-producing, he's served as costume designer, set designer, set builder, rigger, and set decorator through the years.

Away from the theater, he is a Victorianist who studies and writes about 19th-century England. "Doing The Christmas Carol means I am always thinking about how to make it more authentic," he said.

Tony Gilbert, who plays the role of Scrooge, said: "This is an 'on the stage all the time' role so it takes sustained concentration and little chance for water. Plus, many, many of our beloved actors have 'Bah! Humbugged!' this part, and even though the actors I have seen as Scrooge have schooled me, at the end of the play, I

try to bring myself into the role. I hope to tell Dickens' timeless story and deep lessons with my castmates as best as I can."

Clare Baker plays the role of the Ghost of Christmas Past. "This year, we are trying to establish a stronger connection between Christmas Past and Scrooge's younger sister Fan. I have been working to play her as a youthful and yet wise character," she said.

As far as challenges, she said: "There have been many different portrayals of Christmas Past, so it was difficult at first to make the part my own. Additionally, it was hard to find a way to find a way to play a spirit and yet maintain the youthfulness that Fan had. I observed the young actress who plays Fan, Vika, and tried to bring some of the youth she has to my part."

Nic Barta plays the role of Dick Wilkins, a kind-hearted, cheerful guy. "He loves the Christmas season and celebrating it with a lot of people. He and Scrooge were friends in school and when they worked for Mr. Fezziwig when they were young. After Scrooge becomes obsessed with money, he and Dick drift apart and don't really talk to each other anymore," he said.

Avery Evans plays the role of Boy Dick Wilkins, Belle's Child #3, who was

Ebenezer's friend when he was a boy away at school. He said the challenge was working on his projection. "It feels funny being loud and doing a proper British accent," he said. "I am trying to imagine my Papa in the last row. He is coming all the way from New York to see the play and I know he will want to hear me."

Ashley King plays the role of Fred's wife, who she describes as: "A very loving, caring, and devoted wife who admires her husband's positive outlook on life." She said a challenge was adapting her physicality to the time period. "I tend to slouch or pop my hip out but through repetition I am now able to stand up properly," she said.

In his first role, Lucas Trueblood plays the role of Boy Cratchit, the son of Bob and the brother of Tiny Tim. "I am a fun character because in one scene I get to decorate a tree while my brother and sister set the table," he said. "Speaking in an accent and being loud enough are hard for me."
