# Our Big Moment VDOT hosts Route 1 Widening meeting: Jeff Todd Way to Napper Road.



ver the last five years, there have been 461 crashes within the three-mile stretch of Route 1 between Jeff Todd Way and Napper Road. Two of those included pedestrian fatalities, making it one of the most dangerous roadways to walkers in Virginia. That data was part of Mark Gibney's presentation on the Virginia Department of Transportation project to widen that area of Richmond Highway from four to six lanes.

The project, estimated to cost \$215 million, is anticipated to begin construction in the spring of 2023 and be open to traffic by 2026. Gibney is the project manager. He presented at the first major public information meeting about the widening on Tuesday evening April 18 at Mount Vernon High School, alongside VDOT special projects manager and lead for the widening Amanda Baxter.

Baxter said VDOT is in the middle of the environmental assessment process and going through a noise wall procedure.

A primary concern for many residents and business-owners is how they will be impacted by right-of-way land acquisitions to make way for the widened highway. That portion of the project is estimated to cost \$120.6 million alone and begin in spring 2019.



More than 200 community members came out to Mount Vernon High School for the first public information meeting regarding the widening of Route 1 from Jeff Todd Way to Napper Road.

Baxter tried to calm some of the anxiety by saying each right of way impact case will be unique, and there "could be temporary easements or partial acquisitions" in certain scenarios.

Gibney's slides included a draft graphic of a typical segment of the improved roadway, which will include protected elements for bicycles and pedestrians. Design isn't expected to be approved until late in the year 2018, after two more major public hearings anticipated for late this year and mid-2018.

He also showed traffic volume

projections, which he said are based on the current Fairfax County Comprehensive Plan. They don't take into account the county's EMBARK initiative to bring Bus Rapid Transit and Metro expansion to the corridor, not to mention the increased population density those would bring with them.

"It's necessary," said state Sen. Scott Surovell (D-36). "Route 1 is simply no longer functional, it inhibits further growth for the community"

While Surovell said the impact widening will have from right-of-way acquisitions is unquestionably upsetting and disconcerting, it's important to keep in mind the vision of many tens of thousands more people coming to the Mount Vernon area with both the widening and EMBARK projects.

"BRT, Metro expansion," he said, "will bring a 300 percent increase in businesses in the area. These people, they all have to eat, shop, go somewhere."

Supervisor Jeff McKay (D-Lee) agreed there are difficult decisions that have to be made in carrying out the widening, but that's expected in transportation projects of this magnitude. He compared it to the Woodrow Wilson Bridge and Springfield Interchange.

"This is our big moment," McKay said, "our chance to get money here, congestion dealt with. We've

been deferring those decisions for too long. We need to see action down here."

McKay encouraged anxious residents and business-owners to be patient with the acquisition process, that some cases may be


grandfathered in, and he's confident individual concerns would be worked through.

Mount Vernon High School graduate and lifelong Mount Vernon resident Matthew Thompson said he understands change is inevitable, but wants to make sure all residents, including those from second and third-generation Mount Vernon neighborhood families — like those in Washington Square, Woodlawn Gardens, or Mount Vernon Apartments — will be remembered in the upgrade process.

"I'm excited about the increased pedestrian safety and the prospect of quick transportation up and down Route 1 that VDOT and EMBARK will provide," Thompson said. "My hope is that there is still affordability in regards to the housing, so that families that have been here for generations will be able to enjoy the added amenities and changes to the local community."

Thompson referenced some business institutions he remembers growing up with, including Johnny Mac's Rib Shack and Elsie's



## Man Tased, Children Recovered

### Barricade incident in Fort Hunt area.

barricade incident in the Fort Hunt area involving a man experiencing a crisis and his two young children was resolved shortly after 1 p.m. on April 17 when the children were able to exit the home safely, according to police. They were taken into protective custody, police said, and are now with

The man exited and re-entered the home in the 8600 block of Thomas J Stockton Parkway, not cooperating with police negotiators. Ultimately they tased him when he last came out of the house. Police took him into custody, he was then taken to the hospital to be treated and evaluated.

MPO Don Gotthardt with FCPD said a temporary detention order was issued for the 41-year-old man who was the subject of the barricade scenario. Gotthardt said the man is still under the care of a mental health facility and that "there are no supplements to the report indicating that any charges will be filed."

The incident began the previous night around 8 p.m. when police said they received a call from a concerned friend who thought the man was having a mental health crisis.

Officers made contact with the man in question inside the house but were not allowed to come inside, police said.

After it was discovered there were two children in

> the house with the man, police obtained an Emergency Custody Warrant. Crisis negotiators continued an intermittent dialogue with the man into the early afternoon the following day.



### County Poised for Continued Growth

To the Editor:

The April 12 article, "Uncertainty Amid Growth," might have left readers wondering about the strength and future of Fairfax County's economy.

Much of the uncertainty arises from concerns about the direction of the federal budget, because many employers in Fairfax County and northern Virginia are involved in government contracting. However, more than two-thirds of the federal procurement dollars won by Fairfax County companies in fiscal 2016 involve three departments for which President Trump has indicated he would seek increased funding: Defense, Homeland Security and Veterans Affairs.

For that reason and others, I think the Fairfax County economy is poised for continued development. In 2016, the Fairfax County Economic Development Authority worked with 194 companies that added nearly 7,500 jobs to the county economy. Many of those companies are in the professional and technical industry sectors that will generate the most prosperity for the community.

Just since the beginning of 2017 the Fairfax County Economic Development Authority has

announced several companies that are adding hundreds of jobs here. Some, like Favor TechConsulting or IOMAXIS, focus on work with federal customers. Others such as All Traffic Solutions and Global Guardian, focus on private-sector customers. This is the hallmark of a mature economy: companies working in a variety of sectors and for a variety of customers and finding the kind of skilled talent they need to thrive. This kind of economic diversity is what every community longs to attain.

This work is never done, of course. In addition to Fairfax County's traditional business strengths, my office has targeted cybersecurity, data analytics and translational medicine as industry sectors with great growth potential here. The foundation is firmly in place to help Fairfax County achieve even greater economic stability and prosperity in the years ahead.

### Good Use for Dirt

Stratford Landing Elementary School on Riverside Road is currently undergoing a taxpayerfunded \$25 million renovation. To the left of the school, a large mound of dirt is sitting there as a result of the excavation that took place as the renovations began.

To the left of the school, a small park is located. Whenever it rains, for many years, the park becomes a swamp with standing water remaining there for days after each rain event. This is a likely breeding ground for mosquitos and other insects that may very well cause harm to the children from the school who often play there. It is surprising to me that, year after year, the Mount Vernon supervisor and the School Board representative have done absolutely nothing to mitigate this serious health concern for the children of our community who attend the adjacent school.

I have a suggestion: Why not take the mound of dirt and spread it over the park to raise its elevation sufficiently in conjunction with providing appropriate drainage pipes so that rainwater drains off the park during rain events so that it is no longer a health hazard for the chil-

I checked the county maps and the park is not in a resource protection area (RPA). As such, there is no environmental impediment to getting this done. The sooner, the better.

# Ready for Next Phase of Diversion First

airfax County continues to make substantial progress on a program called "Diversion First." This program provides treatment instead of incarceration for people with mental health issues or developmental disabilities who come into contact with law enforcement for low-level offenses. With Diversion First, an officer can identify a suspect as needing supportive services, and can bring him or her to the Community Services Board (CSB) instead of making an

arrest. Instead of making an arrest, officers bringing low-level offenders to the CSB saves the County

money, time, and resources. Last year, 375 people were diverted from arrest into treatment- which represents a huge accomplishment. This is not the only opportunity for diversion, however. The County is now pursuing the next phase of the Diversion First program, with a focus on making diversions after this initial contact with law enforcement.



arrested for a low-level crime, such as trespassing or disorderly conduct, on a Saturday night. We may be held until Monday or Tuesday. We could then probably post a bond for a few hundred dollars and be re-

leased. People with mental illness or developmental disabilities, however, often have troubled employment histories, and do not have that money. They are often detained for months awaiting trial.

During this time, the County is paying approximately \$200 per day to hold them, all while their mental state is deteriorating. By their next hearing date, these individuals have often spent as much or more time in jail awaiting their day in court than if they had been found guilty of the original charges, resulting in a release based on "time served." They leave in a worse condition than when they entered. Eighty percent of the time, they will repeat their criminal behavior.

Diversion First breaks this cycle. It provides

Imagine you or I were judges with a treatment alternative at the bonding hearing, when the judge can offer "supervised release" instead of bail. Supervised release requires mandatory treatment, with supervision by a trained probation officer. The person gets treatment and can recover. Then they can be released from criminal charges later if treatment is successful.

> Studies show this treatment alternative can reduce the reoccurrence of criminal activity to as low as 20 percent.

> That means a 60 percent reduction in crime (from 80 percent to 20) from this population. Literally hundreds of crimes can be prevented each year. With jail costing around \$200 per day, and treatment only a few thousand dollars per year, over time the County will save significant funds.

> This program is a win-win. Treatment improves lives. Crime will be reduced. Taxpayers will save long-term money. We must continue the progress of Diversion First by implementing these new avenues for diversion. This will allow the County to direct resources more efficiently, allow the Police to save time, and help people with disabilities improve their lives.

# Weighing Long-Term Benefits of Summer Camp

# Camp experiences can enhance social and psychological development, say experts.

s the end of the school year draws near, so does the beginning of summer camp experiences. Child development experts say that summer camps offer more than just fun; they present opportunities for emotional, social and psychological growth and development.

"Summer camps provide children with a sense of community where they can feel safe and learn through first-hand experiences, said Stacie Gottlieb, director, Bullis Summer Programs at Bullis School in Potomac, Md. "Within this setting, campers develop a sense of independence as they try new adventures in an environment different from the norm."

Children benefit from the nurturing structure of a summer camp in a way that is different from the structure they get during a school year, says Jim Supple, associate dean of students and director of Summer Programs at St. Stephen's & St. Agnes School in Alexandria. "Summer camps allow children to be children," he said. "They allow them to make new friends, try new things,

and learn how to be part of a group. These are attributes of camps that will promote not only healthy interaction among peers, but also building a healthy image of what type of child they want to be."

A summer camp where children engage in new and memorable activities will sow seeds for learning during the upcoming academic year, said Shannon Melideo, Ph. D. associate dean of the School of Education & Human Services and associate professor of education at Marymount University. "For example, if your child's summer camp takes a field trip to a historical site that your son finds fascinating and then during the school year, the teacher introduces [the] same historical events and location, he has schema for the lessons. He is more likely to participate, learn more, be better prepared to read his social studies textbook, and even perform better on the exam.'

"Summer camp can be a terrific opportunity to grow your child's sense of competence and mastery over something that they love," added Carolyn Lorente, Ph.D., professor of psychology, Northern Virginia Community College. "By picking a camp where your child has an interest, they can

be mentored in a passion in ways that a typical school day often can't."

When selecting a camp, Melideo advises parents to consider a complete picture of their child. "For example, while your daughter, Sophia loves softball, find a summer camp where she can refine [her] batting and pitching skills and engage with books, perform in skits, play math games, and try something new," she said.


A child's social skills can be boosted at camps which provide children with opportunities to make new friends or nurture existing friendships, says Colleen K. Vesely, Ph. D., assistant professor of Early Childhood Education and Human Development at George Mason University. "Developing new social and cognitive skills outside the physical walls and social boundaries of school can help promote healthy self-esteem in children, while spending time in nature can boost children's overall health and wellbeing." Camps offer an opportunity for children to gain skills that lead to independence. "For older children, over 8-plus years old, typically, sleep away camp offers opportunities to develop independence and self-reliance by providing children with space to navigate daily life away from the directing of parents but under the guidance of trusted adults," said Vesely.

For some parents, there are mixed emotions around enrolling a child in camp.

"Sometimes working parents feel guilty for enrolling their children in summer camps because of the need for child care during the work day," said Ivy Beringer, Ed.D., professor of Early Childhood Education and Dean for Social and Professional Sciences at Northern Virginia Community College. "However, children are usually very excited to attend summer camps. This is especially true if the children have input into the camp selection."

"Summer camps allow for continuous learning that extends beyond the regular school year [and] provide a relaxed atmosphere that stimulates their brains for creative learning without the assessment anxiety that often accompanies school classroom learning," said Beringer. "[Summer camp] enhances self-esteem by offering special interest learning in small group situations and often with a lower adult-student ratio in school settings."

"A mother recently called me with a concern that her son only wanted to attend soccer camps this summer and she felt this was too limited of an experience," continued Beringer. "My response to her was that if he was interested in improving his soccer skills she should view this in a positive light. After all, he will be outdoors in the fresh air and sunshine everyday, exercising his body, and enhancing skills in a sport he loves. What's not good about that choice?"





"This is one of the oldest communities in the county, rich with history," Thompson continued, "and I hope those that have deep roots here are able to afford the community in which they were raised when it's all said and done."


Supervisor Dan Storck (D-Mount Vernon) summed up the balance of sadness and joy he and many in the community feel at the outset of such a project. But ultimately, he said, "This community needs this redevelopment."

For someone who's built a business over the last 25 years, Storck said he understands. "It's like birthing a child." Losing it, he admitted, could be "sad, frustrating." Or for some, through the acquisition process, a relief.


