# Recalling a Life of 'Honor and Dignity' Family, friends remember Michael Bohn.

ichael K. "Mike" Bohn knew how to do just about everything. And according to one testimony after another at his memorial service last week, what he didn't know, he figured out.

Carter Bohn, Mike's oldest son, said, "What a remarkable person he was. He just knew how to do everything — and if he didn't, he figured it out. There is no end to the ways his background would manifest itself."

Bohn was diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumor in late February and died on June 1. The service, which was held at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, was packed with friends and relatives.

Bohn graduated from Texas Tech in 1965 and served in the U.S. Navy as an intelligence officer for more than 20 years.

He served in the White House as a White House social aide in the Nixon Administration and director

House Situation Room during the Reagan Administration.

Stephen Pickard, fellow golfer and friend, spoke

at the memorial service and said, "Mike was proud of his service. Mike's sense of honor and dignity went perfectly with the Navy. I can't tell you how deeply patriotic he was. He was a young man working in the situation room. He was chosen to be in a place at a very important time and able to serve them in very capable way."

Pickard said that because Bohn reached his pinnacle early in his life that he was always trying to duplicate this.

Although he worked as a defense contractor and ran a successful residential construction business after leaving the Navy, it was writing about his experience in his first book, "Nerve Center-Inside the White House Situation Room,"

of the White that brought his early experiences full circle.


> He went on to write other historical books — "Presidents in Crises" and "The Achilles Lauro Hijacking.'

Harry Carey, long-time friend, said, "Mike was a historian — he talked about presidents and wrote about the situation room. How wonderful his writing was. He had a curiosity to recount places and people."

Bohn also wrote several articles for the Mount Vernon Gazette. While many of the articles were about the history of local places, his interests were varied and one of the last articles he wrote was about the Little Free Libraries that have been popping up around Mount Vernon.

Bohn also wrote about another of his passions — playing golf.

Ron Milner said, "Mike used to talk about the history of golf. He loved to research new topics. I met him the first year I was here. He played a lot. He was a wonderful man, smart and always interest-

The Rev. Tuck Bowerfind, who officiated at the memorial service, gave Bohn a pass about not going to church.

"Mike wasn't a church-goer," said Bowerfind. "But it was not a measure of the person or his relationship to God. He didn't attend church but laid down his life for others. He had a concern that we

should love one another and cared for people."

Erik Bohn, Bohn's youngest son, said, "Dad meant a lot to a lot of people. What a wonderful upbringing Carter and I had. There is probably not a more accomplished person that I've known."

# Man Dies in Police Custody

airfax County Police are investigating an in-custody death in the 4300 block of Mission Court, Alexandria. Patrol officers from Franconia and Mount Vernon district stations responded to an overdose call for service at 4:32 p.m. Tuesday, June 26, involving 31-year-old Christopher Paul who was experiencing either a mental or medical health episode. According to police, a family member was struck in the head. When officers arrived on scene, they found the family member

outside the house. Paul was inside the house. Crisis intervention trained officers entered the home, and tried to de-escalate the situation by speaking with him. He was trying to harm himself and fell on the floor.

Immediately after Paul fell, officers placed him in handcuffs to prevent further harm to himself or others, according to police. After officers handcuffed him, Paul continued to flail and a supplemental nylon restraining device was used



# Max Wilbur Noah

ax Wilbur
Noah, Lieuten ant
General, U.S. Army
(Ret.) died on Friday,
June 15, 2018 at the age
of 86 from complications from a rare autoimmune disease

known as Churg Strauss or EGPA.

Noah served 35 years in the United States Army retiring as the Comptroller of the Army. He commanded at many levels including Commander of the United States Army Engineer School at Fort Belvoir, Huntsville Division Commander building in Israel on two critical airfields that played a part in the peace negotiations by President Carter, Commander, Saint Paul District for the Corps of Engineers, Commander, 2nd Engineer Group in the Republic of Korea, and Commander, 307th Engineer Battalion of the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg. Noah graduated in 1953 from the United



His military awards and decorations include two Distinguished Service Medals, two Legion of Merits, a Bronze Star, a Meritorious Service Medal and the Senior Parachutist Badge. Post retirement, Noah's efforts and leadership continued to be recognized serving as honorary Colonel of the 307th Engineer Regiment, receipt of the Gold Deflurry from the Army Engineer Association, and the Distinguished Alumni from Georgia Military College (GMC). Max was particularly proud of his appointment as a Distinguished Graduate of the United States Military Academy in 2015.

Noah grew up in Milledgeville, Ga. the son of Dr. Max and Dorothy Noah. He graduated from GMC and began his engineering education at Georgia Tech before receiving an offer of admission to the US Military Academy as an honor graduate of GMC. Max received his Master's in Electrical Engineering from Purdue University. His mili-

tary schooling included the US Army War College and the Defense System Analyst

He enjoyed the family farm in Maine and returned to his love of the water swimming 20 laps a day at the Mount Vernon Recreation Center. He is survived by his wife, Priscilla Loyal Treat VanSickler Noah whom he married Sept. 22, 1956, daughter Kimbel Burt and her husband LTC (USA-Ret) Michael of New Orleans, La.; son Van Noah and wife Meena, of Chapel Hill, N.C.; daughter Dabney Moulton and husband James, of Longmont, Colo.; and six grandchildren, Tori Burt Paddock (Craig), Marilyn Moulton Hammond (Eric), Max Oh Noah, CPT Daniel Moulton (Meg), Michael N Burt, Jeffrey Moulton; and three great grandsons, Theodore and Otto Hammond, and James Allen Moulton. He is also survived by his sister Joy Noah McMillan and husband Michael McMillan with their extended fam-

A memorial service will be held at 4 p.m.

Friday, June 29 at Woodlawn Chapel on north post, 6050 Gorgas Road, Fort Belvoir, followed by a reception and celebration of his life at the Fort Belvoir Officers Club on south post in the Castle room. His internment will take place at a later date at the United States Military Academy, West Point Cemetery with military honors.

Donations in memory of LTG Noah may be made to the National Museum of the United States Army through the US Army Historical Society (armyhistory.org). Noah also requested that his experience as a rare medical case and his remains be used to better understand Churg Strauss Syndrome (CSS) so that it can be more readily diagnosed and treated to improve the lives and survival of those who face it now or in the future. # Woodrow Wilson Bridge closing brings hours of gridlock.

know many of you who live, work and/ or play in northern Mount Vernon were very frustrated by the Woodrow Wilson Bridge closure last week. I, myself, spent more than three hours getting home as a



result of all the roadway issues. Many who experienced the delays commented that it was the worst traffic they have

ever seen in the area. First, thank you to all our first responders, who not

only responded to a fatal vehicular accident, a fire, and a hazmat incident, but also a bridge maintenance crew suspended from the bridge (Fairfax, Alexandria, Prince Georges and the District of Columbia), state police, multiple departments of transportation and almost 100 personnel, combined with the need to ensure the safety of all involved, as well as the need to inspect and ensure the bridge's structural integrity prior to reopening the roadway, all played a role in the 12-hour closure.

With such a massive closure of a major thoroughfare, area streets were severely impacted during this time.

Thank you to everyone who has contacted our office to inquire as to how this situation could be handled differently in the future. Fortunately, these massive incidents occur very infrequently in our area, but they do occur every few years. However, many experience traffic frustrations and back-ups on a regular

this incident that involved four jurisdictions even in the instance of unforeseen situations. I have reached out to our state elected officials, county and state transportation agencies and public safety officials to examine and determine ways to manage these situations to avoid the level of gridlock we experienced last week. I look forward to updating the community as these questions are answered and improvements identified.

> We are grateful this situation was not worse and that eventually, all but one made it home safely. This is another reminder that transit options and flexibility are critically important to our transportation infrastructure, and therefore the quality of life in our region.

> As with all emergency preparedness, it is good to have planned alternative travel options in the event of future incidents and emergency evacuations.

> Please continue to engage with our office, as we continue our efforts to improve roadway and transit in the Mount Vernon District.

I believe we need to do more to alleviate requiring a water rescue. The complexity of transportation challenges in Northern Virginia, hange Retirement Police: Don't

For months, members of the Fairfax Fraternal Order of Police Executive Board have attended meetings with the Fairfax County Personnel Committee, researching and negotiating proposed changes to the retirement systems, to which the following letter was recently sent to the Supervisor Pat Herrity. This letter does not reflect just one agency, retirement changes are being discussed for all Fairfax County departments and employees.

ear Supervisor Herrity, The Fairfax Fraternal Order of Police, Lodge 77, represents Police Officers and Deputy Sheriffs in Fairfax County. Our membership takes great exception with your misguided initiative to reform the Fairfax County Police Officers Retirement System (PORS) and the Uniform Retirement System (URS). The topic of pension reform comes up every few years and each time, the Retirement Agency and County

staff report that our systems are healthy, growing and sustainable. This was reinforced by the 2012

study by an outside consultant and recent comments by the Retirement Agency and County

You have stated several times that you believe that new employees want more pay now and less pension later. This would create two classes of employees, it will be detrimental to morale, and it will hurt our recruiting efforts. Paying new officers a higher salary than current employees who have had their pay frozen for many years will kill morale. At the same time, those new officers' higher pay will be absorbed by the increased contribution rate that they will have to pay. At the end of their careers, after paying more, they will be receiving significantly less.

In your newsletters, you have used broad strokes to paint the employee pension systems by misstating several facts and failing to acknowledge that the cost savings for your proposals are negligible while the potential costs are extremely high. Recruiting a diverse workforce of police officers and deputy sheriffs has become extremely challenging over the new employees who will ultimately have to pay last few years, especially with the negative sentiments towards law enforcement pushed by the media. Additionally, all law enforcement agencies are aggressively recruiting for diversity and our pension system is one of the few benefits that make Fairfax County stand out. Taking away retirement benefits for new employees will hurt our ability to recruit minori-

The current pay philosophy that the Board of Supervisors has in place calls for our salaries to be within 5 percent of the market average. As you know, the pay for our police officer ranks are only average for the region at midpoint and at top pay, they drop well below average. Our first line supervisors are not only 8-12 percent below average at mid-point, but it only gets worse when they reach the top of the pay scale. It is the final pay when the employee is at the top of the pay scale that gets factored in to their retirement. Not only is their pay the lowest in the region after dedicating 20-30 years of service to Fairfax County, but their pensions end up being lower because of it. Additionally, the rising cost of healthcare already diminishes current retiree income by as much as 40 percent.

Working in public safety in general and law enforcement in particular, the job takes a toll on the health of the employee's body. Police Officers are continually exposed to the portion of the population which, because of their lifestyle choices and/or circumstances, are often carrying infectious diseases and choose to assault officers. The constant exposure to this environment is compounded by the equipment that every police officer has to wear on their body to include a ballistic weight bearing vest, duty belt and an assortment of equipment. Scientific studies show that law enforcement officers have a significantly higher rate of suicide, divorce, health and mental health problems as well as an increased risk of some cancers. It is insulting to change our pension for more and receive less.

The cost savings from the proposed changes to all of the retirement systems is minimal and it won't even cover the cost of the high cost body worn cameras that are being forced onto the police department. Do we really need to drastically change the retirement benefit to pay for body worn cameras that are not needed as an additional layer of oversight?

The Police Department pension is strong and stable. We implore you and the board to make no changes to our system. Recruiting and retaining new officers is already difficult given the lack of competitive pay, increasing and redundant oversight as well as a challenging political environment. The Fairfax FOP Lodge 77 cares about recruiting and retaining the best talent to help keep Fairfax County a safe community. We know that you care about keeping Fairfax County safe from crime, we ask that you consider the impact his initiative will have on future Fairfax County Police Officers.



"He desperately wanted my brother and I to have a better life,' said Erik Bohn.

As part of the research and preparation for this article, he had hoped to talk to John McCain, who has a type of brain cancer that is similar to what Mike had."

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#### What Are Friends For (Not a Question)

Other than my wife, Dina, and my brother, Richard, there are few people with whom I regularly discuss - in more excruciating detail than weekly I do so with you, the world in which yours truly, a non-small cell lung cancer, stage IV "diagnossee" inhabits.

It just so happens that in this past week, I interacted with three of the other most main confidants, a rarity: my oldest, best friend from high school, Cary, with whom I spoke on the phone for nearly an hour (he lives in Massachusetts), a bi-weekly occurrence generally; my oldest, best friend from college, Rita, who I finally met for lunch (even though she lives in Alexandria and has been local ever since college), a much rarer occurrence (though we email regularly), a lunch that lasted four hours; and Veronica, my hair stylist, who I see every eight to 12 weeks - as I have for almost 20 years, whether I need to or not. (That's a joke. I have a full head of hair so needing a haircut is never the question, needing

Over these many years, these three have heard everything I have to say; good, bad or indifferent, and yet despite having heard it all, still remain interested in hearing more and judging less. Together, we share stories and confidences, laughter and sorrow. Their support and encouragement has been above and beyond the call of

Interacting with all three in the course of one night and two days reminded me of the actor George Peppard because this is my "A" Team." When I want to, they're who I go to, whenever the need arises or when the opportunity presents itself. And though they may not solve every problem, listening to as many of them as they have certainly has provided the kind of comfort and joy that has helped sustain me through thick and thin (not talking about my weight) and most importantly, during the past nine-plus years as a cancer survivor. There's not a "B.A." (bad attitude) among them, though they all wear jewelry.

I hope I'm not speaking out of turn here but, there are some subjects which are best left for friends - and the professionals, more so than family. Some topics which might betray a confidence or touch a nerve that when spoken of aloud might exacerbate a familial situation rarely discussed.

Sometimes, sorting through these pros and cons with friends, who likely suffer no consequences in the outcome, might present options that otherwise might not be heard. From the mouths of babes, so to speak. A fresh, unbiased perspective can be a welcome addition to any discussion of facts, especially when feelings are involved; and as often concerns family-oriented subjects, feelings are most definitely involved.

Not that there aren't feelings involved with friends; of course there are, it's more that old friends knew you when and know you now, and the passage of that much time, separate and apart from family, can often enlighten and inspire. Who wouldn't benefit from friends who've been there and seen you do that?

It's particularly important to have independent forces in your corner because like so many cancer patients, myself included, occasionally you exhibit signs of "chemotherapy-related cognitive impairment," otherwise known as "chemo brain," a side effect/condition of treatment which can blur a memory or two – or more. You may not even realize it when it disappears, and you may need someone to remind you of it. Hopefully it's not a memory gone forever, but just one gone until a friend helps retrieve it for you. And who better to retrieve these foggy memories than friends you've known for 49, 45 and 20 years,

And I do respect them, and appreciate them, and cherish them, as they are three of my pillars. Without them, the foundation of who I am and what I know, would likely crumble.

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
