Shopping with The Sheriff

Sheriff's Office partners with children living in family shelters for back-to-school shopping.

he first day of school can be as anxiety-filled as it is a time of excitement and anticipation. The scales, however, tend to tip towards the negative when you are a student living not in your own home, but in a family shelter instead. The baggage you bring with you to the classroom is a lot more than a backpack filled with school supplies and you often haven't had the pleasure and privilege of loading up on new clothing and paraphernalia to bolster your confidence as you walk through those school front doors.

For the last 27 years, the Fairfax County Sheriff's Department has hosted its annual "Shopping with the Sheriff" at Target to give those children the basics — and a few extras, too - to alleviate some of those anxieties and help get them off to a great start for the school year.

"This is one of the highlights of what we get to do," said Fairfax County Sheriff Stacey Kincaid. "It's a joyful part of our summer."

Kincaid praised the county's efforts to end and prevent homelessness, but says that until all children are living in safe and permanent housing, the "Sheriff's Office will continue to do its best to make their lives a little bit

easier."

THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE partners each year with Target and other sponsors, and solicits donations to provide each child with \$250 in gift cards to purchase clothing, undergarments, shoes, accessories, and school supplies.

This year's shopping extravaganza took place on Aug. 14, with about 40 children from the Katherine K. Hanley, Patrick Henry and Next Steps family shelters participating.

"Some of the kids were so excited, they didn't really sleep last night," said Joe Meyer, executive director and CEO of Reston-based Shelter House, the nonprofit that operates both the Hanley and the Henry shelters. Meyer said that the result of Shopping with the Sheriff was more than just the children "getting some new things. It's also about helping maintain their dignity and their pride." Before starting their shopping spree, the children, aged 5 and up, were treated to a Paisano's pizza party at the Fairfax County court house where they engaged in some fun activities that helped them get acquainted with the deputy or the support staff member who would be their shopping partner. Lunch and introductions over, it was time to shop. Escorted by official vehicles, some flashing lights, and a quick sound of a horn, or two, the yellow school bus carrying the young shoppers arrived at Target in Burke, where more Sheriff's Office staff, Target representatives, and some VIPs were waiting to welcome them. Del. Eileen Filler-Corn (D-41) was on hand, as was Braddock District Supervisor John Cook.

A few welcoming speeches and instructions later, and well-organized chaos ensued as the shopping teams grabbed carts and began making their selections.

The law enforcement personnel who accept Shop with the Sheriff duties all volunteer their time, but Kincaid said it's not too difficult to get willing participants from among her officers and staff. "I am so glad to do this," said PFC Kanli who was helping 9 year-old Kayden choose his new duds. "These kids deserve our help to make things just a little bit better for them."

Kincaid also sees this event as an opportunity to build relationships with these children, some of whom may have had previous interactions with law enforcement during difficult circumstances. The Sheriff

hopes that spending this time together will encourage the youngsters to "see us as being here to help them, as people they can turn to." "They have things to say, things to share," said Deputy Martha Heyward, who was with 6-year-old Nirvana, clutching her cart, already holding some new sneakers, "socks with pom-poms!" and other essentials. The sight of dozens of deputies wandering the aisles took a few of the Target patrons by surprise. "This has got to be the safest place to be right now in the whole county," laughed Carole Miller of Fairfax. Once the activity was explained to her, Miller seemed a bit emotional. "That's just the nicest thing I have heard or seen in I don't know how long. Bless them all."

AFTER ABOUT AN HOUR of shoe-sizing, holding up pants to check for fit, serious deliberations about the right cap to buy, deputies crawling about looking for size 6 jeans in that color and helping to choose which pencil case best matched a glittery binder, the carts rolled to the checkout points and the tallying began. There was some jovial ribbing among the deputies aimed at those who had exceed the \$250 budget, like Lt. Ricardo Evans who was shopping with 8-year-old Jamaury - "Hey, he needed all this stuff!" - but the little extras were kept, even the Barbie Doll that Miss Nirvana couldn't help but show to one and all. Target still had one more surprise for the young shoppers before they headed off with their bundles; each child also received a backpack filled with a variety of school supplies.

Celebrating Women's Equality

n Aug. 26, our nation celebrates Women's Equality Day. This day recognizes the ratification of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, giving women the right to vote.

Many fearless and dedicated women suffered jail time, physical assaults by the police and spectators (at demonstra-

ing rights. This struggle spanned more than seven decades. However, it was not until 1973

that Congress by resolution designated this day as "Women's Equality Day."

The League of Women Voters was founded in 1920 by Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, during its convention which was held six months before the ratification. She was a women's rights activist and a suffragist, who stated correctly that the vote was the "emblem of equality" for all citizens, women and men.

The League of Women Voters of the Fairfax Area (LWVFA) celebrates the fact that in 2018 there are 38 female legislators in the General Assembly as compared to 24 in 2015, an increase of 14. Although the LWVFA does not endorse any candidates, we recognize this historical achievement.

The LWVFA is a non-partisan organization. It provides voter services such as voter registration for first time voters, updating registration for people who have moved or had name changes and citizen education. LWVFA also advocates and takes action at the state and local levels for particular policies that are in the public interest such as Election Reform, Voting Rights, Redistricting Reform, Firearms Safety, Transportation and Behavioral Health. Work Against Aircraft Noise

To the Editor:

In 2015 the FAA implemented "NextGen," a new air traffic control system that concentrated all south flow departing flights from DCA into a single "superhighway", causing intense and relentless noise pollution over the neighborhoods beneath this new flight path.

In early 2017 several residents of affected neighborhoods, with the support of Supervisor Dan Storck and Del. Paul Krizek, formed the South Flow Alliance (https://www.facebook.com/ southflowalliance) with the goal of informing and mobilizing the community and making our voices heard at the FAA. Our group now includes representatives from several neighborhoods including Hollin Hills, Villamay, Gum Springs and Wellington, and we meet regularly with a member of the DCA Community Noise Working Group, which identifies community concerns and makes recommendations to the FAA.

In July 2017, the MWAA DCA Community Noise Working Group (http://www.flyreagan.com/dca/ dca-reagan-national-communityworking-group) approved and submitted a proposal (Recommendation #8) to the FAA that, among other things, would revise the DCA runway 19 departure procedure and have departing airplanes centered over the Potomac River to approximately 10 miles south of the airport and climbing to 5,000 ft. before making a south west turn to a point south of Fort Belvoir at 7,000 ft. and then intercepting a flight path south, south west or west depending on the destination.

The FAA presented its response

and a consensus was reached by the MWAA WG following an FAA presentation in April 2018. This put the option of a true solution on the table. That is the good news.

The not so good news is that the final OK to initiate the departure procedure implementation process has now been delayed due to a lawsuit brought by the of State of Maryland against the FAA. The FAA has discontinued conversation with MWAAA WG until further notice, citing pending litigation. The MWAA WG is working hard to re-engage the FAA on items relating to south flow procedures, as these are not involved in the litigation, and our hope is that the FAA will return to the table soon.

When the MWAA WG proposal is approved by the FAA, they will begin an 18-month safety and en-

vironmental review with public presentations and outreach as part of the process. The earliest any potential changes could be implemented is in 2020. It's a frustratingly slow and complicated process with many components, but it is important to be persistent and keep submitting noise complaints and contacting our elected officials. Noise complaints filed online get no immediate response, but they are being collected and tallied, and they help our cause. Keep those earplugs in for now but don't give up!

ing along the Richmond Highway corridor. We organized the forum to call attention to the risk of losing the affordability of existing, privately-owned apartments as a consequence of Fairfax County's recent adoption of the EMBARK Richmond Highway corridor plan.

This is an exciting plan that will bring modern bus rapid transit, mixed-use development, improved bike and pedestrian access, new parks and plazas, and opportunities to attract new businesses and residents.

EMBARK Richmond Highway creates a vision for an area of the county that has long suffered from underinvestment. However, without robust strategies to preserve the private sector housing that is affordable, hundreds of low income households could be displaced due to rising rents or redevelopment of their properties.

We are disappointed that strong preservation measures were not incorporated into the EMBARK plan as we called for, but we thank Supervisors Dan Storck and Jeff McKay for creating an EMBARK

Housing

Advisory Group to address this issue. This group has begun to meet and their challenges will be considerable.

Many owners of apartment complexes along the corridor may already be raising rents and some expect that the value of their properties will increase based on the reality that the Embark Richmond Highway plan, with transit improvements and mixed-use higher density development will bring new investment to the area. The higher sales prices sought by these owners makes it more difficult for affordable housing developers to purchase older apartment complexes and convert them to longterm committed affordable units. Higher purchase prices simply do not allow these affordable housing deals to work financially.

Throughout Northern Virginia, we have lost tens of thousands of units of housing that would be affordable to a family of four earning 60 percent or less of area median income or approximately \$66,000 annually. Given these losses, our goal should be no net loss of affordable housing. Currently, major sectors of our

workforce cannot afford to live in the communities where they work and are forced into longer commutes, increasing traffic congestion. Housing that is affordable provides a platform for families and individuals to become more self-sufficient, and children experience less stress and have better educational outcomes when they have a secure place to live.

There exists a wide range of preservation tools and best practices for the Richmond Highway corridor, and we encourage both the advisory group and county staff to identify and adopt the appropriate strategies.

As a start, the county has agreed to develop an inventory of both committed affordable housing and older, properties with private-sector rents that remain affordable in the corridor. Priority should be given to those buildings most at risk of conversion to higher rents and the greatest potential for re-

The county should consider planning and zoning tools that provide for increased development potential in return for preserving existing affordable units. Also, fi SEE LETTERS, PAGE 11





Operation Homefront gives backpacks and school supplies to military families.

peration Homefront held its annual Backto-School Brigade on Saturday, Aug. 11, at the Springfield Hilton Hotel. Some 500 military families from mostly Fort Belvoir, but also Quantico, Andrews Air Force Base, Fort Meade, and Baltimore, could take home free backpacks and school supplies like spiral notebooks, binders, crayons, rulers, and pens and pencils.

"Our mission is to build strong, stable and secure military families because we really want them to thrive in the communities they work so hard to protect. And not just struggle to get by. So, one of the ways we are doing that today by helping defray the cost of returning children to school," said Vivian Dietrich, senior director, Operation Homefront. She said it costs as much as \$500 to buy school supplies for just one child.

In addition to the back-to-school freebies, there were Superheroes for photo ops, face painting, and Nikita the Therapy Dog. This year, Operation Homefront partnered with the Dollar Tree store, which gave donations and offered their customers to donate school supplies.

nancial incentives such as tax abatements for owners who commit to maintain rents at an affordable level in well-maintained complexes or county funding for maintenance and improvements in return for committing units to a period of affordability should be considered. In either an acquisition or redevelopment scenario, the county must provide gap financing to developers of affordable housing. To do this, the county will need a larger housing trust fund and should consider a substantial bond for affordable housing development.

Co-locating affordable housing with public facilities — fire stations, libraries, and community centers — offers an opportunity to acquire land at little or no cost. There are numerous examples of co-location across Northern Virginia, including the county's own Residences at the Government Center. Moreover, the county should work with supportive houses of worship to create housing on their land, as some churches have done in Arlington and Alexandria.

Maintaining and expanding affordability along the EMBARK corridor allows low-income households who live there – overwhelming people of color – to participate in the new neighborhoods of opportunity that will be created there.

This is at the core of the One Fairfax Pledge adopted in July 2016, directing that "a racial and social equity lens be applied in the planning and delivery of all public services." Recognizing that "people of color are driving Fairfax County's population growth, and their ability to participate and thrive is central to the county's success," recommendations for the corridor must be viewed through a lens of social and racial equity. This is the county's promise in One Fairfax.

As regional organizations who have worked on issues of multimodal transit, mixed-use compact development and housing affordability in South County, we look forward to working with the Housing Advisory Group and the community to ensure adoption of a set of strategies that make the EMBARK corridor a thriving, diverse and sustainable community for all who live there.



Community Embraces DRP Pizzeria in Belle Haven

Second DRP in Alexandria offers Northern Italian cuisine specialties.

eing nestled in an unorthodox restaurant site in Belle Haven gives the DRP Pizzeria the edge for a neighborhood hot spot and social venue for this part of Mount Vernon. After starting there as an ice cream dipper and then moving up to hostess, Julianne York enjoys the camaraderie.

"Lots of my friend's parents are here, you can't really come to work without seeing someone you know," she said.

Manager and head bartender Danny Nguyen sees the same faces too. "We've built a strong bond with this community," he said.

It helps that the restaurant has a bar and ice cream stand within walking distance of most residences in Belle Haven, but the food keeps them coming back. The pizza varieties change to keep things interesting, and Chef Mauro Molino uses his expertise from Italy to whip up authentic Northern Italian cuisine that features cheeses and cream sauces.

"There are two different climates," he said of the southern Italian and northern Italian styles. "I use a lot of red wine," he added. He put all his Northern Italian knowledge in a book, "Piedmont Style: A Delectable Journey Through Northern Italy," which is full of his recipes and explanations of the regions where the dishes came from. "To let people know there is also other food in the world," he said. The book is available at the restaurant.

They've only been at the location on Belle Haven Road for a few years, but it is packed any given night of the week. To the insiders, this is really DRP2, sister to the original DRP1 in Del Ray, but the menu is a little different as is the clientele.

Inside there are 10 tables in front, booths along the walls,

and a full bar in the back of the room, but outside there is dining Al Fresco, with tables on the patio next to their vegetable garden where much of the salad fixings come from in the warmer months.

The selection of pizzas have some quirky names that are borrowed from the staff. This summer it's "Zach's a Pretty Fungi," named for one of the staff in the back who cracks

jokes, and the ingredients are alfredo sauce, parsley, smoked mozzarella and wild mushrooms. There is a "Smokin' Hot Chick," which comes in thin only, and even York, the hostess, had a pizza last year called "Julianne's Spring Fling" that featured barbecue sauce, brisket and fried Brussel chips.

"It's fun, gets our staff incorporated into our dishes, we have fun with it," said Nguyen.


Tater tots are a big seller at DRP. "We have people that order just the tater tots," said York.

Next door is the Custard Shack, an ice cream shop that is only open in the warmer months.

They serve cones and shakes, with tables out front that stay crowded in the summer evenings. York helped open the Custard Shack a few years ago, and moved up to host over the summer before heading off to Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. She'll be back though when classes are over.

The wall between the two buildings was recently adorned with a mural that screams Alex-

andria, courtesy of the owner's daughter Jessica Dorn. There were no real instructions given, but her instincts took off, so now the mural features the Masonic Temple and other sites in Alexandria. The instructions were "we would like something amazing on this wall, just have a go at it," said Nguyen. Sonya Richard helped paint it with



For me – or for any of you regular readers to think that this unexpected journey has not been fraught with before, during and after side effects - and main effects, up and down and all around, is unrealistic at best and delusional at worst. And since I'm rarely delusional except when it comes to the Boston Red Sox, it must be unrealistic.

being unrealistic is what has But maybe taken me nine years and nearly six months past my original diagnosis. If that's the reason, I see no reason to change now, age notwithstanding, or sitting, however the case may be.

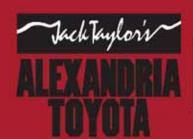





Issues Facing Mount Vernon

Mount Vernon District Supervisor Dan Storck outined the region's major issues:

❖ George Washington Parkway Study

The National Park Service is conducting a traffic study along the southern portion of the GW Parkway, to include evaluating key intersections between Belle Haven and Mount Vernon Circle. Along with other regional leaders, I have been calling for safety improvements on the Parkway for decades. A final report is expected in late 2018 or early 2019.

Richmond Highway Widening and Embark/BRT

Embark Richmond Highway is an initiative focused on creating a multimodal future for the Richmond Highway Corridor. Phase one of this project will widen Richmond Highway from Jeff Todd Way to Napper Road from four lanes to six, as well as provide separate bicycle and pedestrian accommodations on both sides of the highway. The project will also

preserve the median width necessary to accommodate future planned Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) for dedicated bus-only lanes. Next steps include phase one widening, as well as funding and implementing the Embark vision. For more information, visit: https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/planning-zoning/embark-richmond-highway.

Original Mount Vernon High School (OMVHS)

Fairfax County is exploring future uses for the original Mount Vernon High School campus and surrounding property at 8333 Richmond Highway. The Alexander Company is working with the community to create a master development plan for the OMVHS site. The project will develop over three distinct phases: immediate, interim use, and long term reuse. The OMVHS reuse project supports our Economic Success Plan and Embark Richmond Highway. ***** Airplane Noise

Since April 2015, Mount Vernon District residents have been subject to continuous high noise levels from aircraft flying over their communities, after the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) implemented a new satellite navigation system "NextGen." My office continues to work with the South Flow Alliance, the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority (MWAA) Working Group and the FAA to reduce aircraft noise pollution over our communities and to educate community members as to how they can help. I encourage anyone affected by this issue to stay engaged in efforts to address these concerns. You can do so by liking "the South Flow Alliance" on Facebook. Flying too low, let them know! ***** Huntington Levee

While the Huntington Levee project is

not complete, it does seem to have provided relief throughout the recent heavy rain storms for residents who have experienced past flooding. When complete in Spring 2019, the project will include a 6-11ft. high, 2800 ft. long earthen embankment with a 4 ft. high I-wall on top, a new water collection and storm water drainage system and a pump station. The walking and biking trail planned for the top of the embankment will connect outdoor enthusiasts to other trails in the immediate vicinity.

Opioid Disposal

As the opioid epidemic continues to grow throughout the country, communities are actively looking for ways to help curb abuse and misuse. In looking for ways to protect our community, we are aggressively looking for ways to get these drugs off the streets. My office now provides free drug deactivation kits. In addition, Walmart has launched a first-ofits kind opioid disposal solution, available at no cost, in all company pharmacies.

irst, be sure you are registered. Oct. 15 is the deadline to register, and to check your registration. Many voters across the country have discovered that they have been unexpectedly dropped from the voter rolls, so be sure to check at elections.virginia.gov

Absentee Voting in Person Begins Sept. 21

Voting early if you qualify is a good choice.

There are 20 valid reasons to vote absentee in Virginia, including working and commuting to and from home for 11 or more hours between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Election Day. Check the Virginia Department of Elections list to see if you are eligible: https://www.elections.virginia.gov/casting-a-ballot/absentee-voting/index.htmll

There are two ways to vote absentee, inperson and by mail. To do either, you should first check your voter registration status to make sure it is up-to-date.

If you vote absentee in-person you will fill out the application when you arrive at the in-person absentee location.

Virginia Voter ID

Acceptable forms of valid identification: Virginia driver's license, Virginia DMV-issued photo ID, United States passport, Employer-issued photo ID, Student photo ID issued by a school, college, or university located in Virginia, Other U.S. or Virginia government-issued photo ID, Tribal enrollment or other tribal photo ID, Virginia Voter Photo ID card

Need a Photo ID?

If you don't have an ID, go to your voter registration office to get a free Voter Photo ID, even on Election Day. You will be required to complete an photo ID application, have your photo taken and to sign a digital signature pad.

Forgot photo ID on Election Day?

If you get to your polling place without acceptable photo ID, you can vote a provisional ballot. You will be given instructions on what to do so your vote can count.

A voter will have until noon on the Friday following the election to deliver a copy of the identification to the local electoral board or to appear in person to apply for a Virginia Voter Photo ID Card. Voters may submit a copy of their ID via fax, email, inperson, or through the mail or commercial delivery service. The copy of the ID must be delivered to the electoral board by noon on Friday, or the provisional ballot cannot be counted.

Also by noon on Friday following the election, the voter may appear in-person in the office of the general registrar, in the locality in which the provisional ballot was cast, and apply for a Virginia Voter Photo ID Card. At the completion of the application process, the voter may request a Temporary Identification Document. This document can be provided to the electoral board for the identification requirement.

Newcomers Guide

Visit Local Museums

s the delegate for the 44th District of Vir ginia covering much of Mount Vernon and parts of Lee,

I would like to welcome all newcomers to our wonderful community. Normally, summer is a time to enjoy the outdoors, but with all the rain and muggy hot temperatures, many of us may be looking for indoor activities. Thankfully, we have the privilege of living in an area teaming with fascinating historical museums. Museums play a key role in education, job creation, tourism, economic development, historic preservation and environmental conservation. Below, I would like to highlight a few museums in the 44th district you simply must visit.

Mount Vernon is our most famous locale when it comes to historic places and is well worth a trip any time of year. Make sure to catch the ground-breaking major exhibit, "Lives Bound Together: Slavery at George Washington's Mount Vernon", and learn about the lives of the enslaved during the time of our first President. This exhibit is best viewed on the Enslaved People of Mount Vernon tour which is offered daily through October at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Additionally, one of most interesting attractions at George Washington's Mount Vernon is the distillery and gristmill site, located roughly three miles from the main estate. It was at this location that George Washington placed his water-powered gristmill and his famous distillery. Starting in 1797, the distillery quickly grew to become one of the largest in the young republic. In 1799 alone, it produced almost 11,000 gallons of whiskey and other spirits. The



Mount Vernon distillery is a fully functional 18th century replica that produces the general's rye whiskey using 18th century methods. Named as the official spirit of the Commonwealth of Virginia, George

Washington's Rye Whiskey. These are only two of the many reasons a trip to Mount Vernon is a must. My cousins from England visited last week and wish they had dedicated an entire day just to Mount Vernon.

Gum Springs Museum is another museum in the 44th district with moving exhibits. At Gum Springs Museum you can learn about our region's first freed black community and an art exhibit by Taj Elmelik until August 28th. The museum is open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and Saturdays from 1 to 3 p.m. There is no admission fee and the museum is located at 8100 Fordson Road, in the Gum Springs Community Center. Further south down Richmond Highway, is the Federal-style house, Woodlawn. Woodlawn was designed by the first architect of the U.S. Capitol, Dr. William Thornton and constructed in 1805 for George Washington's nephew, Major Lawrence Lewis and his wife, Eleanor "Nelly" Custis Lewis. The Woodlawn Plantation is open Friday to Monday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and is home to the Arcadia Center for Sustainable Food & Agriculture, part of a new vision that reflects Woodlawn's agrarian heritage. The Frank Lloyd Wright designed Pope-Leighey House is at Woodlawn and well worth a visit.

Recently, I wrote about the National Army Museum at Fort Belvoir which will be opening in early 2020. The army is the only branch of the military without a



Transformative Changes for Richmond Highway Corridor

ake a good look at the Richmond Highway corridor because it will change. This dynamic commercial corridor is slated for widening, adding a Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system, and has been rezoned for additional commercial development.

The past 10 years has seen remarkable re-development in the larger retail centers and additional housing options becoming available. The next 10 years will transform the area.

Mount Vernon Lee Chamber's vision for this area is a vibrant community enriched and supported by strong businesses. The chamber is a stalwart champion of business and works with our members and other partners to build a community where businesses thrive.

New and enhanced options in transportation, housing, education, tourism and health care will make this area more attractive for businesses to locate here. Businesses

bring vitality to a community and strength every part of the local fabric. Here are a few changes coming to our area.

Starting at the Beltway, the area around Huntington Metro

will see a re-development of Riv-

erside Apartments into its own town center with an addition of five new mid-rise multifamily buildings to the existing three apartment buildings with a pedestrian friendly street grid. All this plus new trails along Cameron Run and canoe/kayaking facilities.

Also on Huntington Avenue, the Huntington Walk Condos will be re-developed. According to the plan, the developer will tear down 364 condos and replace them with more than 1,500 condos and apartments, 65 townhomes, and retail and office space. The tallest buildings will be located near the Metro station and are planned for 200 feet going down to 55 feet. Completing the plan will take about 10 years with development closest to the Metro starting first.

Initial funding has been approved for Phase I of the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system which will start at the North Kings Highway entrance of Huntington Metro, and follow North Kings Highway to Penn Daw where it will enter Richmond Highway and extend to Hybla Valley near Mount Vernon Plaza. Phase II will continue the system to Fort Belvoir.

This project will transform the northern

part of Richmond Highway as the road is widened to accommodate the bus lanes in the center of the road. The design of Phase I is planned to be completed by 2022, with construction tentatively scheduled for completion by 2026.

While the northern section of Richmond Highway will change with the BRT, the southern section will be

widened and modernized from Jeff Todd Way to the Costco. The widening will be three lanes in each direction, new intersections, and a median to accommodate the BRT. VDOT is

finishing the design for this project and will begin acquiring right-of-way and moving utilities in 2019. Construction should begin in 2023.

In addition to the transportation improvements, the National Museum of the United States Army at Fort Belvoir is under construction with the opening planned for 2020. The 185,000-square-foot-museum space will house more than 1,300 artifacts, documents and images that will be selected from the Army's total collection of 630,000 items in order to tell the stories of American soldiers.

Adding the Army Museum to George Washington's Mount Vernon, Gunston Hall, Woodlawn Plantation, the Workhouse Arts Center, and other smaller attractions makes this area the tourism destination for all of Northern Virginia.

Additional amenities will be added to make the area even more attractive for visitors like new restaurants, bike share and dock-less bikes, and walking and bike trails and important transportation improvements.

Mount Vernon Lee Chamber will continue to work with our partners and bring changes and growth that benefits the community.

national museum and this one will be awe-inspiring, with over 186,000 square feet of displays with countless rare and priceless artifacts never before seen by the public. 

of Virginia also sets out specific types of property that may be exempted from taxation. For example, the Constitution of Virginia allows the General Assembly to permit localities to provide a partial exemption from real estate taxes as an incentive for property owners to make substantial improvements to existing structures by renovating, rehabilitating, or replacing those structures.

Proposed Amendment

The proposed amendment would authorize the General Assembly to allow localities to provide a partial tax exemption for real property that is subject to recurrent flooding, if improvements have been made on the property to address flooding. The General Assembly and participating localities would be allowed to place restrictions or conditions on qualification for the tax exemption.

"YES" vote will authorize the General Assembly to allow localities to provide a partial tax exemption for real property that is subject to recurrent flooding, if improvements have been made on the property to address flooding.

"NO" vote will not allow such a tax exemption.

State Ballot Question Two

Question: Shall the real property tax exemption for a primary residence that is currently provided to the surviving spouses of veterans who had a one hundred percent serviceconnected, permanent, and total disability be amended to allow the surviving spouse to move to a different primary residence and still claim the exemption?

Present Law

The Constitution of Virginia currently requires the General Assembly to exempt from taxation the principal place of residence of any veteran who has been determined by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to have a 100 percent serviceconnected, permanent, and total disability. This tax exemption is also provided to the surviving spouse of such a veteran, so long as the surviving spouse continues to occupy that property as the surviving spouse's principal place of residence

Proposed Amendment

The proposed amendment would allow the surviving www.ConnectionNewspapers.com

spouse of any veteran who has been determined by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to have a 100 percent serviceconnected, permanent, and total disability to continue to claim the tax exemption currently provided, even if the surviving spouse moves to a new principal place of residence that is owned by the surviving spouse.

"YES" vote will allow these surviving spouses to move to a new principal place of residence that is owned by the surviving spouse and still claim the tax exemption.

'NO" vote will not allow such surviving spouses to move and still claim the tax exemption.

FAIRFAX COUNTY PUBLIC SAFETY BOND

TEXT: Shall Fairfax County, Virginia, contract a debt, borrow money, and issue bonds in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$182,000,000 to provide funds, in addition to funds from public safety facilities bonds previously authorized, to finance, including reimbursement to the County for temporary financing for, the costs of public safety facilities, including the construction, reconstruction, enlargement, renovation and equipment of civil and criminal justice facilities, police training and operational facilities and stations, fire and rescue training facilities and stations, including fire and rescue stations owned by volunteer organizations, and the acquisition of necessary land?

\$73 million would be earmarked for improvements to four fire stations — Mount Vernon (\$16 million), Fairview (\$16 million), Gunston (\$13 million), and Seven Corners (\$13 million) — that are all 37 years or older. An additional \$15 million would be used to improve one of the eight volunteer stations that is more than 40 years old.


The Fairfax County Police Department would receive \$59 million: \$18 million to renovate and expand the Mason District Station which was built in 1975; \$18 million to renovate and upgrade its Criminal Justice Academy, and \$18 million to renovate, expand or replace the Police Evidence Storage Building used to store evidence for court cases, and also houses the warrant desk and the victim services section.

The Adult Detention Center needs \$45 million of improvements to three wings, including plumbing, electrical, HVAC, elevator and fire protection systems as well as security and camera equipment. \$5 million would be used to improve the Jennings Judicial Center.

- ❖ Dyke Marsh Wildlife Preserve: Located just a few miles south of Alexandria, Va., Dyke Marsh is one of the largest remaining freshwater tidal wetlands in the Washington metropolitan area. Dyke Marsh is viewed as a national treasure that holds extensive value not only for plants and animals, but for its recreational, educational and cultural purposes. It is estimated that the southern marsh has existed for 2,200 years, and the northern marsh has existed for 500 years. In July, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers began restoration of Dyke Marsh. Construction of a 1,500-foot breakwater is expected to take up to 18 months and will help protect the marsh from erosion, shield the marsh from storms and encourage the accumulation of sediment, which is necessary for marsh regeneration.
- ❖ Vast Recreation Opportunities: Mount Vernon is an outdoor enthusiasts playground, with two recreation centers, the Mount Vernon RECenter located near the Belle View Shopping Center and the George

Washington RECenter located across from Mount Vernon High School; two off leash dog parks, one at West Grove on Ft. Hunt Road and one at Grist Mill Park located on Route 235; and multiple parks, golf courses, bike and hiking trails, and boat launches.
