Celebration of Juneteenth in Arlington

Juneteenth has always been important for African-Americans.

im Moore sat back at his barber chair on Lee Highway last week, the shop quiet on a midweek, midday visit, no longer the hub it was in pre-pandemic days. Although masks are off, Moore has continued to schedule haircuts so he doesn't get the last minute rush on Friday

What was happening for Juneteenth? Moore didn't know of anything specific. Maybe he'd give 19 dollar haircuts that day. He was surprised when the visitor said she had never heard of Juneteenth until two years ago, nor had most of the people she knows, even today. "What about the Tulsa Massacre?" he asked, sitting up in his chair.

"Hadn't heard of that either," she said. Moore said for Black Americans, they knew about both from childhood.

Juneteenth represents June 19, 1865, the day enslaved Black people in Galveston, Texas, heard that they were free.

"Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation - which had become official January 1, 1863." https://juneteenth. com/history/

Juneteenth celebrations are a lot like the Fourth of July. People wear red, white and blue because those colors represent the



Jim Moore, Arlington barber, grew up celebrating Juneteenth, the day slaves were freed in Texas more than two years after President Lincoln issued the emancipation proclamation. But many Americans don't know what Juneteenth signifies.

American flag, a reminder that slaves and their descendants were and are Americans. Picnics featuring traditional African-American foods and music characterize Juneteenth celebrations. Virginia made Juneteenth a state holiday last year.

"Do you think things are going to change in society, with all the focus on Black Lives Matter and anti-racism?" Moore's drop-in visitor asked.

"Not really," Moore said. "I think we can talk more openly about it, but the issues are still there." Moore does his part. He votes in every election, and even though the White House didn't select his shop for the nationwide network of barber shop/vaccination clinics, he asks everyone who comes in for a haircut if they have gotten vaccinated. Preston Pharmacy, recognizing the role he plays in the neighborhood, also asked him to publicize their free vaccination program down the street. So far, everyone he has asked is vaccinated.

The National Landing Business Improvement District (BID) announced the launch of a design challenge to re-envision a retention wall located opposite the Crystal City Metro Station entrance in National Landing with an expansive

The BID is calling for interested visual artists to submit their relevant experience and project portfolios for consideration by June 1. Representatives from the organization will then conduct interviews with top applicants to establish a short

list of the most qualified artists, which will be announced on June 11. These finalists will be invited to submit a proposed concept for the mural and a winner will be selected in mid-July. The mural will be completed by Fall 2021.

Sponsored by the BID, the expansive mural will be created on the Metro plaza's west wall that measures approximately 115 feet in length and 20 feet in height. Marymount Hosts Gov. Northam To Sign Bills for Financial Aid to Dreamers

n Monday, June 14, Virginia Gov. Ralph Northam visited the campus of Marymount University to hold a ceremonial bill signing for House Bill 2123 and Senate Bill 1387 in the Reinsch Auditorium.

This legislation, which will take effect in August of 2022, makes Virginia students eligible for state financial aid if they are eligible for in-state tuition in the fall of 2022, regardless of citizenship or immigration status. At private institutions like Marymount, this will allow Dreamer students the ability to receive financial assistance through Virginia's TAG program – increasing higher education access and opening the door for more students to achieve their goals and aspirations.

"These students have grown up in our communities across Virginia. They've attended the same schools as their classmates and neighbors, they have taken the same tests, they have played on the same teams, eaten in the same lunch rooms and even gone to the same dances," Northam said. "They are valued members of our communities, and they are Virginians in every sense of the word."

A Marymount student who will gain access to TAG funding spoke during the ceremony about the importance of the legislation, and why it will be meaningful to her on her academic journey. Karla Mercado Dorado, a sophomore studying Biology on the Pre-Med track, came to the U.S. at the age of two from Bolivia. She told the audience about the challenges she faced during her college search as an undocumented student, and how opening access to the TAG program puts Virginia on the path to becoming a more progressive and inclusive Commonwealth.

"You're told that if you work hard, if you do everything right,

you're bound to succeed and you'll get to where you want to be. Unfortunately, for undocumented students like myself, we can work as hard as we want and there will always be these barriers," Dorado said. "So, the signing of this legislation really means a lot to me and to other students that I know who want to get an education."

Dr. Irma Becerra, President of Marymount University, is a Cuban-born immigrant who related that her family left Cuba with nothing.

"This legislation will prove how Virginia is leading the way in the nation in helping students realize their dreams of access to postsecondary education by providing Tuition Assistance Grants to students

attending Virginia's independent colleges or state-supported financial aid if they're attending a public institution," Becerra said.

"But I did have the opportunity to get Pell Grants and tuition assistance when I went to college, and I will fight forever for students to have the same opportunities that I did when I came to this country."

In attendance at the event were several Virginia state lawmakers, including Sen. Jennifer Boysko and Del. Alfonso Lopez, the lead sponsors of the bills in the Commonwealth's Senate and House of Delegates, respectively.

"Virginia is better when we have a higher educated community," Sen. Boysko said. "We have the high-tech, 21st century jobs – we want to make sure that everybody has an opportunity to participate in that, because we know there are many jobs that are unfilled."

This legislation builds upon bills that were signed into law in 2020 that allow Virginia students to receive in-state tuition regardless of immigration status.

"With this, Virginia finally fulfills the promises and investments we've made in these students from kindergarten through high school," Del. Lopez added.

ONGOING

The National Park Service has reopened Arlington House, The Robert E. Lee Memorial, following a complete rehabilitation of the site and transformation of the visitor experience. New exhibits and research allow the NPS to interpret the history of the Custis and Lee families alongside that of the more than 100 enslaved people who labored on the plantation. Together, their stories reveal a more complete picture of life at Arlington House and of the people and events that changed our nation. The rehabilitation, which began in 2018, was made possible through a \$12.35 million donation by philanthropist David M. Rubenstein to the National Park Foundation.

A today reveals a layered history that has often been untold—the experience of the enslaved people of Arlington House. This historic place tells America's story from its founding through the Civil War, including the impacts of slavery on the lives of these families, and the site's conversion to a national cemetery. Today, it stands as a place of dialogue and reflection to create a deeper understanding of the American experience. Through this project, the NPS connected with descendants of the Lee, Syphax, Parks, Gray, Branham and Burke families. Several descendants helped the NPS tell a more complete history of Arlington House.

Arlington House is open daily from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. To enter the plantation house, visitors need to obtain a timed-ticket through recreation.gov. No tickets are required to visit the museum, north and south slave quarters, grounds and gardens.

Navigate This

(All these times are approximate- or they're not. It depends. It's sort of an all hands on deck kind of thing. Everybody, everywhere has to be flexible. All of the following appointments/procedures have to be completed this day - or else. If not, it could adversely affect the timing and suitability of my treatment going forward. Not to exaggerate too much but, my life could be at risk if all of the following are not adhered to:)

Lab work at 9am-ish required for my every-four week-bone-strengthening shot. Nuclear medicine at 9:30 for the isotope injection for my 12:45 bone scan. After leaving Nuclear Medicine, I head to Radiology where I have a 10:30 am CT scan. When my scan is completed (it only takes a few minutes but generally speaking, they're not on time), I then go to the Infusion Center where I will get my every-fourweek bone strengthening shot. (Again the shot itself and vitals only takes a few minutes, but again, the process can take up to 30 minutes depending on the activities of the oncology nurses and the pharmacy's availability to prepare the medicine and the printing of my usual and customary paperwork.) Next - and finally, I go back to Nuclear Medicine for my actual bone scan at 12:45. This scan will read the nuclear isotopes injected into my body at 9:30. The scan takes about 40 minutes as it crosses my body head to toe to assess the condition of my bones. (The condition of my bones is not great. Unfortunately, It's a side effect of my thyroid cancer medicine as well as the 11 previous years of miscellaneous chemotherapies.) When this last scan is completed, my medical day is done and I will then be free to go. I will likely get home at approximately 3 pm, seven hours after

This jam-packed day is a first and hopefully will be a last. On occasion, I have had a CT scan and a brain MRI on the same day (BOGO I jokingly refer to it), but never have I had medical madness (five separate appointments) as I will on June 24th, the consequences to my health notwithstanding. Hopefully, by the end of the week - before the weekend of worrying, I will have heard back from my oncologist and then we'll deal with the consequences of all these previous actions. The waiting is not a huge deal. I have been there and done that for 12 and half years going back to late February, 2009 when I was initially diagnosed.

However this is not "concierge care." Any one of these five appointments could be missed for any number of to-be-expected complications when medical care is scheduled. Emergencies, double-booked appointments, staff shortages and longer than anticipated appointments could all affect my day of semi-judgment. And if any one of these appointments/procedures doesn't occur as scheduled, my care/my life expectancy could be jeopardized. From experience I can tell you, when this cancer patient has experienced delays and rescheduled appointments due to lab work (low white blood count, high creatinine levels, high or low calcium, above-normal potassium and on occasion low magnesium), treatment is stopped until levels return to a more normal number. In the interim, after your treatment has been stopped, your life begins to pass by you as you (at least I did) think that a delay in treatment puts your survival at risk. I mean, if your treatment is stopped at all, how does that stop the cancer from damaging you worse than it already has? Whether a week or two delay really matters, no one can say for sure. However, for the patient, especially yours truly; despite the reassurances from medical staff, in my head anyway: IT REALLY MATTERED.

After receiving a "terminal" diagnosis in February, 2009, I just didn't feel I had any margin, life expectancy-wise, for error, missed appointments, rescheduled treatment, et cetera. I figured that the information about my health - and as a result, any subsequent change in that treatment, needed to be known in an extremely timely manner. And when it wasn't -or isn't, I feel my pain, if you what I mean? Nevertheless, there are no guarantees in the cancer-treatment world. One has to learn to go with the flow and hope that flow doesn't turn into a flood.
