

$FCPS \ Honors \ 2022 \ \stackrel{Recognizing the achievements}{\text{in education in a challenging year.}}$

t its Honors Reception and Recognition Ceremony on Wednesday, June 8, Fairfax County Public Schools paid tribute to its employees who excelled in teaching students, leading schools, and providing support throughout the 2021-2022 school year. One of the twelve outstanding award recipients is an FCPS employee at Kilmer Middle School in Vienna. Amy Miller received the Outstanding Principal Award.

The program may be considered the school division's Oscars celebration, recognizing exceptional individuals serving in both instructional and operational roles.

Sponsored by Educate Fairfax, over 730 employees, including 71 finalists and 12 winners in 12 different award categories, were recognized at FCPS Honors, held at George Mason Center for the Arts. Fairfax County Public Schools has nearly 25,000 employees.

"You navigated the unexpected with grace and inspired those around you to do the same," Dr. Scott S. Brabrand, superintendent of Fairfax County Public Schools, said during his opening remarks at the event. "Life is unpredictable, and adaptability is a great asset to have. Instead of focusing on the difficulties, you viewed them as opportunities."

Colleagues, parents, students, and community members could nominate FCPS employees who had to meet certain position-specific requirements. Award liaisons from participating schools and departments collaborated with the



employee awards team throughout the selection process.

When Amy Miller took over as Principal of Kilmer Middle School in 2020, it was evident that developing connections and cultivating a community of belonging was at the heart of who she is as a school leader. "She immediately connected with each person in the building.

The Potomac School's Class of 2022

une 10 was a perfect day for an outdoor Commencement celebrating The Potomac School's Class of 2022. Hundreds of family members and friends were on hand to cheer for the 108 graduates as they crossed the stage to accept their diplomas from Head of School John Kowalik and shake hands with Board of Trustees Chair Sameer Bhargava.

Owen Diesenhaus '22 spoke on behalf of the graduating class, combining thoughtful insights with humor. He offered his classmates and all in the audience four valuable pieces of advice, playfully dubbing them "Dieselations": Rather than being regretful about the past or anxious about the future, live fully in the present. Recognize that you are always changing and growing, and embrace that process. Listen to your inner voice and "go with your gut." Deepen your existing relationships and actively build new ones.

Upper School science teacher Laura Petro called this year's graduates "an outstanding class – rich in depth, character, and selflessness." She stated that she had observed their courage throughout their high school careers, as they boldly took risks in order to learn and grow – whether that meant trying out for a varsity team, auditioning for a play, signing up for a challenging elective, or speaking about their personal experiences at an assembly. She urged the graduates to hold onto that courage and eagerness to grow, advising that they never be afraid to pursue their passions. Petro also encouraged the graduates to "put time and effort into forming bonds ... so that you have a person or group to celebrate your successes, help carry your burdens, and share your dreams."

Head of School John Kowalik spoke of the many challenges facing the world today, from the pandemic to economic uncertainty, political divisiveness, and violence. "There are no simple answers. But when I look at the faces of Potomac's Class of 2022, I see the antidote to all the misery I just cited. I see your generosity of spirit. I see your ability and your commitment to help make the world a better place," Kawalik said. "I also see some of the things you've learned during the pandemic – that patience and resilience matter, that being part of a community can give us strength."

Kowalik urged the graduates to recognize that they are not powerless, even in the face of seemingly insurmountable challenges. He told them, "You cannot fix everything. ... But you can make a difference. In your own sphere of influence – your family, your community, your career, even with people you meet at random – you have the power to make a positive difference."





Marymount Professors Prepare Aspiring Biologists for International Competition

Top high school biology students prepare for USA Biolympiad (USABO) competition.

arymount University hosted 20 of the nation's brightest high school biology students earlier this month for the USA Biolympiad (USABO) competition. The group received ten days of rigorous science instruction, lab training and testing. They were vying for a chance to become one of the four gold medalists who will represent the U.S. at the International Biology Olympiad in Yerevan, Armenia from July 10-18.

The students, including Lynn Tao of Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology in Alexandria and others were chosen from more than 11,000 students who registered to participate in USA-BO's national biology exams.

"We start with the 20 who have placed highest on the national test, and we put them through a rigorous week of intense refresher courses and offer them new ways to work through the problems of science," said Todd Rimkus, Ph.D, Director of Marymount's School of Science, Mathematics and Engineering."Our mission was to prepare them for the competition."

The instruction that students received included day trips to get hands-on experience with the lessons they were studying. "One of the most amazing excursions for these www.ConnectionNewspapers.com students was a field trip out to a local lake, where they got the opportunity to set turtle traps and then return the following day to see what they were able to catch,"said Rimkus. "When we pull up a net with over 100 pounds of different types of turtles, including large snapping turtles, the students are amazed. They learn that not all science happens in a lab, and many areas of science that they may have never considered in the past may contain the kinds of questions they would want to try to answer."

The students were also able to watch an open heart surgery as part of the INOVA Dome Experience program. "Our students at Marymount in the Nursing and Biology majors get an opportunity to see these surgeries on a pretty regular basis," said Rimkus. "It is always a wonderful experience to see the surgeons and nurses work with such care and expertise. USABO students always ask great questions of our hosts at the hospitals."

USABO is managed by The Center for Excellence in Education (CEE) and Marymount also hosted their scholars in 2018, 2015 and 2014. "[We] have a longstanding relationship with CEE," said Rimkus."Our close proximity to their headquarters in Washington, D.C., means that they were looking for a University with expertise in the biological sciences. "Our finalists have received many gold medals ... so I am confident that this group is ready to achieve similar outcomes."
