A Gift for Everyone at Urban Farmhouse

Arlington celebrated its 15th annual Small Business Saturday, Nov. 30. Small businesses generate local jobs and offer unique products not found in large box stores as well as building community. Arlington's 15,000 small businesses offer everything from gift shops, cleaners, pet stores, architects, ethnic restaurants from around the world to nail salons and cigar stores.

arah Allen walks around Urban Farmhouse, the local gift shop she bought four years ago located at 5140 Wilson Blvd. Allen says she has always wanted to own a shop, and she bought it from a woman who wanted to sell it during Covid.

Allen says her shop is actually an old farmhouse from 1900 so it has a lot of fun little rooms. "This farmhouse has seen a lot of life; it was a barbershop at one point. In this room we have baby things like these beautiful baby blankets made from recycled fabric from the Italian fashion industry." She walks to another room where she points to a pet section which has cute toy pet gifts. "We try to sell a little bit of everything."

Although candles are always the best sell-

er all year long, at this time of the year the red and green MERRY sweatshirts filling a large table in front of the check out counter are the seasonal best seller. "We go kind of wild this time of the year on seasonal gifts." As evidence of this, the table right inside the front door is crowded with jingle bell bracelets, Christmas holly plates and joyful towels.

Allen says the shop is focused on local products, original art, handmade ceramics. She says her favorite thing in the shop is the

art by local artists. "I love the art. I work with over a dozen local artists who stop by when they have a new piece. I collect it myself. I admit some of it goes home with me."

She explains Urban Farmhouse is small and local, and she likes to have handmade gifts by local people. "These wooden bowls are handmade by a lawyer who lives down the street. He salvages the wood and hand turns the bowls and signs them on the bottom." In another room the shelves are full of

pottery made by a woman from Frederick, Maryland and a woman from Arlington.

Gina Memmott, a regular customer, points to the small vases on the shelf above the pottery which she bought last year for seven long-time friends for a "favorite things" gifting party. "We all brought our favorite thing and gave it to the others in the group. Besides my vases, I remember someone brought face cream and someone brought chocolate babkas from New Jersey."

Urban Farmhouse is participating in Small Business weekend organized by One More Page Bookstore on N. Westmoreland Street. Allen explains,"If you visit eight out of 21 local small businesses and get your passport stamped this weekend, you are entered into a raffle."

Allen says people come in to look for gifts so "We try to help them. We ask a lot of questions—it's fun to figure out what will work for someone." Although Black Friday was a good business day, Allen says Small Business Saturday will be better. "I think people think about the large box stores on Black Friday but they like to shop in person at a small place which is relaxing. It feels good and makes you happy." She adds, "I think it is more important more now than ever to shop small in person."

A Taste of Turkey in the Middle of Arlington

elli Gozubuyuk is in the kitchen at Maya Bistro making falafel. She has cleaned and soaked the chickpeas for 24 hours and will add chopped white onions and garlic, parsley, black pepper and cumin and a little flour to hold it together. Four deep-fried falafel patties will be served on a plate with house made hummus and ezme (gluten-free chopped tomatoes, bell peppers, onions) and with slices of fresh cucumber. "This is a family recipe from Turkey." She says, "I make it the same way every

Telli and her husband Imam are the chefs in the small family business owned by their son Murat Gozubuyuk.

"Working with family is the best part," Murat explains. "I run the management side and do whatever else needs to be done to fill in. I am always here. They are always here." And he explains he has a 4-month-old son, the first grandchild, "so they are over at our house every night, too. He is spoiled."

Murat says they opened Maya Bistro a year before Covid hit. "We had a very busy restaurant but we lost 65 percent of our business during that time, and we're still recovering from Covid." He says it can be hectic because there are months with ups

and months with downs, and it is difficult to find waiters who have experience and can do the job.

A customer walks in to order a carry out chicken shish which Murat says is the most popular dish with customers. Telli says she marinates the large chunks of chicken with salt and pepper, saffron and fresh garlic and grills the kabobs for about 15 minutes. "We serve it with rice, bulgur, fries or seasoned vegetables."

Murat says his favorite dish is the beyti, Turkish flatbread stuffed with ground beef and lamb topped with tomato and yogurt garlic sauce. Telli adds that the Turkish piz

za (Lahmacun) is very popular, too. It is a crispy flatbread with ground beef and lamb, garlic, onions and bell peppers.

Murat says his father came to the U.S. from Turkey in 1998, first to New York City, then New Jersey and finally Washington in 2002. Murat and his mother and sister came in 2007, and he attended high school in Fairfax. "My father has many years of experience in the restaurant business and co-owned a Turkish restaurant in Fairfax but he found this place and saw the potential for a small business in Arlington and moved here in 2019."

Wreaths Across America Day to be Held at Arlington National Cemetery Dec. 14

Important Access and Safety Information from Arlington National Cemetery

n Saturday, Dec. 14, the annual Wreaths Across America (WAA) event will be held at Arlington National Cemetery (ANC) and the Soldiers' and Airmen's Home National Cemetery (SAHNC). Visitors will lay wreaths throughout ANC and SAHNC on headstones and columbarium niches to honor the sacrifice of our nation's service members and veterans. ANC will open to visitors at 8 a.m. and SAHNC will open at noon.

"We are honored to host Wreaths Across America Day 2024. This day provides visitors an opportunity to reflect on the importance of service and learn the stories of the men and women who fought for our country," said Executive Director of the Office of Army Cemeteries and Army National Military Cemeteries Karen Durham-Aguilera.

Visitors should anticipate large crowds and difficulty driving vehicles in the vicinity of Arlington National Cemetery due to road closures.

All visitors will be required to pass through the cemetery's security screening process before entering the cemetery. Prohibited items include firearms and weapons of any type, alcohol, fireworks, tripods and pets of any kind, with the exception of service animals and military working dogs. For a complete list, please visit: www.arlingtoncemetery.mil/visit/security.

No vehicular traffic will be permitted inside the cemetery on Dec. 14, and there will be no vehicle parking for the public in the ANC Welcome Center parking garage except for those with handicapped plates or placards. We recommend visitors use public transportation or a ride share service for travel to and from the cemetery.

If the volume of visitors into Arlington National Cemetery exceeds our capacity to conduct a safe event, we will suspend entry into the cemetery.

Visitors may wish to consider visiting one of the more than 4,600 participating locations across the country held on National Wreaths Across America Day on Dec. 14 or volunteer to help remove wreaths during our annual "Wreaths Out" event on Saturday, Jan. 11.

- ♦ We encourage volunteers to use all four entrances to access Arlington National Cemetery on Saturday, Dec. 14. The Memorial Ave. entrance, Ord & Weitzel Gate, Service Complex Gate and Old Post Chapel Gate on Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall (DoD ID card holders only) will open to the public at 8 a.m.
- ❖ All visitors must pass through the cemetery's security screening process before entering.

Metro Access to ANC

❖ We encourage volunteers to use Metro transportation.

- * To avoid congestion at the Arlington Cemetery Metro stop, we recommend exiting via the Rosslyn and Pentagon stations and walking to the cemetery. It is a short 15-minute walk from these locations to one of the cemetery entrances.
- Please look at this map for walking directions from nearby Metro stops.

ADA Accessibility

- ♦ Those with handicapped plates/placards will need to go to Pentagon North Parking, where their pass will be verified. They will then be directed to the ANC Welcome Center parking garage. The ANC Welcome Center parking garage will be available for those with a handicapped plate/placard from 6 to 7 a.m. on a first-come-first-serve basis. After 7 a.m., drivers will be directed to other parking options. Please do not arrive earlier than 6 a.m.
- ❖ The ANC Welcome Center parking garage is reserved for handicapped plate/placard parking from 6-7 a.m. or until full. After 7 a.m., no more vehicles will be allowed to park in the parking garage.
- ❖ Only those with handicapped plates/ placards are permitted to park in the ANC Welcome Center parking garage. All others will be directed to the Pentagon North and South parking lots and the Hayes parking lot

Driving/Parking

- To ensure a safe and secure environment for our visitors and employees, NO vehicular traffic will be permitted inside the cemetery for the duration of the event on Dec. 14
 - $\ \ \, \ \ \,$ Limited public parking will be available

- at the Pentagon North and South Parking and Hayes Parking. Wreaths Across America volunteers and signage will be positioned in the parking lots, guiding visitors to walk to the nearest cemetery entrances.
- ❖ WAA will provide shuttle bus transportation from Pentagon North to dropoff locations east of the Service Complex Gate.
- ❖ For those parking in Pentagon South Parking, we recommend walking to the cemetery's Service Complex entrance for screening and entry to the grounds.

For those parking in Pentagon North Parking, we recommend walking to the cemetery's main entrance on Memorial Ave. using the Route 27 pedestrian walkway.

Ride Share

❖ For volunteers who plan to arrive via a ride-share (e.g., Uber, Lyft), the drop-off location is the Hayes lot in Pentagon City (880 Army Navy Dr.). From this point, volunteers must walk to the cemetery's Service Complex Gate entrance.



Student Charged after Loaded Gun Found in Backpack

n Arlington Community High School student has been charged after a firearm was located in his backpack on school grounds. Petitions were obtained for the 17-year-old student for Possession of a Weapon on School Property, Carrying a Concealed Weapon, Possession of a Firearm by a Juvenile and Possession of Marijuana by Persons less than 21 Years Old. He is being held in a juvenile detention center.

At approximately 12 p.m. on Dec. 2, police responded to Arlington Community High School, located in the 4400 block of Fairfax Drive, after a school security guard located a loaded firearm with an extended magazine and suspected marijuana inside a student's backpack. Responding officers took the student into custody and took possession of the firearm and marijuana. In the interest of public safety, Arlington Community High School was placed on lockdown during the investigation.

The safe resolution of this incident highlights the collaboration between Arlington Public Schools and the Arlington County Police

Parents and guardians are encouraged to talk with their students about firearm safety, remind them that it is never ok to bring a weapon to school and that the possession of firearms and other weapons on school property is prohibited by law and has serious consequences. Vietnam Veterans Share Holiday Cheer

ietnam Veterans of America Inc. Chapter 227 of Northern Virginia fulfilled their founding principle, "Never Again Will One Generation of Veterans Abandon Another" by providing credit card gift cards to 91 veterans in the highly successful Veteran Administration Supportive Housing (VASH) program and filling the Santa list of three local medically impaired veterans and their families.

For the fifteenth consecutive year, credit card gift cards were provided to 91 veterans in the VASH program which provides stable housing and veteran benefits for homeless veterans and their families. The gift card amounts are from \$100 for a single veteran to \$ 225 for a veteran family with children. The successful veteran assistance program resulted in a 112% funding increase from 2023. The highest category increase was for single veterans from 21 to 64 cases. This year's program amount was \$10,725. Len Ignatowski, Chapter Vice President, manages the program.

For the thirteenth consecutive year, three wounded warrior families with their Santa List are adopted for the holidays. Carolyn J. Lehowicz provides the names from her volunteer work with veterans and service organizations. Chuck Harris, Chapter Treasurer,

and two of his friends are shopping for the Santa List. \$1,000 is allotted per veteran's Santa List for a total of \$3,000. The list includes a \$500 gift card and personal items from toys to clothing.

These two veteran outreach programs will make the holidays a bit more cheerful for our country's heroes. Plus, financial assistance is given during the year for needs from car repairs to rent assistance.





A New World Record

Typically, an in-building task at your local MVA is not grounds for excitement/enthusiasm; you name the positive adjective. And this might apply whether you have an appointment or whether you're taking a number upon arrival and sitting in their ample waiting room. The MVA is rarely described as an-in-and-out experience. It's known more as an "in" experience where the 'out' comes much later. To survive the ordeal, aside from being 100-percent sure you have all your documents, all your signatures, all your proofs of identification, bring all your patience, too. Also, it might be further advised that you should pack a lunch, or at least a snack, because the likelihood that you'll be waiting long enough to get hungry is high.

With this opinion in hand - and head, I had reason for an in-building visit recently which didn't offer an appointment: returning license plates for a car we no longer owned and one which, if I understood MVA guidelines, entitled me to a one-year's registration refund: \$67.50. Furthermore, if I wanted to collect, showing up in person was the best way. Going to one of the MVA's self-service kiosks, or to one of their inside-the-MVA-building machines was not recommended. For me especially, the chance for operator error was also high. Therefore, I decided to go to the local MVA office and to quote my old friend and long-ago softball coach, Marty B. who used to implore our team whenever we needed to overcome some game-related issue to: "Suck it up, Line." (Our team's name was "The Fine Line." The roster included several architects.) Given the "adult beverages" consumed during these once-a-week games, our team's name should have been "The Blurry Line." There was no avoiding this issue however, I had to show up in person at the MVA and/or suffer the consequences. I could not conduct/complete my business otherwise. But since I was expecting a refund, I figured that in this rare case, the MVA was sort of paying me for my time. I also was hoping, naively, that completing this process in person might result in an immediate refund. Unfortunately, that was not the case. However, it eliminated any delay caused by yours truly attempting to do it myself. This way, I was guaranteed the process was proper and that the refund would be forthcoming. (I have experience in these matters. As such, I've learned, repeatedly, that often it's best left to the professionals.)

Brimming with anxiety and presumptive stress over the time yet-to-be-served, I got in my car and headed down the road. In preparation for the day ahead, I had filled my pockets with some bite-size Dove chocolates. Targeting a mid-morning arrival, thinking that it was off peak, I turned into the MVA lot and ever hopeful I drove to the front of their parking lot hoping for a miracle. And there it was, the closest available space to the building located between the handicapped parking spots and the one reserved for police officers. what my friend Sean describes as "rock star parking." I went in headfirst and didn't look back. Taking a deep breath, I not only parked the car but my patience too; I got out of my car and walked the 10-yards or so to the revolving front door and in I went.

Once inside, I looked around to get my bearings. To my left were several self-service machines already backed up 5-plus deep. Ahead was the information station. There was one person in line and another in conversation with the MVA representative. I walked up to the desk and excused myself as I asked the employee where I go to turn in license plates on a car I no longer own. The man said: Right here." Super. I walked around the security rope and got in line. The person already at the desk finished his business as soon as I got in line. The man ahead of me stepped up to the desk and asked/said something. Whatever it was, it meant that he couldn't get any more help from this MVA employee. Within 30 seconds or so, the man was politely dismissed, and it was my turn. I told my license plate story as I handed them over to the MVA staffer. He took the plates and immediately began typing into his computer. Soon I heard the printer printing. The employee then handed me the recipe for my plates. The same receipt confirmed the refund. It said I would be receiving it in the mail in six to eight weeks. "Is that it, I asked?" 
