Thousands turn out for 276th birthday celebration.

he City of Alexandria marked its milestone 276th birthday July 12 with a celebration that culminated in a fireworks display over the Potomac River following a day of festivities at Oronoco Bay Park.

Alexandria's Town Crier, Ben Fiore-Walker, welcomed attendees to the festivities, which included a reading by Alexandria Poet Laureate Maria Cristina Donoso and distribution of birthday cupcakes by Mayor Alyia Gaskins, city officials and members of City Council.

"The Department of Recreation, Parks, and Cultural Activities was proud to host an unforgettable celebration for Alexandria's birthday this past Saturday, drawing more

Operation Overlord

City marks 81st anniversary of D-Day invasion.

t was 81 years ago that the largest seaborne invasion in history took place. On June 6, 1944, 156,000 American, British and Canadian forces landed on the beaches of Normandy, France, starting the epic battle known as D-Day in an offensive to take back

Europe from Nazi occupation during World War II.

Code named Operation Overlord, the fighting was fierce with over 4,900 soldiers, sailors, airmen and coastguardsmen killed, missing or unaccounted for. Commanded by

General Dwight D. Eisenhower, the battle is seen as the turning point in WWII and leading to an Allied victory the following year.

On June 1, the city commemorated the 81st anniversary of D-Day with a ceremony at Market Square. Featured were WWII reenactors and displays recounting the historic battle.

"These are the items that a soldier would have carried on D-Day," said Steve Hayes, who displayed items typical of the 29th Division www.ConnectionNewspapers.com Regiment. Retired Army officer Dave Ostrander had his 1944 Willys Army Jeep on display.

The D-Day invasion of Nazi-occupied France was unprecedented in scale. It was the largest-ever coalition of ships, troops, planes and vehicles to attack Adolf Hitler's defenses in western Europe.

More than 2,500 Americans

were killed on D-Day itself with another 73,000 Allied forces killed in the ensuing Battle of Normandy. At least four local soldiers were among those casualties and are buried at the American Cemetery in Normandy.

Northern Virginia soldiers killed in action and interred in Normandy include Sgt. Charles Couse, SSgt. Clyde H. Harris, and William E. Lumsden. Pvt. William H. Fisher,

'Immigrants Are Action Heroes'

Schwarzenegger welcomes new citizens at Mount Vernon.

ormer California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger celebrated Independence Day by welcoming 100 new citizens on the grounds of George Washington's Mount Vernon Estate with remarks that praised the immigrant spirit and recounted his own journey along the path to U.S. citizenship.

"When I came to this country 57 years ago, not in my wildest dreams — and I had wild dreams — did I think that one day this immigrant would be asked to place a wreath at the tomb of George Washington and to give the keynote address at this very important ceremony," said Schwarzenegger, an Austrian who became a U.S. citizen in 1983. "To the 100 people who have just become American citizens, I say thank you for sharing this day and your journey with me."

Schwarzenegger's remarks were the centerpiece of the annual naturalization ceremony held on the SEE 'IMMIGRANTS', PAGE G <image>

also killed in action, is among the names on the cemetery's Tablet of the Missing.

Gerald Krueger, Commander of VFW Post 609, was on hand with a display honoring Alexandria's soldiers from WWII and Korea.

"There is a monument at the train station honoring those who have died in battle but it was erected in 1940," said Krueger, whose father was among the first to land on Omaha Beach on D-Day. "As such there is no plaque memorializing the names of those who died in WWII. We are hoping to raise funds to have a plaque erected next Memorial Day to honor those lost in WWII and Korea. We

want to make this right."

The event marks the 15th annual celebration, planned and executed by the Alexandria-Caen Sister City Committee. The city of Caen, in western Normandy, was the center of some of the heaviest fighting after the Allies landed on the nearby beaches that marked the beginning of the end of World War II.

In addition to reenactors, the day features a 1940s jazz band, swing dancing, and a commemorative ceremony.

Sponsors of the event included Alexandria Toyota, Doug and Wendy John, Alexandria Radio Club, and Alexandria Restaurant Partners.

is the embodiment of the ideals that George Washington fought to secure. As Commander in Chief of the Continental Army and the first President of the United States, Washington helped turn the dream of independence into a lasting democracy. His courage, lead-

ership, and unwavering commitment to liberty continue to inspire our nation every Independence Day."

Mount Vernon, the home of George Washington, is owned and operated by the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association, the oldest

national historic preservation organization in the United States. The estate includes the Mansion, a museum and education center, gardens, tombs, a working farm, a functioning distillery, and a gristmill. It also includes the George Washington Presidential Library at Mount Vernon.

Telling the crowd that "I owe everything to this country," Schwarzenegger encouraged the new citizens to not only pursue their dreams but to also give back in their new communities.

"The day I raised my right hand and became an American citizen was, without a doubt, one of the greatest days of my life," Schwarzenegger said. "To be here 43 years later, standing at the home of one of my heroes to welcome more new citizens, is giving me a great gift – a gift to be part of this very meaningful ceremony. But I also ask you to think about what you would do for Ameri-

> ca as you receive America's many blessings. I hope that you accept the responsibility to give something back, to give of yourself to something beyond yourself."

Schwarzenegger praised the newest citizens and encouraged them to hold on to and share their culture and even their accents.

"The accent is nothing to be ashamed of,"

Schwarzenegger said in his trademark thick German accent. "It is a memory of your past, it is telling a story."

He repeatedly expressed his gratitude for the "limitless opportunities" America afforded to him but also stressed the importance of holding on to each individual culture.

"America needs your story. America needs your strong immigrant spirit," Schwarzenegger said. "You are the people that America needs right now, with your accent, with your memories of your homeland and with your dreams. You don't just deserve to be an American, you are needed here."

Under the direction of guest conductor John Devlin, the Alexandria Symphony Orchestra took to the stage to perform a selection of patriotic music culminating with a performance of Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture. Cannons by the U.S. Army Presidential Salute Battery completed the performance as a fireworks finale lit up the sky.

"This is an annual tradition for us," said Jennifer Walker, who attended with friends Katelyn Ken and Molly Theobald. "The three of us try to come every year. We're so happy to be here."

Orange County, California, resident William Douglass was in town visiting family, saying, "They said I had to be here because it's the best ever event."

Alexandria dates its founding to July 13, 1749, with the start of an auction selling the first lots to the public. Earlier that year, a

Washington would go on to recruit his first soldiers in Market Square for his first initial campaign of the French and Indian War and in 1763 he was chosen as a town trustee.

"We're already gearing up for next year's historic milestone — the 250th anniversary of the United States and our city's 277th birthday," Hashim said. "Mark your calendars for Saturday, July 11, 2026 — the Department of Recreation, Parks, and Cultural Activities is planning something truly extraordinary!"

This year's conference theme is "Young Voices, Pow-

erful Choices!" Open to rising 9th through 12th graders residing in the City of Alexandria, the conference empowers emerging young leaders by connecting them to resources in the community and through interactive workshops on how to engage, lead, and advocate for issues.

To facilitate youth-adult partnerships, the conference will include an afternoon networking session with community leaders, including City of Alexandria Council and school board representatives, City board and commission leaders, non-profit executives, and City staff. In addition to skill-building, the Youth Leadership Conference strengthens the 40 developmental assets young people need to succeed. These assets include a sense of feeling valued by their community, self-esteem, recognizing themselves as a resource to others, and planning and decision-making.

New Legislative Director

Ginsberg most recently served as Director of Congressional Affairs at the National Archives and Records Administration. She has held leadership roles on Capitol Hill, including Director of Subcommittees for the House Committee on Oversight and Accountability and Staff Director for late Representative Gerald E. Connolly. Her work in those roles led to the passage of several impactful pieces of legislation.

Ginsberg played a critical role in securing an unprecedented \$1 billion investment in federal IT modernization to ensure communities and families could access the resources they needed from the federal government, including Social Security benefits, Internal Revenue Service returns, and Department of Agriculture grants. In addition, Ginsberg led teams of diverse stakeholders to legislative achievements that included putting the U.S. Postal Service on firm financial ground and providing WMATA resources.

"Wendy brings a great combination of experience, policy insight, and a deep personal connection to Alexandria," said City Manager James Parajon. "Her understanding of how government works means she'll be a powerful advocate for our city's interests in Richmond and Washington."

As Legislative Director, Ginsberg will oversee the City's intergovernmental affairs; advocate for state

and federal funding and policy priorities; and collaborate closely with City Council and City departments to advance Alexandria's legislative goals.

Ginsberg holds a Ph.D. and an M.A. in Political Science from the University of Pennsylvania and a B.A. from Rutgers University.

"Ripped from the Headlines"

"Dun, Dun." "Can you watch my baby?" (On the streets of New York City, no less.) Said the young mother to me as we sat outside a New York City cafe. And what appears on television as a drama is often drawn from some of those things that actually happen. And for a few minutes on this Friday afternoon, I felt as if I might be one of those 'things' that happen only in New York City. It was a bit stressful while it happened. But it's been even funnier now that it didn't. Still, I hear it: "Dun-Dun."
